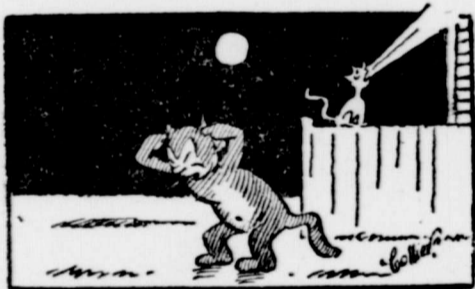
### B. Schwarz & Son Distributes \$3,000 Christmas Bonuses

The change of officers was completed officially at 9:00 o'clock in the County Judge's office.

A. C. Sharp will succeed E. H. Boedeker as County Judge, R. A. Conner succeeds Winston Brummett as County Attorney and Jake Varnell succeeds E. H. Ousley as County Clerk. C. C. Kimmel took over the duties of the Sheriff and Tax Collector's office in November after the former Sheriff, Fred Christopher, resigned.

F. L. Edwards succeeds W. K. Street as Commissioner of Precinct No. 1; E. J. Offield was re-elected to the office of Commissioner of Precinct No. 2; Arner Watson succeeds W. H. Hindman as Commissioner of Precinct 3; G. W. Pierce succeeds M. B. Gage as Commissioner of Precinct 4; and Mrs. Turpen was re-elected as County Treasurer.

Robert Williams succeeds Oscar Kelley as County School Superintendent.

John Hazelwood will serve as Constable of Precinct three and W. M. Malone will serve as Justice of the Peace of Precinct three.

Judge Boedeker conducted the ceremony of swearing in the commissioners' court and Bob Conner, as County Attorney, Mr. Conner then swore in other officials.

**1946 Cotton Better In Quality**

COLLEGE STATION.—Texas cotton ginned through November 30 was substantially higher in grade and longer in staple length than cotton ginned in the same period last year.

John L. McCollum, manager of the Southwest Cotton Branch office of the Production and Marketing Administration in Dallas released this information in a grade and staple report to the Texas A. and M. College Extension Service. McCollum attributes the increase in grade to more favorable weather and a more plentiful labor supply, adding that about 45 percent of this year's ginnings have been Middling White and higher. Average staple length this season is 30.7 thirty-seconds of an inch, compared with 30.4 thirty-seconds a year ago.

Cotton ginned during the last half of November, as the season neared its close, fell below the quality of that ginned the first two weeks of the month, McCollum points out.

**Cotton Regains As Hogs Drop Near Lowest Level**

(USDA) — Southwest markets saw cotton gain about a cent per pound last week despite ups and downs and hogs drop near the lowest level since price decontrol. Other farm products were steady to weak, reports USDA's Production and Marketing Administration.

Unfavorable weather and slow demand curtailed southwest and Colorado fruit and vegetable shipments last week. Rio Grande Valley reported weaker citrus prices as buyers stopped shipping. Also, Texas carrots and cabbage moved downhill, but peppers and spinach held steady. Tomato sales were few because of wet fields. Louisiana and Texas sweetpotato markets were dull. Colorado sold potatoes and onions at about steady prices. Arkansas spinach and New Mexico carrots moved slowly at steady to weak prices.

Sorghums gained about 10 cents per hundred last week and white corn about 3 cents per bushel. Wheat and oats declined. Barley and yellow corn held about steady.

Bran and shorts dropped about \$2 per ton and oilseed meals declined last week as the usual pre-inventory hand-to-mouth buying resulted in limited demand.

Limited egg supplies found fair to good demand during the pre-holiday week, but prices were somewhat easy. Current receipts sold at 37 cents per dozen at Denver and around 40 to 45 at other places. Turkeys were a little lower than a week earlier as late season purchases moved mostly in local markets. Young turkey hens were quoted mostly at 35 cents per hundred and young lightweight toms at 22 to 25. Chicken hens were a cent or two above a week ago, ranging from 25 to 27 cents per pound for heavy weights. Fryers held about steady.

