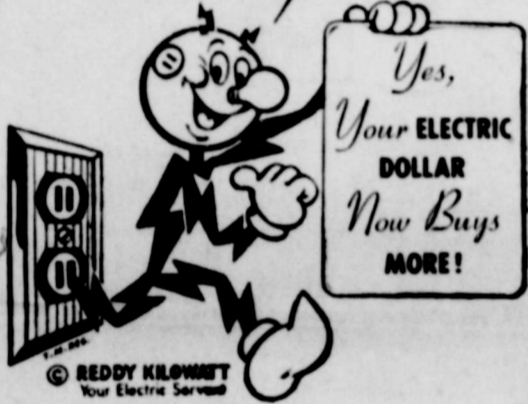

2. Bring opposite points up over (be sure not to use too much water.) and, overlapping them, seal well.

Place about 2-in. apart in a 9 x 13 x 2-in. baking pan. Pour hot Syrup (recipe below) around dumplings in baking pan. Bake immediately 45 to 45 minutes in hot oven (425°).

SYRUP

Boil together for 3 minutes: 1 cup sugar, 2 cups of water, 4 tbsp. butter, 1/4 tsp. cinnamon. For less rich syrup, use 1/2 cup each sugar and corn syrup, 2 tsp. butter, 1/4 tsp. cinnamon, and only 1 cup water. (Or use maple syrup.)

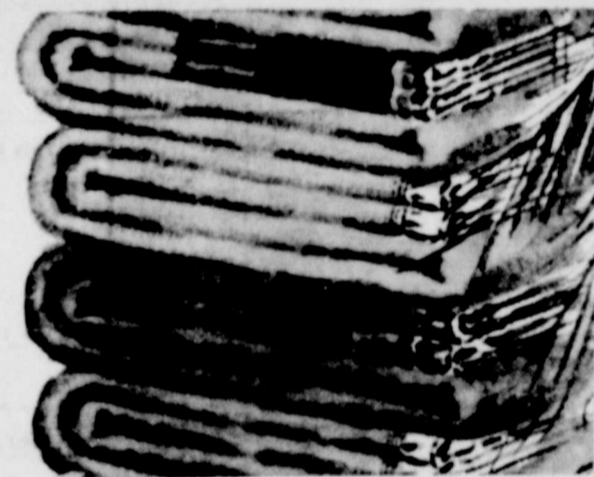

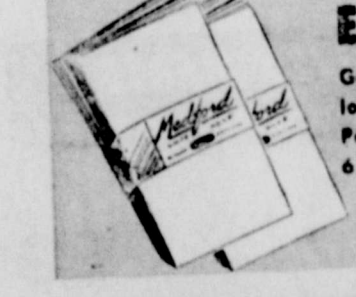
