



2. Certificates of Transfer covering sales of used passenger automobiles may be obtained from principal auto dealers. Dealers should request additional supplies from the OPA Mail Center at Dallas, Texas.

3. Sugar rationing has been administered from the District Otfice since last January. In the future, sugar forms required by the trade and cunsumers may be ob-

ained from the District Office. 4. Pending compliance actions by the board will be transferred to the District Office.


5. The local board office was closed for the transaction of public business on November 4. However, the paid clerical personnel will continue on duty during the month of November in order to transfer records to the District Office and to perform the many other duties involved in closing the board.

These amendments, long postponed by Congress, provide protection to survivors if: The veteran dies within three

years after discharge. He had at least 90 days of active service in the armed forces