Wools from Texas, Colorado, and New Mexico were among those revalued at Boston. Prices were reduced because of foreign matter, moth damage, and shrinkage. This reduction made the wools attractive to buyers and they sold readily.

Sheep and lambs were stronger at Fort Worth but steady to weak at other southwest markets last week. San Antonio quoted common fall shorn lambs at \$12 to \$15 per hundred pounds and common ewes at \$6.50 to \$6.90. Medium and good lambs brought \$18 to \$21 at Fort Worth; \$18.50 to \$20.50 at Oklahoma City and \$19 to \$21.50 at Denver.

Largest run of hogs in many months arrived at southwest markets last week. Prices dropped \$2 to \$3 per hundred. Top butchers were quoted at \$20 per hundred at San Antonio and Fort Worth; \$20.50 at Oklahoma City; \$20.60 at Wichita and \$21.25 at Denver.

Cattle prices were strong at Texas markets but steady to lower at other southwest terminals last week. Houston sold good yearlings to \$18.50 and good cows at \$13.75 to \$15 per hundred. San Antonio moved good cows at \$5 and medium to low good grass and shortfed steers at \$16 to \$21. Fort Worth quoted medium and good slaughter steers and heifers at \$17 to \$23.50 and medium and good cows at \$12 to \$15. Medium to low good shortfed steers and yearlings realized \$17.25 to \$19.50 at Oklahoma City. Wichita sold good light steers at \$23. Denver quoted most medium to good steers at \$17 to \$27.

