I Give You Texas

By Boyce House



Col. Ray Leeman, who is in midst of his 11st year as executive vice president of the South Texas Chamber of Commerce, is a veteran of both World Wars and a pioneer of the automobile industry.

As Col. Ray Leeman sits, smiling and alert, at his desk in San Antonio, he has at his fingertips the pulse-beat of an empire. For 20 years, there probably has been no general movement for the advancement of South Texas which has not been launched or, at least, fostered by the South Texas Chamber of Commerce. Leeman aided in founding the 53-county organization in 1927 and has been executive head during its entire history.

Leeman has had a colorful career—veteran of both World Wars, race track driver, poet, pioneer of the automobile industry, civic leader.

He drove in the Glidden Tour, endurance contest for cars over highways (such as they were) and he raced on Oklahoma dirt tracks. His car crashed and a piece of railing was embedded in the daredevil's hip.

Leeman was born in Dallas in 1888, attended Castle Heights Military Academy in Tennessee and the University of Texas, where he was baritone in the glee club quartet. He became advertising manager for the Over-

land car, wrote the first full-page ad in auto history (it appeared in the Fort Worth Star-Telegram), invaded the Middle West where he launched a new automobile, the Henderson, with such fanfare it marked a publicity "high" in the industry's early annals.

The scene was Indianapolis, the day before the races—in fact, rivals said he practically "stole" the Speedway classic to exploit his new car. Mayor Lou Shank, famed for his fight on the "high cost of living", poured a sack of potatoes over the "prow", then scrawled the name on the hood with a pencil, five feet long. The machine then was to be driven into the lobby of a nearby hotel but the designer, at the wheel, caught Leeman's eye and whispered, "I can't start the blankety-blank thing."

Quick-thinking Leeman stepped back into the crowd and yelled, "Wait! Don't start it! Boys, let's get 'er into the hotel." With a whoop, a dozen men put their shoulders to the car and shoved it down the street. Next day, the papers said the crowd was so enthusiastic, it pushed the new machine in triumph into the hotel lobby.

Leeman enlisted in World War I, attended First Officers' Training Camp at Leon Springs (San Antonio), was a lieutenant and, later, captain in the glorious 90th Division, fighting in the St. Michael and Meuse-Argonne offensives, then serving in the army of occupation in Germany. He remained his interest in national preparedness, was a reserve officer taking part in maneuvers each year and, in World War II, was stationed at Fort Sam Houston, with the rank of lieutenant colonel.

Back in 1919, just out of the army, Leeman returned to his home town of Mineral Wells. A friend, rich from oil, bought a drug store and gave the veteran a half interest to run it. After a year, they sold out and Leeman became manager of the Chamber of Commerce there. He gained national recognition by enrolling 500 members and raising \$35,000 for an advertising campaign. He burst into verse about the marvelous mineral water—in fact, Leeman writes the rhymes on Christmas cards and composed a ballad, "The Checkered Flag," about a Speedway racer.

The West Texas Chamber of

Commerce was going to hold its convention in Mineral Wells so Leeman got busy and an auditorium, seating 5,000, was built. A few days before the convention, the city's biggest hotel burned down but all the 50,000 visitors had a place to sleep.

So impressed was the WTCC that the go-getter was made assistant manager, in charge of the San Antonio office. He conceived the idea of a South Texas organization, helped create it and has been at the helm ever since.

Accomplishments of the STCC are too numerous and well known for mention here—but the record is understandable when one considers the picturesque, achievement-studded background of its sparkplug, Col. Ray Leeman.

Postal Receipts Show 6 Per Cent Increase

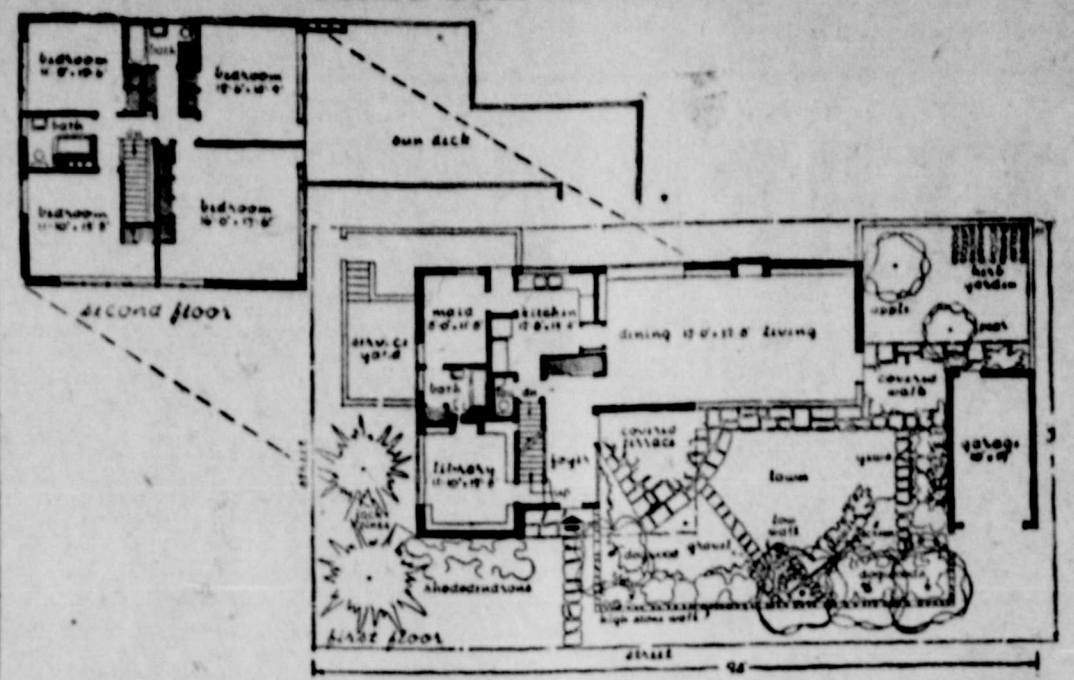
AUSTIN, Tex., Nov. 5—Postal receipts in Texas recovered their August decline in September, chalking up a 6 per cent monthly increase. The University of Texas Bureau of Business Research reported.

