Mrs. Barnett Is Buried At Girard Wednesday

Funeral services were held Wednesday afternoon, February 5 at 2 o'clock at the Church of Christ in Girard for Mrs. Ada Mae Barnett, 75, who died Monday, February 3 in a Fort Worth hospital after an long illness. C. V. Allen of Spur officiated.

Mrs. Barnett who was married to W. F. Barnett, October 30, 1889 in Cornal county, moved to Kent county in 1915 and made her home in Girard until recent years. She was born July 29, 1871 and was converted early in life and was affiliated with the Church of Christ.

Surviving her are two sons, Floyd Barnett of Spur, and Wallace Barnett of Post, one daughter, Mrs. Raymond Turner of Fort Worth and an adopted daughter, Mrs. Clara Teague of California.

Pallbearers were Henry Stiles, C. M. Cooper, B. J. Kellet, D. J. Young, M. A. Darden and C. Ray Williams.

Interment was in the Girard cemetery with Campbell Funeral Chapel in charge of arrangements.

WHEAT PASTURES FURNISH 84-DAY GRAZING IN EXPERIMENT PROGRAM

Data Shows Results Of Experiment At Station Here

The wheat pastures at the Experiment Station at Spur, which were planted early in September for grazing purposes, furnished excellent grazing for an 84-day period beginning November 8 and ending January 31. A total gain of 11,302 pounds was made during that period by 42 steer calves and 24 yearling steers on 156 acres planted with wheat and various sorghums which are grazed in combination. The average daily gain on each of these pastures up to January 31 is shown in the following table:

Wheat, red top cane, 10 calves, 2.05 pounds, daily average gain;

Wheat, no sorghum, 8 calves, 2.03 pounds.

Wheat, sweet sudan, 13 calves, 1.79 pounds.

Wheat, Martin milo stubble, 11 calves, 2.03 pounds.

Wheat, no sorghum, 7 yearlings, 2.20 pounds.

Wheat, sweet sudan, 6 yearlings, 1.89 pounds.

Wheat, Martin milo stubble, 6 yearlings, 2.29 pounds.

Wheat, red top cane, 5 yearlings, 2.33 pounds.

Spur Cub Scouts Enjoy Barbecue Sunday Afternoon

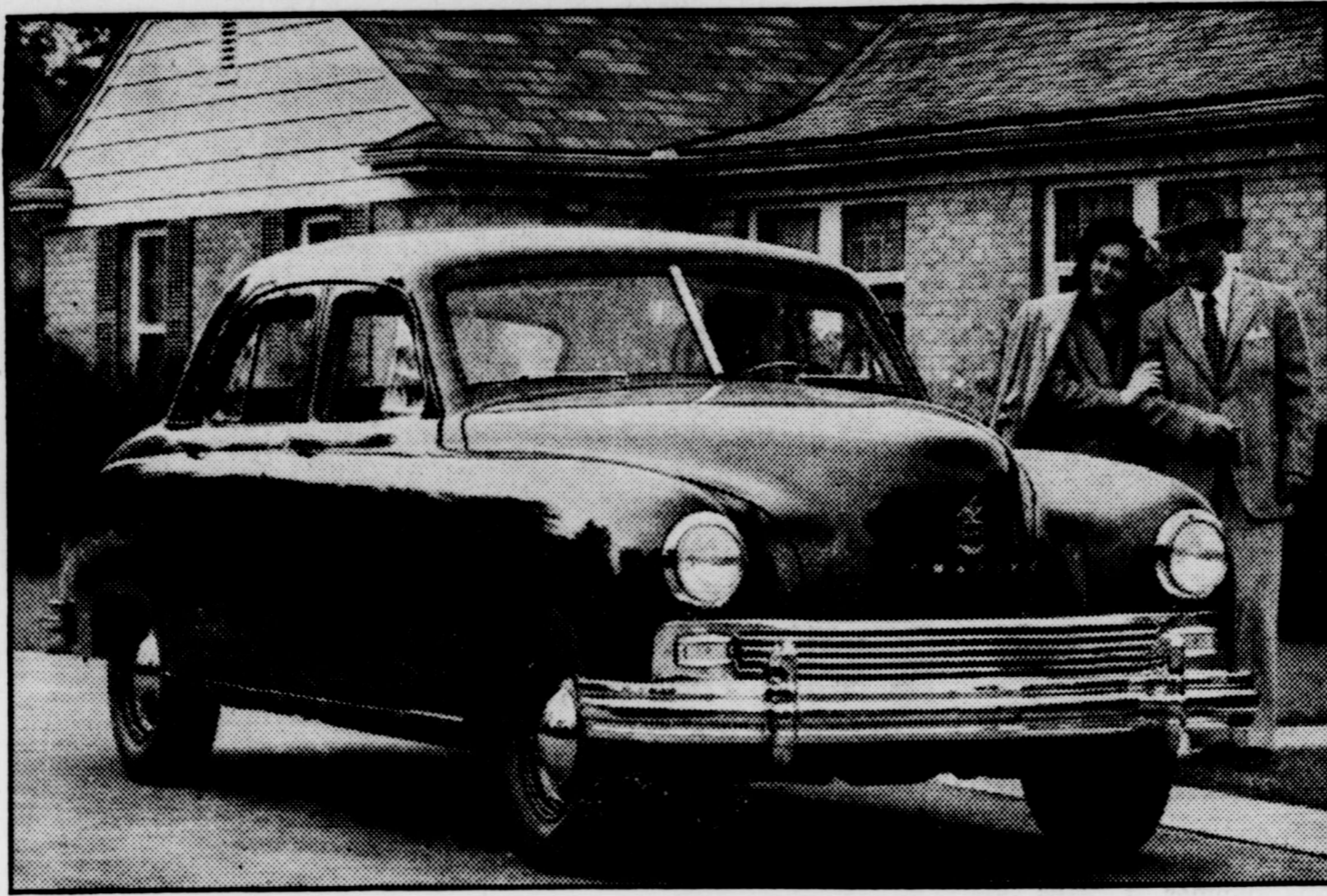
The Cub Scouts of Spur were complimented last Sunday afternoon with a barbecue at the Cecil Estep home.

