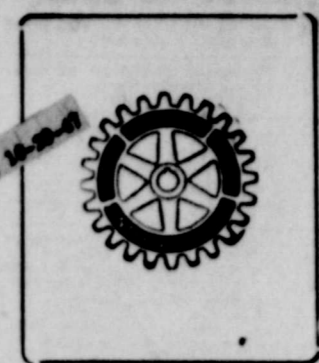

#### Youth Program In Full Swing During Week

More than 100 boys and girls enjoyed a free swim last Thursday at the municipal pool here, as a part of the youth recreational program of the city. The swimming event was held under the supervision of Coach Hawkes and another free swim is being planned for July 3rd.

The free swimming is given to boys and girls who are participating in other phases of the youth recreational program, Coach Hawkes stated. ### BROADWAY TO BIG BEND HIGHWAY ASS'N. TO MEET IN AUSTIN JULY 30

Texas And Okla. Hiway Commissions To Be Honored

Plans have been made by the Broadway to the Big Bend Highway Association to honor the Texas and Oklahoma Highway Commissions at a dinner in Austin July 30th at 7:30 p.m. Judge Klimer B. Corbin, President of the association, announced Monday.

It is expected that 150 members, composed of Commissioners Courts, Chamber of Commerce officials, and business men from the counties and cities through which the proposed road passes will be in attendance. Judge Corbin also stated that invitations were being mailed to Governor Turner of Oklahoma and Governor Jester of Texas to be present at the dinner.

A hearing before the Highway Commission on the following day has been scheduled by the Association and at which time the Oklahoma Commission will appear in behalf of the proposed road.

The Oklahoma Commission has already given the road state designation across the entire state of Oklahoma, Judge Corbin said.

Governor Miramantes of Chihuahua has also been invited to attend the hearing. The purpose of the hearing is to request the Texas Highway Commission to give the Texas segment state designation.

Judge Corbin has also requested that Chas. W. Roberts, Secretary-Manager of the Association be notified as soon as possible the number that will attend the dinner from each county and city.

#### Total Of 139 Cars Shipped From Local Yards

A total of 272,950 bushels of wheat have been shipped from the Spur elevators up to Wednesday noon, according to J. R. McNeill, manager of Kimmel Milling Company here. The wheat shipments totaled 139 railroad cars and twenty-two additional car loads was in storage tanks of the local elevator company at noon Wednesday.

Nine cars arrived at 3:00 o'clock Wednesday afternoon and these were expected to be loaded and ready for shipment at noon Thursday. Additional cars were expected Thursday.

Wheat prices here stood at \$1.86 per bushel at noon Wednesday, and according to reports, this was 11c per bushel higher than prices being paid at some places on the Texas plains. The price has stood at \$1.86 here for more than a week.

Harvesting is nearing completion in some parts of the county, but there is a great deal of grain yet to be harvested. Mr. McNeill stated Wednesday. It is expected that wheat shipments from here will total approximately 200 railroad cars before harvesting has been completed. Most of the grain should be harvested in this area within the next week, but a considerable quantity of wheat is expected to be shipped through local elevators from the plains

**Farm Products Prices Steady On S. W. Markets**

Fruits and vegetables showed general easiness last week, and some cattle prices dropped, but most other southwest farm products remained steady to strong, according to the Production and Marketing Administration, U. S. Department of Agriculture.

Grains found generally good demand last week. Wheat, oats and yellow corn stayed about unchanged. Barley, white corn, and old crop sorghums showed some strength, with advances limited to 3 to 6 cents. A little new crop milo from South Texas came on the market at several cents per hundred lower than the old crop.

Milled rice stocks remained quite limited last week, and only scattered cars sold. Good rains throughout southwest peanut producing areas aided crop prospects. Rainy weather interfered with making but improved pastures and reduced demand for hay. Seven to ten million pounds of Texas wools sold in the past ten days. Growers received 42 to 45 cents per pound grease basis for average to good staple.

Daily ups and downs of cotton prices left quotations \$1 per bale lower to \$3.25 higher. Spot markets saw little trading. Crops looked unusually good in most areas.