The Bureau's seasonally-adjusted index moved upward 3 per cent, since the gain was more than the usual August-to-September hike. The index stood at 214.7 to better its September 1946 mark by 14 per cent. (Base: 1935-39 equals 100.) Last year receipts dipped 6 per cent between August and September.

Receipts for the month totaled \$2,656,449 with small and medium-sized towns registering the greatest percent increases.

Army Ground Forces Offers New Career Opportunities

High school graduates who can qualify for enlistment in the Army Ground Forces will find attractive opportunities for career service in the Infantry, Artillery, or Armored Cavalry through a combination of leadership training and the Army's new pre-

lected school plan, Capt. Leonard Staffieri, Recruiting Officer said here today. Capt. Staffieri explained that all Army Ground Forces recruits who show potential leadership ability and average or superior intelligence are given an opportunity to qualify for a six-week Potential Leaders' Course, which prepares them for the responsibilities of noncommissioned officers and for officer candi-

date training. Although soldiers are enrolled for this leadership training program only after having demonstrated their potentialities during a period of basic military training, Capt. Staffieri said the pre-selected school plan makes it possible for qualified men to choose their own Army specialist training course even before they enlist. He explained that a man between the ages of 17 and 34, inclusive, with a high school edu-

cation or its equivalent, may choose, from among the Army's many career opportunities, two favorite fields of interest such as construction, crafts, mechanical, scientific-medical-technical, machine shop, or electrical and radio. In each of these fields he may indicate two specialist training courses he would like to take. If he is accepted for enrollment in one of these four courses and is satisfied with that course, he may then enlist in the Regular Army for three or more years with positive assurance that he will be assigned to the course he has chosen. Capt. Staffieri said this opportunity for qualified men to choose a specialist training course before enlisting was offered not only by the Army Ground Forces but also by the Army's Administrative and Technical Services and the United States Air Force. The Lubbock office of the U.S. Army and Air Force Recruiting Service, located at 203 Postoffice Building, will provide full information and application forms to qualified civilians interested in taking advantage of the pre-selected school plan, Capt. Staffieri said. He emphasized that the submission of an application for course enrollment does not commit an individual to enlist. Army Ground Forces schools in which courses are now open under the pre-selected school plan include the Artillery School at Fort Sill, Okla.; the Seacoast Branch of the Artillery School at Fort Winfield Scott, Calif.; the Armored School at Fort Knox, Ky.; and the Army Ground Forces Physical Training and Athletic Directors Course at Camp Lee, Va. Typical Army Ground Forces specialist courses in which prospective recruits may request enrollment, according to Capt. Staffieri, include the Motor and Truck Vehicle Maintenance Course at the Armored School; the Liaison Airplane and Engine Mechanic Course at the Artillery School; and the Submarine Mining Operations Course at the Seacoast Branch of the Artillery School. Capt. Staffieri explained that although only high school graduates or the equivalent can take advantage of the pre-selected school plan, men who do not meet this educational standard may enlist immediately in the Army and, after completing basic military training, apply for enrollment in any Army Ground Forces school. In addition to the schools listed above, the Army Ground Forces also operates the Infantry School at Fort Benning, Ga.; the Ground General School at Fort Riley, Kans.; and the Aircraft Artillery and Guided Missiles Branch of the Artillery School at Fort Bliss, Tex. He added that men who want to continue their high school or college education while they are in the Army may do so during

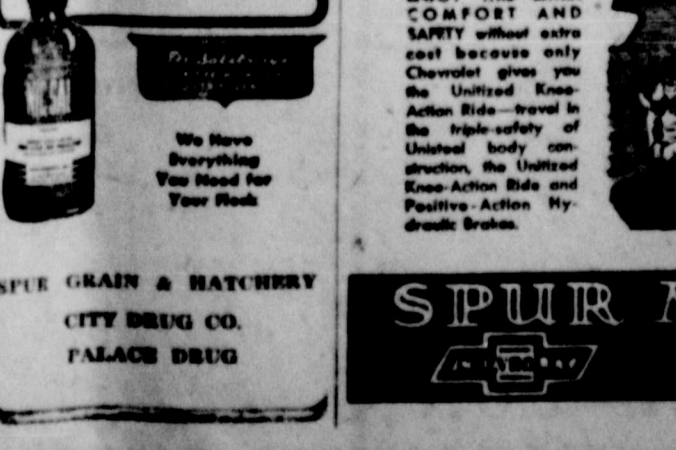