Frazer Automobile To Be Shown Here Saturday

Now on public display here for the first time, the Frazer automobile is powered by a 100-horsepower, six-cylinder Continental engine developed by Continental and Graham-Paige Motors engineers. Of L-head design, the high-compression engine has aluminum alloy pistons with a displacement of 226 cubic inches, and a bore and stroke of 3 5-16 and 4 3-8 inches, respectively. The compression ratio is 7.3:1.

An overdrive, providing a smoother, quieter ride with great-

er fuel economy, will be available as optional equipment on the Frazer. Other mechanical features of the new automobile include a forged counter-weighted crankshaft with four main bearings, rubber engine mountings and automatic choke. The S. A. E. horse-power is 26.3.

Mechanically conventional, the Frazer nevertheless embodies extensive improvements on the features which have made the American automobile the best in the world.

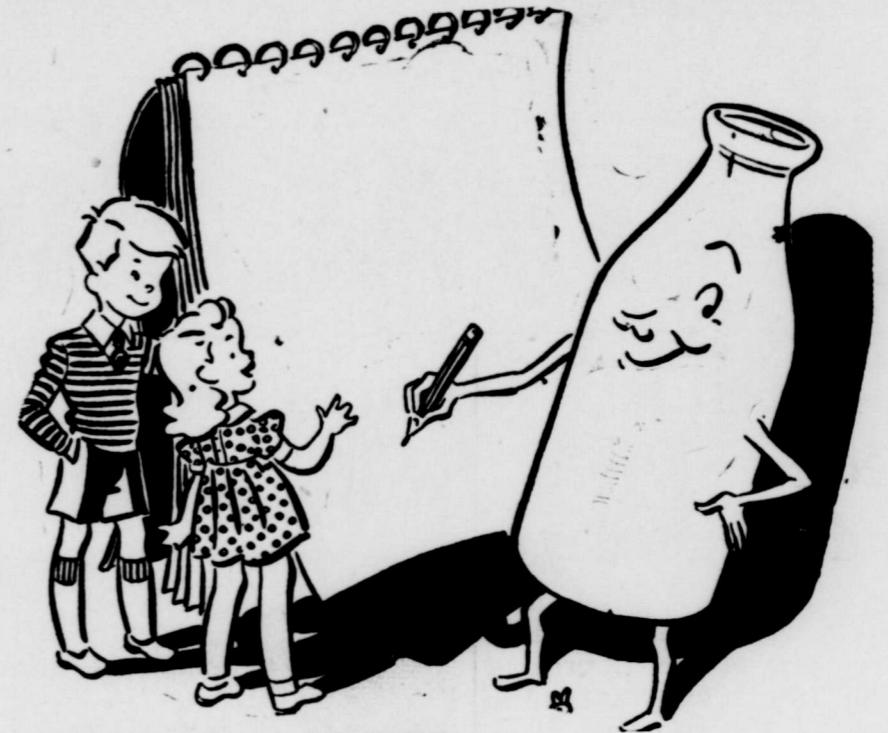

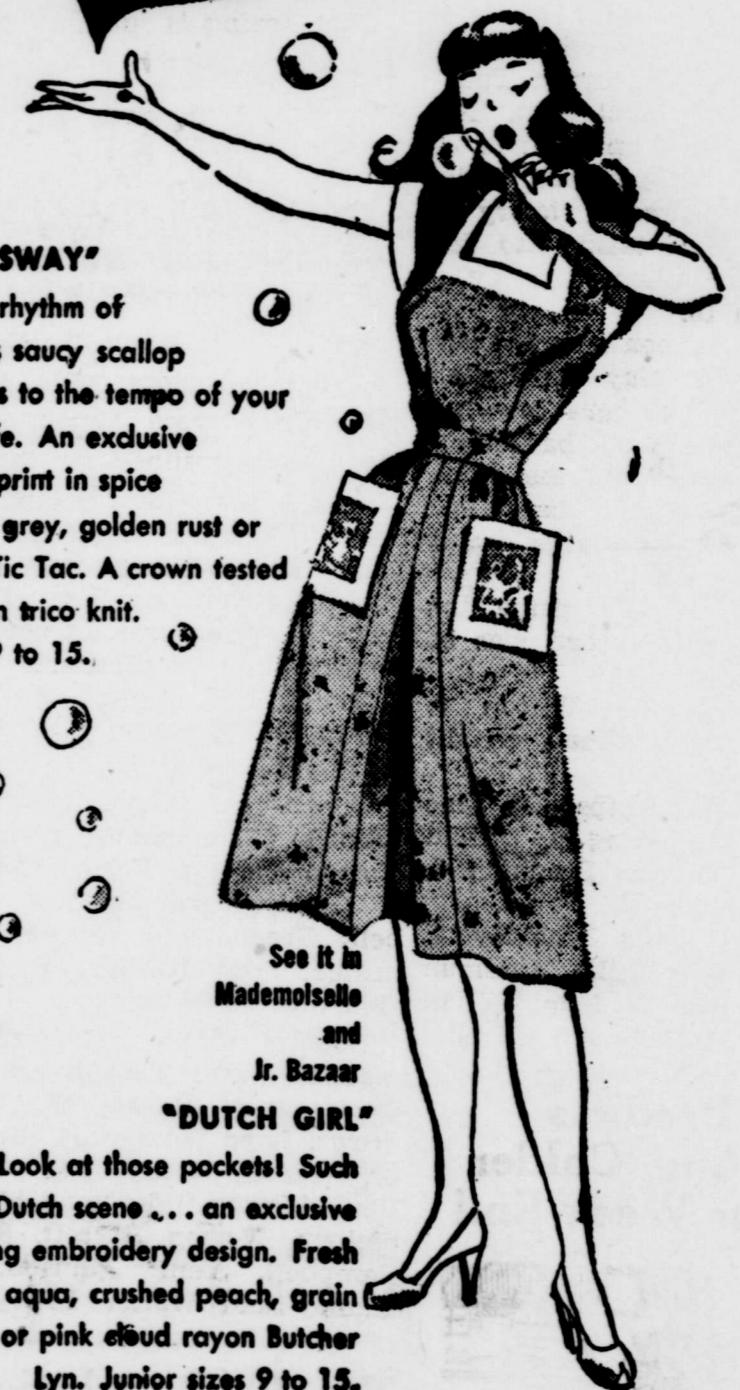

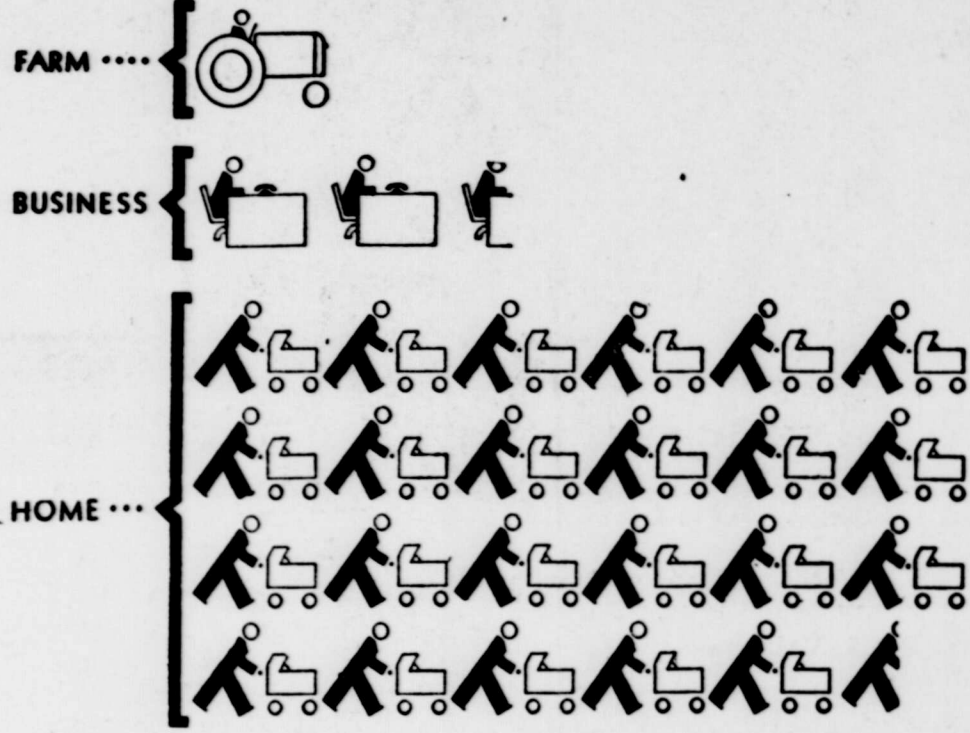

SIDELIGHTS FROM WASHINGTON

A number of cattlemen from the Southwest have recently come to Washington to ask the Government to protect their herds from the foot and mouth disease that has broken out in Mexico. The disease is the most dreaded affecting livestock. Mexico, over our protest, imported some Brahma bulls from Brazil last fall, and from these imported cattle the disease got its start in Mexico. The foot and mouth disease spreads easily and attacks cattle, hogs, sheep and goats.

