BULLDOGS TO PLAY MUNDAY HERE

Spur Defeats Crosbyton In Fast Game Last Friday Night

Locals Undefeated In Conference This Season

Coach Sam Hawkes' Battling Bulldogs of the Spur High School football team emerged again undefeated this season last Friday night when they battled the Crosbyton Chiefs to a score of 25 to 6, on the opponent's field. A large number of Spur fans accompanied the locals to Crosbyton to lend moral support and watch the Bulldogs battle for victory.

Watson received the ball on the kick-off, brought it up to the 30 yard line, where he was downed by the left side of Crosbyton's line. On the first play Sharp picked up 15 yards thru the center of the line, being pulled down by three of the Crosbyton secondary. Watson picked up a first down thru the left side of the line. R. Wright was stopped for no gain on the next play. Homer Wilson caught a beautiful pass, thrown by B. Dyess from mid-field for the first score of the game. Try for extra point was not good.

Crosbyton received the kick-off on their 20 yard line and returned to the 30, being pulled down by Neil A. Chastain. Crosbyton marched the ball to the Spur 30 yard line before the Bulldogs held them for the downs. Allredge picked up 15 yards around right end and Sharp another 25 thru the center. On the first play of the second quarter B. Wright, behind some beautiful blocking, took the ball on the Crosbyton 30 yard line and circled left end for a touchdown. The try for point was made by D. Wright.

Crosbyton received the kickoff and brought the ball up to their 35 yard line. They held for three downs and forced to punt. Watson returned the ball to the Crosbyton 40. The Bulldogs were held for three downs and punted on the fourth. Crosbyton safety fumbled on the 10 and Wilson recovered. Bobby Wright took the ball to the five yard line around left end and Sharp plunged over from there.

Crosbyton returned the kickoff to their own 40 yard line, passed to the 50, held for three downs and punted out on Spur's five yard line. Crosbyton passed for first down, fumbled on the next play and Spur covered the ball. Watson took the ball for a first down thru left side of the line as the half ended.

The Chiefs received the kick-off, fumbled and were downed on their own 10 yard line. On the

third down they punted out of bounds on their own 40 yard line. Watson picked up 5 yards and B. Wright another two yards around left end. Sharp picked up 25 yards thru center and on the next play Spur fumbled and Crosbyton recovered. Crosbyton took to the air but the first pass was incomplete and the next was intercepted by B. Wright about mid-field. B. Wright picked up three yards thru the line and Dyess picked up a first down. Sharp picked up six over center. Sharp went over center for 35 yards to the 10 yard line. B. Wright went to the five and Dyess to the one. Spur fumbled and was covered by Crosbyton. A hard run to the right picked up 20 yards and the Chiefs were thrown for a two yard loss and lost two more yards on the next play. They punted out of bounds on their own 35. A pass from Dyess to Calvert on the 10 yard line was fumbled and covered by Crosbyton on their own five. They punted out on their own 35 and Sharp picked up eight yards thru center to the 10 and B. Wright to the one yard line. Dyess went over for a touchdown. The Chiefs returned the kickoff to their own 40, made eight yards around right end, lost three around left end and completed a pass for a first down. On the next play they lost two yards. A pass was intercepted by Calvert and advanced to the 47 yard line. Dyess went thru the left side of the line, reversed his field and picked up a first down. Spur fumbled and the ball was covered by the Chiefs. Crosbyton completed a

Local Business Man's Father Died Here Last Friday Night

Father of W. R. Weaver Buried Saturday

Zeph G. Weaver, Sr., 81, father of W. R. Weaver, died at the Nichols General Hospital, Friday morning, November 1 at 9:45 o'clock after a short illness of pneumonia and complications. Mr. Weaver who has made his home in Amarillo for the past 22 years, was visiting in the home of Mrs. Carl Johnson, a sister-in-law of Soper, Oklahoma, when he became ill. On October 24 after receiving word of his father's illness, W. R. Weaver left immediately for Soper and brought his father to the Nichols General Hospital in Spur.

Mr. Weavers condition had steadily improved and was expecting to be moved to the home of his son, W. R. Weaver, when he took a sudden change for the worse.

Z. G. Weaver was born Sept. 21, 1865 at Greenville, Texas and had led an active life up to the time of his death. He was affiliated with the Church of Christ.

The body was carried overland by the Chandler Funeral Home where services were, conducted at Griggs Chapel, in Amarillo Saturday afternoon, Novem-

ber 2, at 4 o'clock. Dr. E. B. Fincher, minister of the Presbyterian church and long time friend of the deceased officiated. Singers were from the Central Church of Christ of Amarillo. Pall Bearers were, Tom C. Hanagan, Alvin Spencer, Jess McLemore, Cecil Nash, J. W. Oakley and J. R. Nicholas.

Survivors are, two sons, W. R. Weaver of Spur and Z. G. Weaver, Jr., of Amarillo. Mrs. W. C. Weaver, a daughter-in-law of Amarillo and B. R. Gardner, a nephew, also of Amarillo.

Final resting place was in the Llano Cemetery at Amarillo, beside his wife who preceded him in death eleven years.

This year's WTCC referendum ballot contains 8 proposals for 1947 policies and activities. All were submitted in advance at the chamber's district meetings in October for study and debate by towns affiliated and will be finally voted on Friday.

