## FIRST VETERANS VOCATIONAL TRAINING CLASS FORMED

### Farm Training Program Under G. I. Bill

Dickens county veterans educational program will begin an initial class in general farming courses, it was announced this week, following organization of the program recently at a meeting held at the Court House in Dickens. The program is set up for a 36 months period for agriculturally inclined veterans who are operating a farm and have been approved for the training by the regional Veterans Administration office in Lubbock. Eighty-four per cent of those enrolled in the class are married men and 32 per cent are drawing disabled benefits. One member of the class is blind. Ages of class members ranges from 23 to 44 years.

Veterans drawing other benefits such as Readjustment, unemployment, on-the-job-training are not eligible to enroll for Vocational Educational training until other benefits are dropped. However, if the veteran is drawing other benefits and will be interested in future enrollment, he
