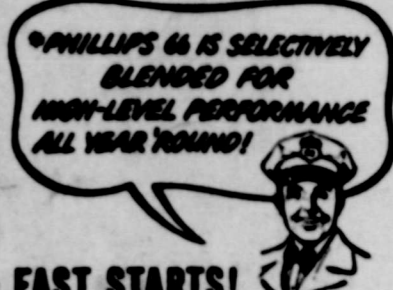

Texas Department of Public Safety

Sgt. Stroud spoke on "Illiterates on the Highways" stating that 85 persons have been killed in this district this year. He gave as causes of accidents: Speed, passing on left side, lack of mental and physical alertness and not adequate equipment. 40 per cent of the fatal accidents are caused by intoxicated drivers, he stated.

Sgt. Stroud further stated while one life was lost on the fighting front during the war, four lives were lost on our highways here. While one was injured during the war, 10 persons were injured on our highways, adding that 15 per cent of the operators, cause 85 per cent of the accidents.

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TEXAS DEPT. OF LEGION FAVORS STUDY OF BOOKS

The steering committee of the Texas Department of the American Legion was on record today as favoring an investigation of the methods of selecting textbooks for public school children.

Another resolution adopted after a two-day session of the chairman of the Legion's 10 key committees recommended legislation requiring district judges who sentence girls to the state training school at Gainesville, first visit the institution personally.

Judge Drew Clifton of Fort Worth, chairman of the child welfare committee, recommended the resolution requiring judges to visit the Gainesville school.

The investigation of the public school textbook procedure was advocated by the Americanism committee headed by Lamar Zively of Temple.

The department foreign relations committee headed by George E. B. Peady of Houston presented a resolution which recommended "that unless and until Russia changed her attitude towards America and Western Europe and agreed to final peace treaties with Germany and Austria, no further sale or shipment of goods be permitted and that all goods now on order or in the process of manufacture be diverted for utilization to Western Europe for the Marshall plan."

A statewide conference will be held in Austin in January to arouse interest in the passage by the current congress of a universal training bill. The meeting will be held under the auspices of the American Legion national defense committee headed by Herman G. Nami of San Antonio.

The Legion policy group, headed by George S. Berry of Lubbock, went on record to establish five more training programs for cities under 10,000 population similar to the Legion sponsored plan now in effect in Burnet. This committee is headed by Bertram E. Giesecke of Austin.

The group also made plans for doubling the Legion's junior baseball program and for enlarging the boy scout's activities. It was also decided to hold a Sons of the Legion encampment in connection with the next department convention to be held in Corpus Christi next September.

Electronics New Helps You Keep "On Time"



ELECTRONICS ENTERS A NEW FIELD and reveals, in just a few seconds, exactly how a watch will run over a 24-hour period. By means of the WatchMaster, shown above, the jeweler can tell not only the rate of gain or loss down to a fraction of a second, but also what is wrong if the watch is "sick." The instrument records on a chart, which is attached to a revolving drum, each "tick-tock" of the watch; the slope of the resulting row of dots tells how the watch is keeping time, while unusual or varying slopes tell the jeweler its condition. Top photo shows jeweler pointing to smooth row of dots made by a new watch in perfect condition; inset picture shows how watch is placed in special "microphone" of the WatchMaster, with a smooth row of dots on the chart (near center of machine) revealing excellent condition of watch.