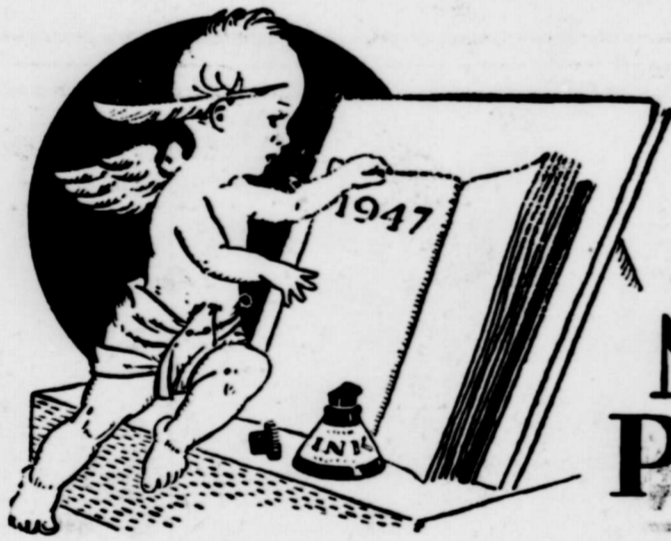

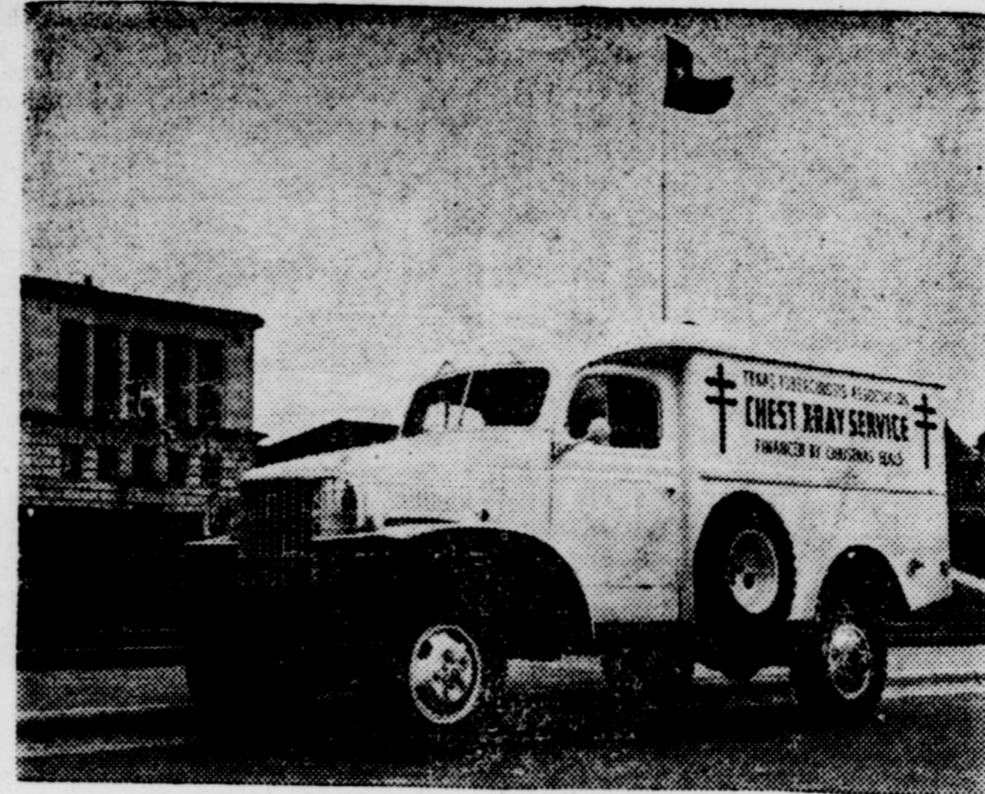

### Mobile X-Ray Service To Combat Tuberculosis



AUSTIN — Christmas Seals bought the mobile X-ray equipment now being used to X-ray students at the University of Texas, and will continue to support operation of the unit in various localities throughout the State, according to a statement today by Pansy Nichols, executive secretary, Texas Tuberculosis Association.

Over 10,000 UT students, faculty, staff, and employees have been X-rayed to date in the case-finding project conducted on the campus by the Texas Tuberculosis Association with the cooperation of the University Health Service and the State Department of Health.

With the aid of volunteers from Austin's City Federation of Women's Clubs, Council of Jewish Women and the Junior League, registration of students was completed last week. Not one student missed a class to be X-rayed and no one was detained longer than 10 minutes for the entire proceeding, Miss Nichols said.

Shortly after the first of the year the Seal supported unit will start on tour of the State to X-ray groups of apparently healthy people in communities requesting this X-ray service, Miss Nichols stated. "Tuberculosis kills more Texans between 15 and 35 than all other infectious and parasitic diseases combined," she pointed out, "and for this reason the Association is especially concerned to uncover potential spreaders of disease by looking for TB in the early, most easily curable stage—before symptoms appear."

One of the four national winners in the 1946 4-H Field Crops Contest, Harris Hill, 17, of Garland, Dallas county, Tex., receives his \$200 Fowler McCormick scholarship award from John L. McCaffrey, president of International Harvester Company.

Harris was named 4-H southern extension section winner following the judging of the national field of 859 county champions in 44 states. The presentation of the scholarship, good at any accredited state agricultural college, was made during the recent 25th annual 4-H Club Congress, when International Harvester, donor of the awards, brought all state winners in the Field Crops contest to Chicago for this silver anniversary assembly.

During his seven years in 4-H, Harris raised 41 acres of cotton, 30 of corn, 46 of wheat, 101 of clover, 17 of barley, 35 of oats, four of row cane, nearly eight of grain sorghum and two of sudan. Income from these was nearly \$10,000 and with swine, beef and dairy returns, brought the total to \$17,890.56. He employs the best known tillage methods, and much of his grain and all of the cotton and clover seed are being certified and sold for planting.

The assistant county agent says, "He has a brilliant mind and is valuable not only to the club but to his home and community." Harris is now a freshman at North Texas Agricultural College.