Tomato prices dropped rapidly in East Texas last week. Late shipments sold mostly at \$2 per lug box for 6 by 6 and larger U. S. No. 1's, and \$1.75 for 6 by 7. North Texas points got mainly \$2.50 for the larger sizes. Wholesale product markets in the South and Central West showed general weakness. Tomatoes, cantaloups, watermelons, and early apples particularly felt the bearish pressure.

Egg markets continued firm last week, and poultry saw very little change. Most current receipt eggs brought 37 1/2 to 38 1-3 cents per dozen at Fort Worth, and Dallas paid 38 2-3 with the lots candled out. With warmer weather, dealers bought more eggs on candled grade. Best grade brought 45 at Fort Worth and 43 at Dallas.

Cattle showed general easiness at Oklahoma City and Denver last week, and some classes sold lower at other southwest terminals. Good calves brought mostly \$19 to \$21 at Houston, and top medium to average choice kinds \$19.50 to \$22.50 at San Antonio. Good and choice calves sold mainly at \$19.50 to \$22 at Fort Worth, and \$17 to \$20.50 at Wichita, Oklahoma City paid up to \$22 for a few choice heavy vealers and calves, while vealers topped at \$25 in Denver's late-week trade.

Hog markets ruled generally steady to 25 cents higher for the week, but sows lost around 50 cents at Oklahoma City. Fort Worth paid \$24.75 to \$25 for the closing bulk of good and choice medium weight butcher hogs, and Denver \$24.50 to \$25.25.

Closing top was \$24.50 at San Antonio, \$24.75 at Oklahoma City, and \$25 at Denver.

Most sheep and lamb markets gained 50 cents to \$1.00, but Oklahoma City closed steady to 50 cents lower. Good and choice spring lambs reached \$19 to \$21 at San Antonio, \$21 to \$23 at Fort Worth, \$22.75 to \$23.25 at Wichita, and \$23.75 to \$24 at Denver. Closing top at Oklahoma City was \$22.50.

**Tech Stadium Project Delayed By Fire Thursday**

LUBBOCK—Completion of the new stadium at Texas Technological College will be delayed three months as the result of a fire which wrecked most construction in the east stands, officials have been advised by Floyd Oldt, Dallas contractor in charge.

The blaze, late Thursday, burned oil soaked forms for concrete tiers which were to be poured Friday. Heat twisted, and cracked concrete and steel columns and ruined materials to be used in other sections. Standing portions have been condemned and must be removed before reconstruction of the wrecked area is started.

Oldt shifted workers to the west stands and said he is hopeful of completing work there and of having two of five east stand sections ready by fall. He said difficulty will be encountered in getting new pre-fabricated steel for the burned area without delay.

The east stand was to be used almost exclusively for students

of Texas Tech and gridiron opponents. Whether the new stadium or old Tech field will be used for games in the fall will not be determined for about two weeks, it was said.

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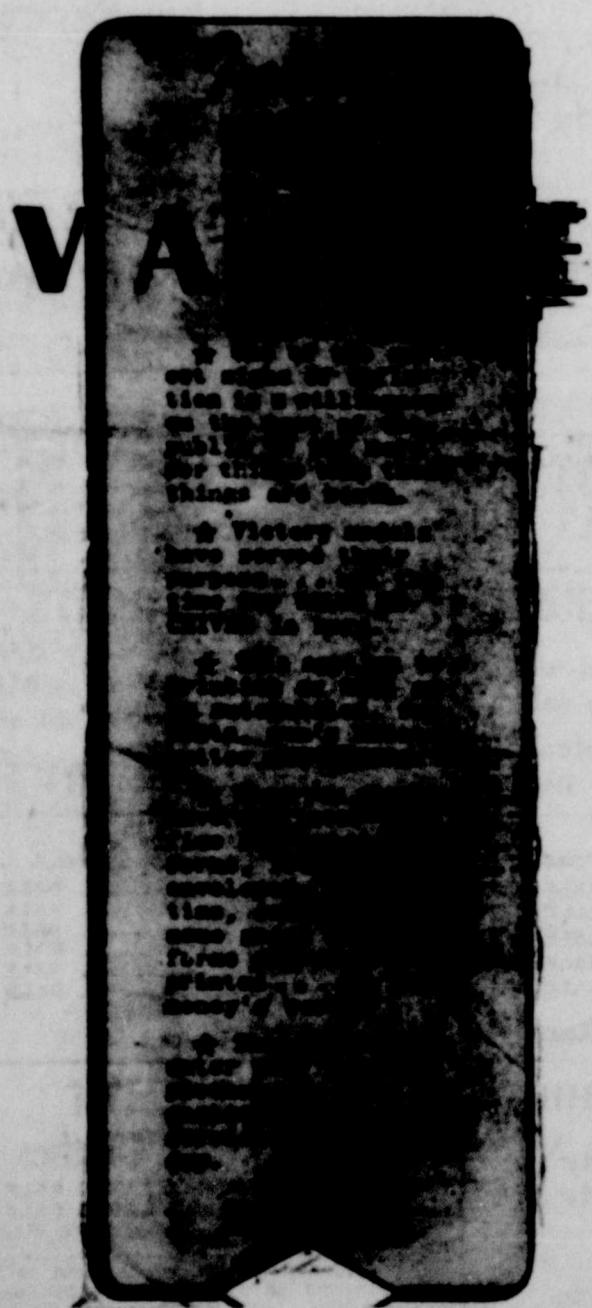

