WATER WELL BEING DRILLED TO AUGMENT CITY SUPPLY

Capacity Of City System To Reach Million Gallons

The proclamation is a tribute to 338,000 dairy farmers in Texas who own 1,400,000 milch cows, valued at \$150,000,000 and which produced four and one-half billion pounds of milk in 1946 with a net value of \$100,000,000. During the past 20 years Texas has advanced from twentieth to eighth place in value

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Twenty Dairy Herd Improve- Cotton Insect Texas now, involving 8,213 Situation In Texas

> Boll weevils remain in low numbers in the lower Rio Grande Valley and Coastal Bend area, but are causing damage in Victoria, Jackson and Wharton counties of the Upper Coastal area and in some fields of Madison county in the Trinity River bottom of East Texas. Flea hoppers flave increased

in most of the coastal counties during the week, These insects are transferring from horsemint to cotton. A still further increase may be expected as the horsemint matures and ceases to be attractive to the flea hopper.

No leaf worms have been reported to date.

Lower Rio Grande Valley Early planted cotton is fruiting heavily and cotton insect infestations are generally light. Of 411 fields inspected only 7 had weevil infestations above 10 percent. Five were in Cameron and 2 in Starr County.

Coastal Bend Area-Weevil infestations averaged 4 per cent in Kleberg.(Duval, Nueces, San Patricio and Jim Wells Counties The numbers of flea hoppers Pretty Lauta Averett of Ashburn, Ga., holds a mahogany serving plate which has been beautified with the addition of a bright lit of cotton fabric. The manufacturer inlays the plate with fabric and then seals it with a permanent finish. found per 100 terminals in these counties were: Kleberg 5, Duval 21, Nueces 9, San Patricio 5 and im Wells. 20.

Upper Coastal Area-Weevil in festations averaged 19 per cone in 15 fields of Victoria. Jackson and Wharton Counties. Two fields Victoria were between 25 and 50 per cent, and 1 field in Wharton was above 50 per cent. Flea hoppers increased during the week from an average of 13 per 100 terminals to 20 with a high increase noted in Calhoun County. It is recommended that growers in this area inspect their fields often and that heavily in-fested fields be dusted as soon as possible with 5 per cent DDTsulphur.

Central Texas- Grasshoppers continue abundant in some of the river bottom fields. Weevils remain low. Flea hoppers at present are in small numbers, but are slowly increasing in Burleson and McLennas Counties.

South Plains Area- Lubber grasshoppers are numerous and moving into cultivated crops in Cochran, Hockley. Howard, Lubbock and Terry Counties.

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

On S. W. Markets Last Week

(USDA)-Southwest farm marstrong last week, but easiness tonio; while good and according to the Production and Marketing Administration, U. S. Denver. Department of Agriculture

Movement of new crop wheat, oats, and barley had gotten well under way and trade sources expected sorghums to join the paade in two or three weeks. Wheat prices sagged steadily, and lost about 20 cents per bushel, Doris. closing at \$2.25 Friday. Corn and sorghums advanced ents, while oats and changed very little.

Low market stocks onsisted chiefly of packaged lots the hands of retailers. Feed markets showed a stronger tone ast week, with higher prices and for oilseed meals feeds. Southwest alfalfa growers had about finished the first cutting. Most peanu areas enjoyed favorable conditions for the growing crop and for late planting. Texas wool sold from 473 to 52c per pound grease basis.

Cotton scored market net advances again last week despite late easiness. Good spot demand for the better grades brought only scant offerings. Most crop
