BIG CROWD ATTENDS AMERICAN LEGION BARBECUE AT DICKENS

Money Derived Will Help Complete **Hut Construction**

A large crowd attended a barbecue given Monday evening by the Dickens American Legion Post at the Legion hut in Dickens. A crowd estimated at approximately 250 people enjoyed the delicious West Texas barbecue served by Legion members. About \$115.00 was derived from the event that will be used to complete construction of the Legion Hut.

The Dickens American Legion post was organized last October and has a membership of thirythree veterans. Most of the members live in the Dickens community while a number are from the Glenn and Dumont communities. Officers of the post are: Carl Baker, Commander; W. H. Hamil, Adjutant; John Sharp, Vice Commander; E. V. Arthur, Chaplain; Earl Murchison, Sergeant-at-arms; J. L. Green, Post Historian; F. H. Bostick, Finance Officer; L. J. Varnell, Jr., Service Officer and Ira Copass, Child Welfare officer.

The legion meets at the hut, located on a hill just east of Dickens. Meeting date is every first Monday and considerable interest is being shown in activities of the organization by its Banquet Speaker members.

The hut is a one-room building of native stone construction and, when completed, will contain a shower room, a stage and other facilities necessary for an adequate meeting place. The interior of the building is also of native stone. The hut was built under the sponsorship of the city of Dickens and is used by Boy scouts as well as the American Legion. The Legion post is sponsors of the Dickens Boy Scout troop.

At the meeting Monday night, the legion officers expressed regrets for the illness of C. C. Haile of Afton. Mr. Haile recently donated a line-bred Hereford bull from his registered herd, to the Dickens American Legion post and the Spur American Legion post to be auctioned. The officers also expressed appreciation to those who helped to put the barbecue on Monday and for those who attended.

FIELD DOG TRIAL HOLDS BIG THRILL FOR SPECTATOR

Provides Fascinating Demonstration of Canine Speed, Grace, Precision

Anyone who likes dogs or has an interest in sports will find many hours of relaxation and enjoyment in following field trials, states the Gaines Dog Research Center, New York City.

A field trial might best be described as a public competition for hunting dogs. The main purpose is to encourage and set standards for the breeding and training of better hunting dogs. Aside from its more serious aims, the field trial provides unrivaled recreafor both participants and spectators.

Trials are held for almost every breed of sporting dog and hound on all kinds of small game. There are 27 breeds which are eligible for trials. Some trials limit contestants to representatives of one breed exclusively, as, for instance, Beagle trials in which the game pursued is rabbit or hare. Most retriever trials are open to several breeds such as Labrador, Golden and Chesapeake Bay Retrievers, to name but a few.
