FARMERS TO DISCUSS FUTURE LEGISLATION AT LUBBOCK MEET

Local Farmers Will Attend Meeting With Solons

A congressional committee hearing to discuss future policies and legislation affecting cotton and cotton producers will be held in Lubbock on October 24th, according to an announcement from Congressman George Mahan's Lubbock office this week.

The purpose of the hearing is to get the views of cotton producers with respect to legislation to be considered by the next Congress. A portion of the AAA law, including that part which enables producers to establish national and local cotton acreage quotas will expire next year.

The Dickens County Group will meet Friday night, October 18 at 7:00 p.m. at the Co Op Gin in Spur to discuss the fourteen points of a future cotton program and elect someone to go before the committee at Lubbock and present views of local producers.

Among those from this section expected to attend the meeting will be Joe M. Rose, Roaring Springs; Chas. Taylor, Dickens; R. R. Wooten, McAdoo; Elmer Shugart, W. T. Andrews, Geo. S. Link and O. C. Arthur all of Spur, and others.

The committee is coming to West Texas upon the invitation of Representative Mahon. The committee will be headed by Congressman Steve Pace of Georgia, author of the well-known Pace Parity bill. Mr. Pace is an influential member of the House Committee on Agriculture. Six other members of this important committee are scheduled to accompany Mr. Pace to Lubbock for the hearing. County Ginnings Total 334 Bales Prior To October 1

With the advent of clear weather and warm sunshine after weeks of rainy weather, Dickens County cotton gins have been busy again the past week.

With ginning season for the county considerably advanced over last year, the Department of Commerce figures furnished through Frank Watson, county crop reporter, reveals that 334 bales of cotton were ginned in Dickens county from the crop of 1946 to October 1, as compared with 90 bales for the crop of 1945.

Late rains gave a new lease on life to young and old cotton alike. Reports from all over the county indicate a much better yield than appeared likely a month ago. Feedstuffs and pastures also are in excellent condition after the rains.

Kent county reports for the '46 crop a total of 219 bales ginned.

Thomas W. Settle Killed, Brother Injured Sunday

Local Farmer Died Enroute To Amarillo Hospital

Thomas W. Settle, Jr., 35 son of Mr. and Mrs. T. W. Settle, Sr., of the Spur community, was killed and his brother, Olen Settle was injured, in an automobile accident near the Cathey place, ten miles north of Spur, on the Dickens highway, Sunday night at about 9:30.

Settle died while being rushed to the Veterans Hospital at Amarillo in a Campbell ambulance following the crash. Olen Settle was treated for injuries at Nichols General Hospital here and was released Monday. He suffered cuts and bruises about the head. A Chandler ambulance brought the injured men to Spur.

According to Sheriff Fred Christopher, who investigated the crash, the Settle car had become stalled along the highway and the boys had gotten out of the car and were preparing to have another car tow the machine. A car driven by Elzy Pullen of McAdoo was going north and apparently became blinded by lights of an oncoming car and crashed into the back of the Settle car. Pullen was accompanied by his mother, Mrs. Walter Pullen and a brother. No one in the Pullen car was injured.

Funeral services for Thomas W. Settle were held at the Church of Christ Tuesday at 4:00 with Roy Deaver officiating. Burial was in the Settle family cemetery. Those included, Buddy Powell, Le Wright, Tommie Lee Elki, Le Roy Causey, and others.

He is survived by the parents, two brothers, B. F. Settle and Vegas, N. M., and Olen Deaver of Spur; and two sisters, E. C. May Shackelford of Spur and Mrs. Jimmie Newton of Mexico.

Farmhouse Floor Plans Published By Extension Service

Farm families planning to build new homes can now get ideas for floor plans from the Texas A. and M. College Extension Service.

Extension Publication B-145, entitled "Floor Plans of Farmhouses" has been released by the Extension Service and can be obtained at local County Extension offices or by writing to the Texas A. and M. College Extension Service, College Station, Texas.

The publication contains 75 different floor plans for farm dwellings of two to eight rooms, both one and two story houses. Many plans are shown which accommodate families who plan to build small houses and add other rooms in the future.

Prints showing more details on any one of the plans in the publication may be secured either through the county Extension Service at College Station.

Citizens Should

For Veterans Housing

Home builders in Spur Area can most speedily increase the number of houses constructed for all citizens by throwing their every effort into producing houses for veterans first, according to L. E. Lee. To meet the veterans' needs, Lee said, the crucial goal is compliance with price and materials-channeling regulations; because otherwise veterans will not get houses at prices they can afford, if at, for years to come. "The bee is on every honest, right-minded citizen," Lee declared. "No control or regulation can be adequately enforced against the will of the people. Prohibition proved that. Therefore, if the majority of the people really desires to see veterans housed decently, promptly, and at sensible prices and rents, they must cooperate in enforcing controls and thus wiping out the black market and preventing inflation which would harm as much as anyone else."