A wide-spread infection in the Southwest would cost livestock producers millions of dollars and upset the economy of the whole area. Officials in the Department of Agriculture have convinced me that the threat is a real one, and I have joined with others here in the campaign to get appropriate action as soon as possible.

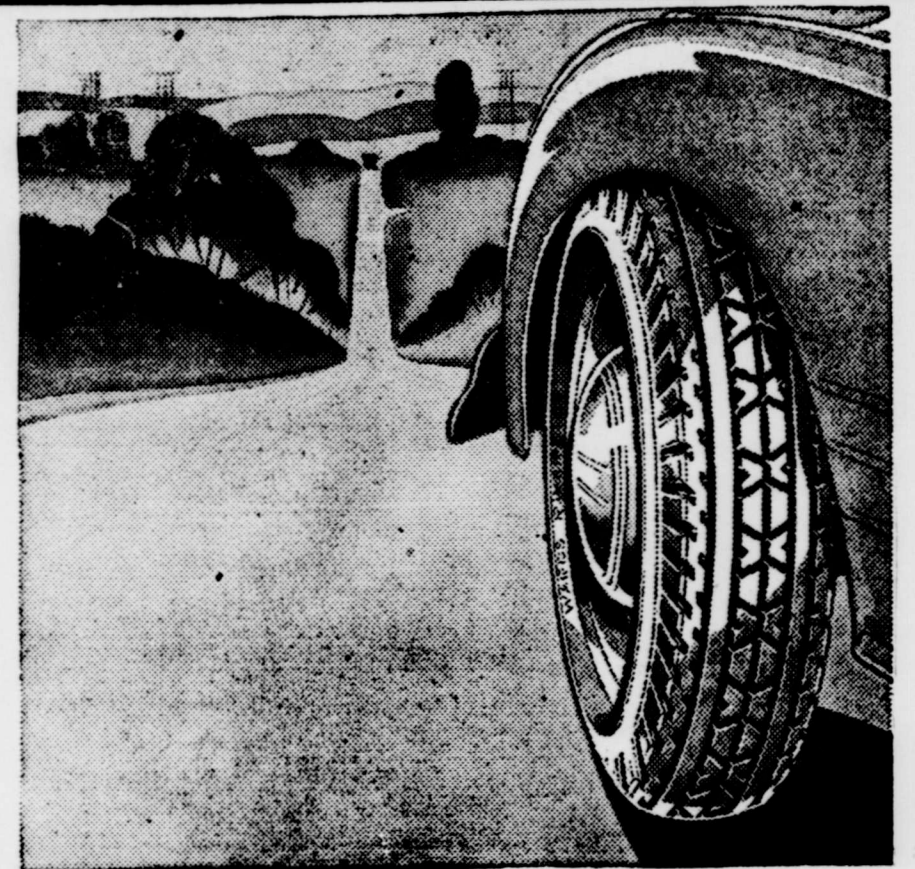
The threat of the spread of this disease into Texas and other Border States is so serious that the problem was considered last week at the President's Cabinet meet-

ing. Cooperation between Mexico and the United States is urgently required, and it is hoped that the good-will flight of President Truman to Mexico early in March will expedite plans for combating the disease.