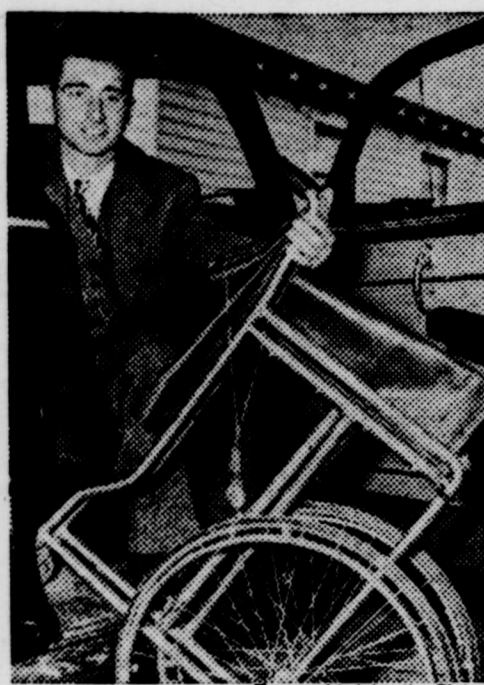

A frequently-quoted declaration is that of Mirabeau B. Lamar. The statement is usually given as, "Cultivated mind is the guardian genius of democracy . . . It is the only dictator that freemen acknowledge and the only security which freemen desire." The omitted part is, however, highly important for it qualifies the statement. Here the first part of the quotation is, including the part usually left out:

"Cultivated mind is the guardian genius of democracy and, while guided and controlled by virtue, the noblest attribute of man."

Napoleon had a cultivated mind — and plunged the world into war and untold suffering. Education without the ennobling influences of character, without the recognition of the duty we owe to others—in short without Christianity is only a training of the mind and not of the heart. "Cultivated mind" should be "guided and controlled by virtue."

A true happening that is more amazing than fiction:

During World War I, a group of soldiers on a troop ship en route to France sat around talking. None knew any of the others beyond a nickname, "Bill" or "Joe" or "Tex." One of them said:

Crop Insurance To Be Available Again In 1947

From W. H. Hamil, Secretary of the Dickens County PMA office, comes word that Federal Crop Insurance on cotton will be available again for the 1947 crop and he says that his office will begin taking applications this week and continue up to January 31, which is the closing date.

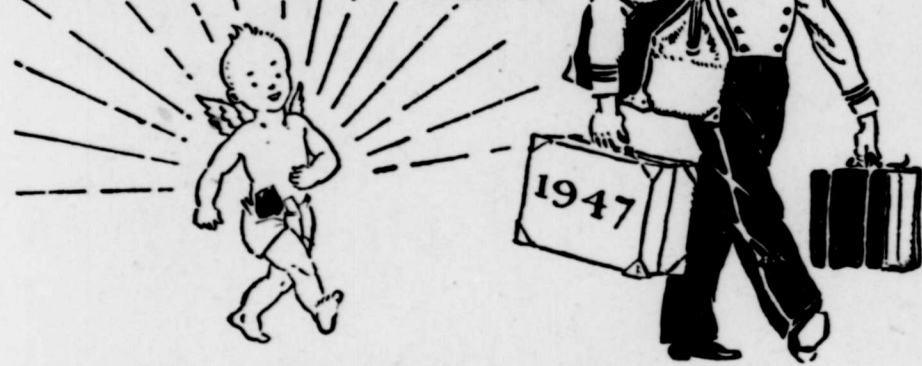
Mr. Hamil states that National participation in the Government Insurance program has almost reached the half-million mark, and promises to continue on the upswing as growers become more familiar with the advantages of the program. He says that the greatest prospective advantage the program offers is protection against widespread and recurrent crop failure, and that by extensive participation, farmers can offset the damage to both agriculture and business when disaster strikes.

According to Hamil, the grower has a choice of three different coverage levels, depending on how much coverage he wants, and on how much premium he wants to pay for the coverage. The net indemnity due, in case of loss, depends on how far along the crop is at the time of damage. The intention of the program is to protect the grower's investment in the crop, rather than to guarantee a specified cash return. Acreage on which the crop is destroyed may be released by the corporation and put to another use if it is too late to replant.

