MARCH OF DIMES

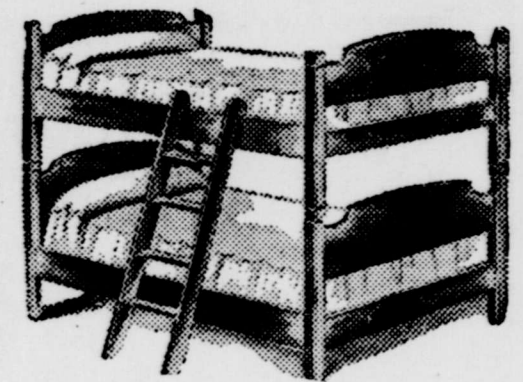
