

#### Construction To **Be Started Next** Week On Camp.


Estimates on the cost of construction of a migratory labor camp are now being made and actual construction of the camp is expected to be under way in the near future.

#### KEEP PET ON LEASH, **AVOID RABIES SCARE**

For want of a leash a "rabies epidemic" is born.

Thus the Gaines Dog Research Center, New York City, sums up what is probably the least-comprehended fact about rabies. It explains it as follows:

If every dog-owner kept his pet on a leash at all times, there would be no possibility of his straying away. If he did not stray away, there would be no opportunity for him to get into trouble by fighting with other dogs or snapping at strangers who might attempt to pet or tease him. If he did not snap at strangers, the cry of "Mad Dog!" would not likely be raised, of Mrs. Bud Morrison and had there would be no excitement or planned an overnight visit with hysteria culminating in a "rabies epidemic" and the summary execution of many animals.

According to the Center, true rabies is a relatively uncommon disease. In a typical year, in the entire United States, only 7,000 dogs are affected. Rabies is no more prevalent in summer than in winter but you hear more about rabies in summer because men and animals mingle more freely outdoors in hot weather. A really rabid dog flies forward aimlessly but does not attack unless pro-voked or annoyed. Preventive rabies vaccines are available at veterinarians, though their effec-tiveness is still a matter of debate.

#### **Grow Perennial Flowers From Seed**

You can save considerable garden money and add new zest to your ardening by growing your own perennial flowers from seed. The best quality seeds cost only a few cents a packet and with simple care will produce scores of plants to bring color and beauty to the garden for years to come. Most perennials grown from seed bloom the second year after sowing.

Seed should be started at about the same time as that of the annuals, such as zinnias and marigolds. The secret of success is to get the seedlings to transplanting size early enough so that when set in their permanent places in garden or border, they will get a good roothold before cold weather comes on

A specially prepared seed bed or seed box is best for starting perennial seeds. A seed bed can be easily prepared by knocking the bottom out of a good-sized shallow wooden box and sinking the sides into the ground. The top should be about two or three inches above the surface. Use finely prepared, crumbly that beginners can start from seed garden loam containing plenty of with almost sure success: Columhumus. 