Dam Construction In Area Discussed At Meeting

Construction of Bob Baskin Dam in Stonewall County and the building of a fish hatchery just below Possum Kingdom dam, were principal topics of discussion at a recent meeting of the Brazos River Authority, according to Dr. M. H. Brannen of Spur, and a member of the board of directors. The meeting was held at Possum Kingdom dam last week.

Engineers of the U. S. Bureau of Reclamation have completed a survey and by December will be able to give an estimate on cost of construction of the dam and irrigation ditches, according to a statement, made at the meeting by R. D. Collins, Manager of the Brazos River Authority. The Bob Baskin Dam would be located about 65 miles from Spur and would serve as flood control and irrigation project. More than 35,-

**OPA Office
Here Closed
Mon., Nov. 14**

The Price Control Board at
Spur, Texas, serving the counties
of Motley, Kent, King, Stonewall,
and Dickens, was closed on Nov-
ember 4th, 1946, Mr. L. E. Lee,
Chairman of the local board an-
nounced.

"This step marks the conclusion
of almost five years of unprece-
dented patriotic service by a large
number of citizens of the Spur
Area, who, through their thous-
ands of hours of volunteer work,
have prevented inflation dangers
from taking effect and saw that
their neighbors had equal right to
their fair share of scarce com-
modities during the days of ration-
ing," Mr. Lee said.

"Members of the Spur Area
Price Control Board stayed on the
job for more than a year after the
end of the war. Production
has had a chance to catch up with
demand. Now that President Tru-
man has announced the program
for accelerating the remaining
wartime controls, Price Adminis-
trator Paul A. Porter has de-
termined that the remaining func-
tions of local boards can be con-
tinued by the District OPA Office
at Fort Worth, Texas."

Mr. Lee gave the following in-
formation as to the conducting of
OPA business in the future.

1. Trade and consumer inquires
about price control formerly han-
dled by Price Control Boards
should be addressed to the OPA
District Office, Fort Worth Club
Building, Fort Worth 2, Texas.

2. Certificates of Transfer cov-
ering sales of used passenger
automobiles may be obtained
from principal auto dealers. Deal-
ers should request additional sup-
plies from the OPA Mail Center
at Dallas, Texas.

3. Sugar rationing has been ad-
ministered from the District Of-
fice since last January. In the
future, sugar forms required by the
trade and consumers may be ob-
tained from the District Office.

4. Pending compliance actions
by the board will be transferred
to the District Office.

5. The local board office was
closed for the transaction of pub-
lic business on November 4. How-
ever, the paid clerical personnel
will continue on duty during the
month of November in order to
transfer records to the District
Office and to perform the many
other duties involved in closing
the board.

**Social Security
Representative
To Be Here Thrus.**

Elliott W. Adams, manager of
the Social Security Administra-
tion in Lubbock, will be in Spur
at the Post Office at 9:00 a.m.,
Thursday, Novembtr 14, for the
purpose of assisting persons who
have questions regarding Social
Security; discussing possible bene-
fits, and taking applications for
those who need Social Security
account number cards.

Recent amendments to the
Social Security Act provide for
Old-Age and Survivors Insurance
payments to thousands of former-
ly ineligible survivors of discharg-
ed World War II veterans.

These amendments, long post-
poned by Congress, provide pro-
tection to survivors if:

The veteran dies within three
years after discharge.

He had at least 90 days of ac-
tive service in the armed forces
after September 16, 1940.

He were not dishonorably dis-
charged, and

The survivors are not eligible
for payments from the Veterans
Administration. Proceeds from
National Service Life insurance
policies are not counted as pay-
ments from the Veterans Ad-
ministration.

Can't think of another thing now but I'll catch up next week.


BAND NOTES

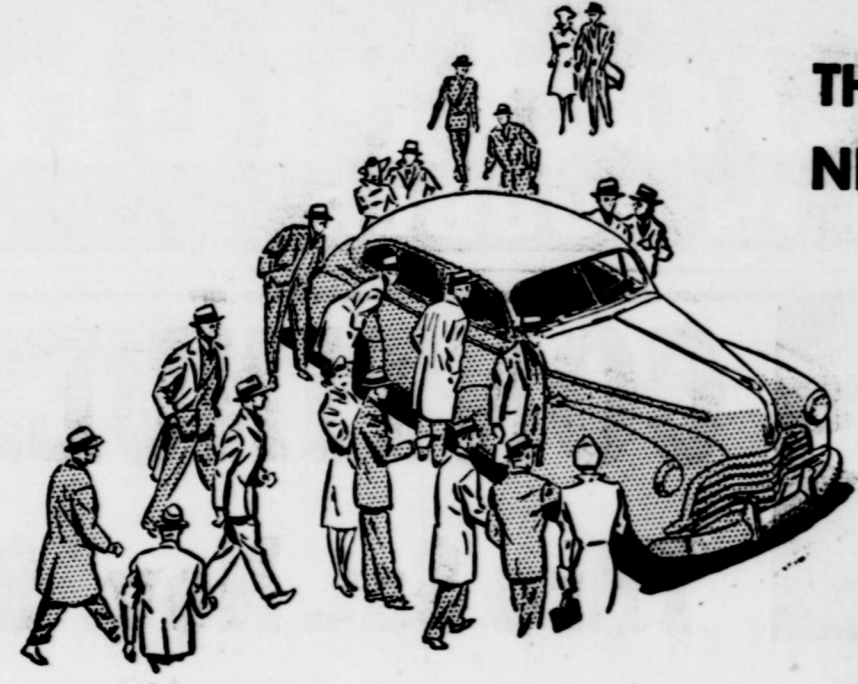
