Mr. Gus Geissler, Manager of the Corporation, explained that on account of heavy losses, funds to redeem the certificates of those who participated in last year's program had been e hausted. Of those entitled to callect on their 1946 cotton instrance, 45 per cent remain unp id. To make these additional yments, it is estimated that a total of 18 million dollars will be required. Mr. Geissler says that a Congressional appropriation of this amount will be necessary before outstanding certificates can be honored. The Corporation will continue to accept certificates,

The Republican Party is not greatly concerned about the southern cotton producer, and in view of the Republican leadership in the House and Senate, there will be difficulty in getting prompt action. However, most people with whom I have conferred agree that the necessary money will eventually be forthcoming. Action should be taken and the uncertainty removed as soon as possible.

The theory of crop insurance is good, but I have never felt that a workable program has been devised. I think nearly all cotton growers share that feeling. Indeed, not more than 11 per cent of the nation's cotton farmers have thought well enough of the cotton insurance program offered them on any given year to participate in it.





These benefits to customers will depend, too, on uninterrupted production at reasonable wage levels. This is not a program that can be carried out if it is hampered by strikes or work stoppages.



#### **Cotton Continues** To Climb On Southwest Markets

Hogs fell, while cattle and lambs lost ground at some markets last week according to the Production & Marketing Administration, U. S. Department of Agriculture. Some vegetables weakened, too, but other southwest farm products held steady to strong.

Grains emerged strong from another week of wide fluctuations with net gains of mostly 5 to 25 cents. No. 1 hard wheat closed Friday at \$3 per bushel, bulk, carlot, at Fort Worth and Galveston; and corn \$2.03 for No. 2 white, and \$1.91 for No. 2 yellow. Sorghums rose to \$3.03 to \$3.08 per hundred pounds.

Continued good demand for eggs and poultry held prices firm. Week's egg prices averaged 36 cents per dozen at Amarillo and San Antonio; 36 1-2 to 37 1-2 at Denver; 41 at Shreveport and Houston; and 37 1-2 to 38 1-2 at Fort Worth, Dallas, and New Orleans.

Cattle ruled generally steady to strong for the week at Texas markets, but most slaughter classes dropped unevenly lower at Oklahoma City and Denver. Week's bulk of common to medium steers and yearlings brought \$12 to \$17 at Houston; while low to average medium kinds moved at \$17 to \$19 at San Antonio. Medium and good slaughter steers and yearlings turned at \$17 to \$23.50 at Fort Worth; \$18.50 to \$23.50 at Oklahoma City; \$18.50 to \$22.50 at Wichita;




