

One Office Will Serve Farmers' Credit Needs

Credit facilities and services formerly provided by the Farm Security Administration and the Emergency Crop and Feed Loan Division of Farm Credit Administration are available to eligible farmers through the Dickens County office of the Farmers' Home Administration, Lester J. Cappleman, Texas State Director of FHA announced today.

Mr. Cappleman also announced the designation of Wilburn S. Pat county supervisor of the Farm Security Administration, as inter-supervisor-in charge of the Crosby and Dickens county offices. The Crosby County office is located in the County Courthouse at Crosbyton. The Dickens and Kent county office is located in the Spur Security Bank Build ing at Spur.

The Farmers' Home Admini stration, created by the 79th Concress, took over functions of FSA and ECFL effective November 1 Based on a play by Louis Ver- The new agency will make proneuil, the screenplay was written by John Collier and Joseph Than. well as loans for farm purchases. Facilities are available only to farmers who are unable to get the loans they need at interest rates nit exceeding five per cent from banks, cooperative lending agencies or other responsible sources in their communities.

The farm purchase loans made by the new agency are similar to those formerly made by the Farm Security Administration. Loans are made for 100 per cent of the purchase price of family-type farms, plus needed improvements. Repayment is scheduled over a period of 40 years, and Interest rate is 3 1-2 per cent.

Operating credit extended by Farmers' Home Administraon under its production and batance loan program includes " armed loans and adjustment type loans at five per cent interest.

The adjustment type credit is er o the 'renabilitation" made by the Farm Security Administration, and is based on end rome operating plans worked out by the borrower with the aid of FHA supervisors. It is accompanied by on-the-farm monagement assistance provided by FHA personnel. Loans may be repaid over a maximum period of five years.

The annual loans made by FHA re similar to the "feed and seed" loans made by the Emerency Crop and Feed Loan Divi sion of the Farm Credit Administration Farm and home plans are not required as a basis for these loans, but they must be repaid within 12 months.

Production and subsistence loans to any one borrower may not exceed \$3,500 in any one year. Total indebtedness of any one borrower may not exxceed

Veterans will be given preference in all phases of the Farmers' Home Administration program.
