

Mayor Lawis Lee stated formally this week that he was not a candidate for re-election to the office of Mayor for a third term. He cited the old Democratic principle of "two terms" as stated that he had sincerely enjoyed serving as Mayor of the city, but would not be a candidate for election again on April

# **Production Credit** Ass'n. Retires Govt. Capital

HOUSTON-Eleven of the 36 production credit associations in Texas have practically completed the job of returning their Government capital to the U.S. Treasury, according to President Virgil P. Lee of the Production Credit Corporation of Houston. The Government now has only \$5,000 investment in these associations, which formerly had from \$200,000 to \$6,00,000 of Government capital. Over a period of 13 years these Government funds have been replaced by capital and surplus owned by farmers and ranchmen who are members of the associations, he said.

Definate plans have been made by the remainder of the production credit associations in Texas to finish paying out by the end of 1947. Nearly 30,000 Texas farmers and ranchmen now own \$9,245,105 of capital and surplus in the 36 associations, which made loans for more than \$85,000,000

during 1946. The Stamford Production Credit Association, which serves Dickens, King, Knox, Stonewall. Haskell, Jones, Shackelford, and part of Kent Counties, is one of the eleven which are no longer endent upon Government cap ital. Members have finished the job by buying extra stock back in 1944 and 1945. President J. B. Pumphrey of Old Glory says that 1,619 farmers and ranchmen now own more than \$360,000 of capital and surplus in the association. Mr. Pumphrey says that, in addition to the headquarters at Stamford, the association maintains offices at Spur, Anson, Aspermont, Haskell and Munday.