Hamil invites those interested to come to the county office and check the records for cost and coverage, and to discuss the provisions of the program. Applications will not be accepted until the grower has definitely received full information.

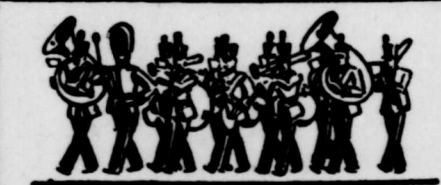

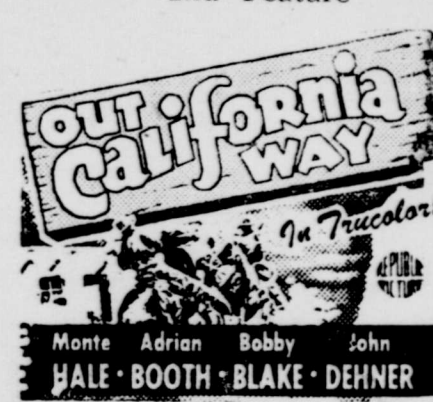

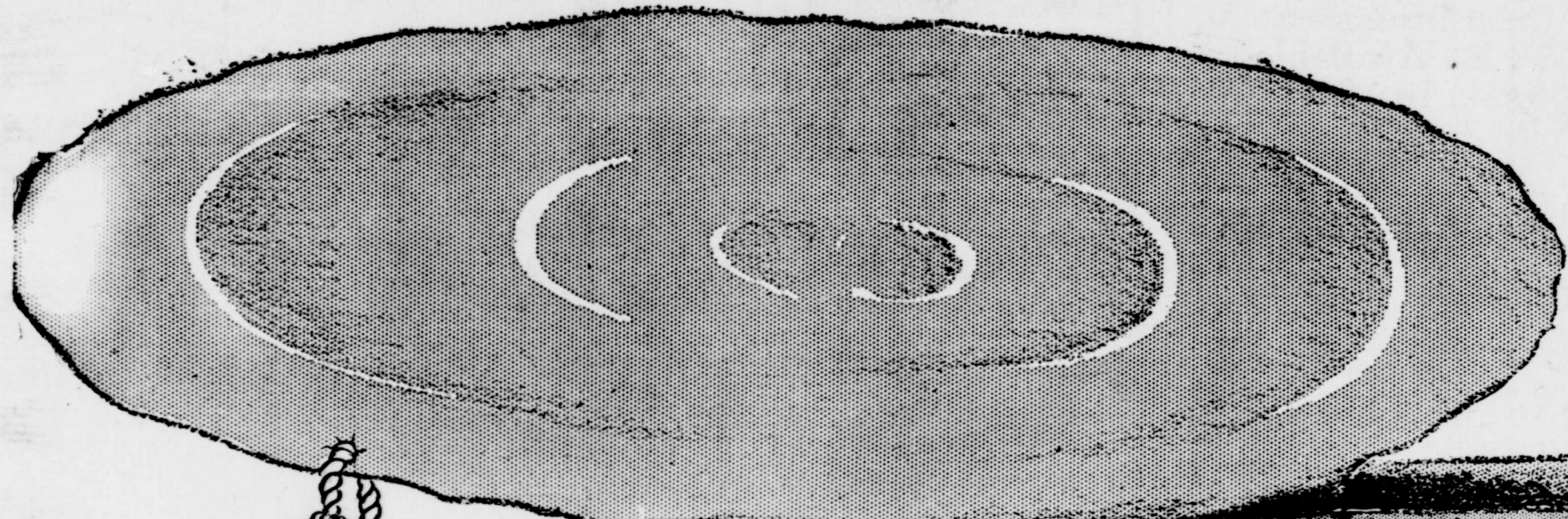