Already experts of Animal Industry are cooperating with Mexico in an eradication campaign, and it now appears that considerable U. S. money may have to be spent to arrest the spread of the disease and protect Texas livestock. I have promised cattlemen to support an emergency appropriation when the request comes before the House Committee on Appropriations. Money well spent to stop the disease south of the Border would be wisely spent, despite the present urgent necessity for economy in Government.

I asked the Bureau of the Budget last week to approve a request made by the Geological Survey for additional funds for a more intensive study of underground water in west Texas. The program also embraces water studies in other areas and states. The chances are good the Budget Bureau will approve the request and send it to the House Appropriations Committee for consideration. I hope the Congress will act favorably.

Legislative action in the House last week included passage of a bill sponsored by the Republicans

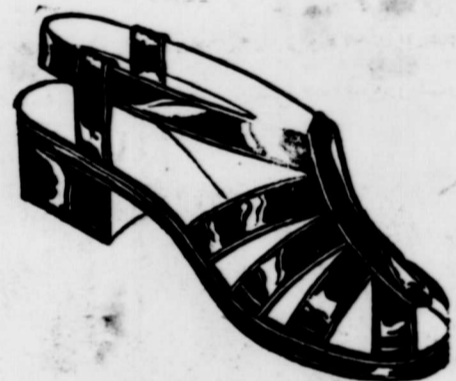

at Andy Botkin's Garden Tavern—over a friendly glass of beer.

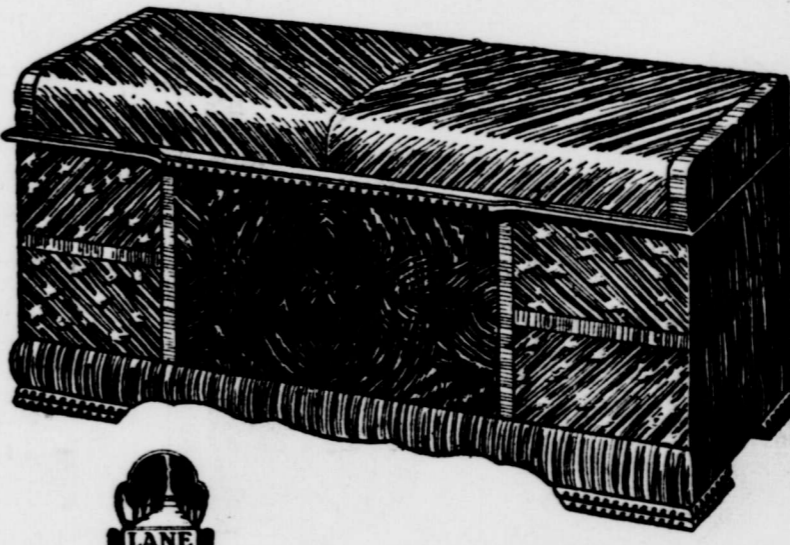

Duck Creek Soil Conservation District News Notes

Many cooperators of the Duck Creek Soil Conservation District are reporting that the rye plantings made on deep blow sand last fall are getting the job done in keeping the land from blowing as well as furnishing ample grazing for their livestock. James B. Reed intends to keep a record on the grazing his rye gives in order to compare it with that furnished by other small grain. Reed states that from all indications livestock prefer the rye to wheat. "My livestock has to cross wheat to get to the rye and they are not paying any attention to the wheat." Lloyd Johnson reports that the sand blew some on his land he has planted to rye. He said, "Next fall I am going to plant my rye in September instead of November, and one bushel per acre instead of one-half bushel per acre, and I believe it will do much better."

Several neighbors of W. S. Smiley got together at Smiley's home last week to make a concentrated effort to get conservation work done on their farms. About 15 miles of terrace lines were scheduled to be run and kept until they could get equipment to construct the terraces. The supervisors of the district appreciate the efforts of these individual farmers because such get-togethers as these help to facilitate carrying on the work of the district.

Jim Barron signed a cooperative agreement with the district to carry on a well-rounded conservation program on the Spur Headquarters Ranch. Barron is clearing and putting into cultivation several hundred acres of pasture land. He is to be commended for the forethought of plowing up only that land that is suitable for cultivation. With the help of the technicians of the Soil Conservation Service, he is

putting into cultivation only that land that can be kept in good productive state with the minimum of conservation work.