Lee pointed out that sweeping actions recently have been taken in Washington, by the National Housing Agency in collaboration with the Civilian Production Administration and the Office of Price Administration, to move more materials into veterans' housing at lawful prices. The action includes increasing the number of building materials on the priority-controlled list, enlarging the percentage of production that must be reserved for priority-rated orders. Removing limitations from the period over which the set aside must be held for rated orders, making compliance enforcement stricter, and reducing all non-housing construction by an additional 27 per cent (to \$35,000,000 weekly).

Two ounces of copper carbonate or one half ounce of the new, improved Ceresan, a commercial preparation, is sufficient for each bushel of grain and may be applied in any type of seed treated.

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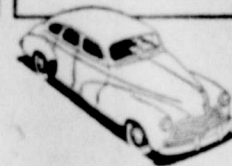

Storehouse of Free Information Available

A storehouse of free information for any individual in any town, city or community in Texas is the University of Texas Package Loan Library, now beginning its thirty-third year of public service.

Literally thousands of subjects are available in package libraries, just for the asking. Miss LeNoir Dimmitt, librarian, said, "An individual who does not have access to a library may write in to the Loan Library for his information. If the town or community does have a library, the request must be made through that library, she explained.

The new 1946 catalog may be obtained by writing directly to the Extension Loan Library.

Teachers, libraries, women's clubs, forums and other organizations make constant use of the library, and collections of materials are available on subjects which are studied in schools, in which individuals are interested, and topics used by clubs and groups," Miss Dimmitt said.

A summary of circulation in 1945-46 shows that 1,160 books were sent from the library; 11,204 plays; 2,690 club outlines, and 269,313 pamphlets and periodical clippings.

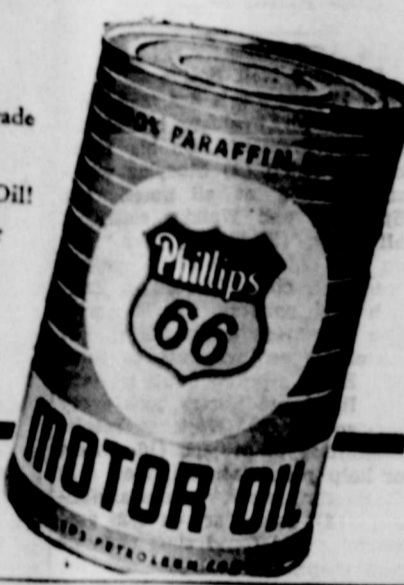

Health Department To Protect Public Health

Dr. George W. Cox, State Health Officer, was recently asked to give the duties of the Texas State Department of Health in contrast with those of the general practitioner of medicine.

He stated, "The Health Department is charged with protecting the public health. This it does by education of the people as to how they may secure protection against disease, such as vaccination against smallpox and typhoid fever and immunization against diphtheria; by investigation of sources of outbreaks of disease; by quarantine and isolation of those ill with communicable disease by the prevention of the spread of the diseases; inspection of water supplies; by advocating the production and use of safe milk and to prevent threatened outbreaks of communicable diseases."

"People will become ill and accidents will happen. The cure of sickness and the repair of accidents comes within the scope of the duties of the practitioner of medicine and surgery. The general practitioner of medicine is also engaged in preventive medicine when he advises mothers to have their children protected against diphtheria and smallpox or the family as a whole immunized against typhoid fever before planning travel, such as cross country trips."

The general practitioner and the Health Department alike believe that it is better to remain healthy than it is to get well after becoming ill, but the Department is engaged in the control and prevention of disease as it affects the general population of community or state. The field of treatment and cure of those ill belongs solely to the general practitioner of medicine.

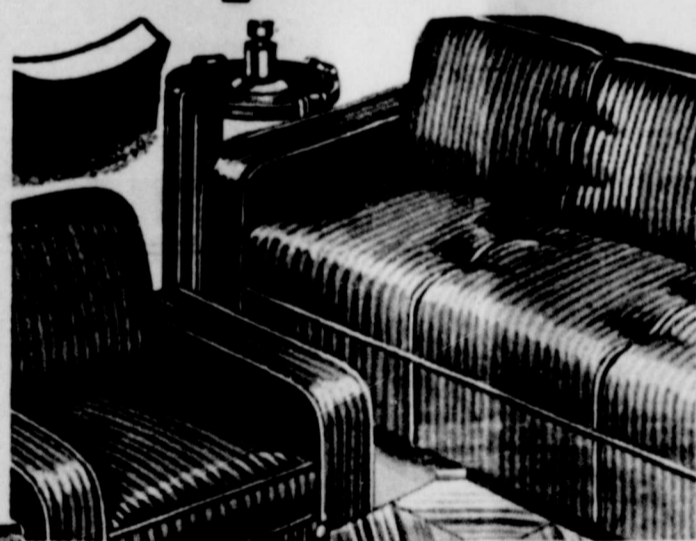