The U. S. government operates on a fiscal year basis which begins on July 1 of each year and ends June 30—not on a calendar year basis as is the case with most businesses. Therefore, the annual appropriation bills for the various government agencies must be passed by Congress and approved by the President prior to July 1, otherwise government agencies will lack the

funds with which to operate after July 1.

The present Congress has utterly failed to carry out the normal procedure of government. Only one of the 12 annual appropriation bills has passed both the House and Senate and been sent to the President for approval. A stop-gap measure has been passed authorizing the agencies to continue to operate on a temporary basis but they cannot pay their obligations.

Agencies which will lack funds with which to operate on July 1 include the Department of Agriculture, Veterans Administration, State Department, War and Navy Departments, Justice Department, in fact all government agencies except the Post Office and Treasury Departments.

This is being written on June 28. The chances are that within 15 days all the major appropriation bills will have cleared Congress and gone to the President for his signature. The House has passed all of them with one exception. The delay is in the Senate.

On the tax veto, Texans in the House voted 13 to 4 to sustain the President. On the Taft-Hartley Labor bill, Texans voted 15 to 3 to override the veto. I voted to sustain the President on the tax bill and to override the veto on the Taft-Hartley Bill.

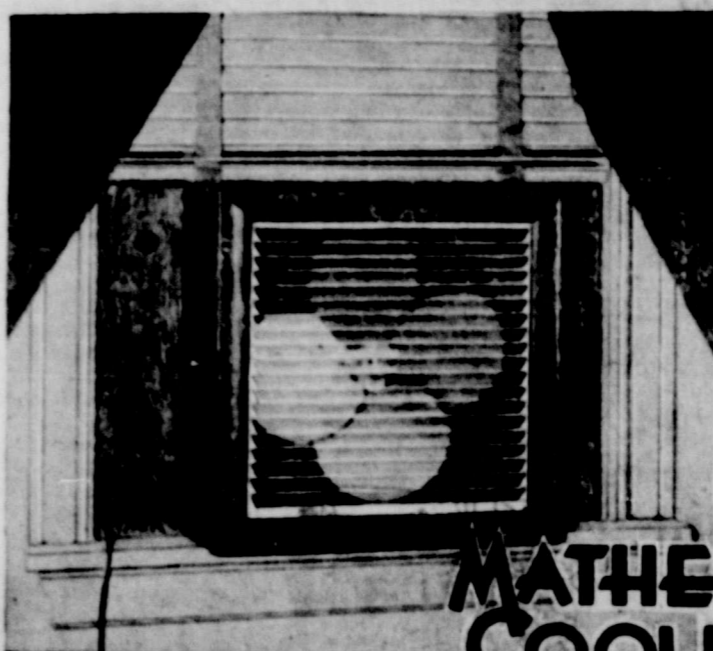

**VETERANS VOCATIONAL SCHOOL SHOWS PROGRESS**

The Dickens County Vocational School under the direction of the Dickens County School Board will enter a new school year July 1st, after completing a successful 4 months operation during the old year ending June 30th. 3 classes are now in operation training 46 veterans on the farm in General Farming are being held under the instruction of Koy L. Neeley, B. M. Young and Wm. W. Gregory. Other classes will be organized as the need arises in Agriculture, Distributive Education, Trades and Industries, and Homemaking. The essentials for class operation such as equipment, books, classrooms, and financial assistance have been definitely established with the Spur Security Bank as the Financial Agency. The 50th Legislative Body in recent Session in Austin passed Senate Bill Number 312, to enlarge the powers and duties of the County School Trustees so as to authorize such trustees to enter into contract with the State Board for Vocational Education for the purpose of operating, administering and maintaining special schools and classes for the benefit of Veterans of World War II. The Texas State Plan for the Training of Veterans in Vocational Education is the result of wide-spread demands on the part of returned veterans for a type of education which will rehabilitate and establish these veterans in their respective vocations and in their local communities. The plan has been written by the best authorities available in the vocational field. The object of these efforts has been to provide a sound program which would be flexible enough to be adopted in any Texas community, and which at the same time would provide regulations necessary for educational and administrative soundness for constructive program.

Students enrolling in new classes can be enrolled only at the beginning of each of the four week periods under the new contract after July 1st. This regulation will mean that any Veteran who has definite plans of entering training should contact the Co-ordinator in room 4 of the Spur Security Bank building a month in advance to entering classes and executing the necessary papers before enrollment. Be sure and bring with you a certified or photo-copy of your discharge papers. Veterans desiring to enter training for July should contact your co-ordinator this week, or you will have to wait until August. All Veterans should make an application for their eligibility for training regardless of when they plan to begin training.

An all day field trip is planned Friday for the Dickens county veterans at the Spur Agricultural Experiment Station. Local veterans are receiving their hand tools and pressure cookers for this year's farm program of operation.

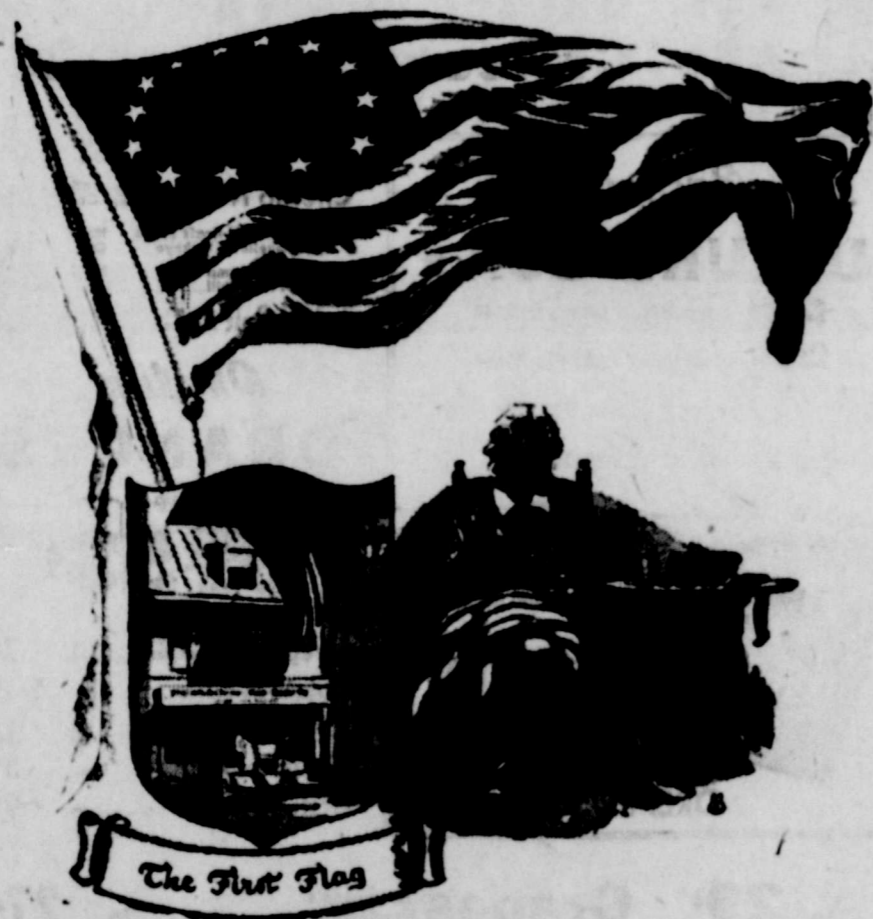


