Wall Explains Stages Of Highway Projects

LUBBOCK - "Texas highways belong to the people of Texas, and the people of Texas play a major role in the highway department's construction program," says Lubbock's Highway Department District Engineer George C. Wall, Jr. "But few Texans have any idea of the work involved in bringing a highway project from an idea to a reality."

To begin with, it is the people -- usually acting through their local governments -- who see a need for a highway and ask the Highway Department to build it.

According to Wall, there are five general stages in the development of a highway pro-

The first, or Program Stage, commences at the very beginning of project development when the Highway Commission or the State Highway Engineer, acting in response to a request from the people, authorizes the District to conduct preliminary

This is followed by the Route Stage during which preliminary planning is undertaken. Studies are made to identify and analyze the social, economic and environmental factors of the project. The District engineering staff investigates various alternatives and performs general technical studies.

Wall noted that it is occasionally necessary to complete some design studies during this stage in order to better evaluate alternative routes.

This stage usually culminates with the approval of a new highway route or the reaffirmation of an existing highway location, Detailed design investiga

tions, using the most modern design techniques, are conducted during the Design Stage and specific identification and analysis of social, economic and environmental impact factors are performed. Specific lesign alternatives are evaluated.

This stage usually terminates with the approval of designs developed by the District engineers by the Highway Department in Austin and by the Fed-

eral Highway Administration, The Right-of-Way Acquisition Stage follows, during which property appraisals are made, the relocation assistance program is started, utilities are adjusted, and the right-of-way is acquired and cleared for construction. Wall pointed out that the District staff works

Snow Brings Little Relief To Dry Areas

Muleshoe area residents awoke Thursday morning to see snow falkes falling over the

This was a pleasant surprize for area citizens as snow flakes have been rare in this area this

The approximately two and a half inches of snow that fell Thursday morning did little to relieve the plight of local farmers who are in desperate need of moisture for the land due to extremly dry condition this

winter. So far this year, not even an inch of moisture has been recorded in this general area. Although the snow fell densly for some four hours in Muleshoe, the sun broke through the clouds around noon and the snow began to quickly melt as the temperatures rose.

Only small traces of the fluffy white stuff was left Friday morning to remind the people of the snow on Thursday.

Most areas around Muleshoe record two to three inch snowfalls. Hereford recorded three inches while other surrounding

towns recorded lesser amounts. The snow strom spread from Albuquerque on the west of Amarillo on the north and then south to the South Plains and back into New Mexico.

The all to brief snowstorm brought only a little relief to the farmers. A great deal more precipitation is needed before spring planting for farmers to make a bumper crop like most of them did this past year.

Muleshoe Jr. High Identified As A "Right To Read" School

"Muleshoe Junior High is one of the 40 schools nominated in the State of Texas to be a 'Right To Read' School," Neal Dillman reported this week.

The purpose of these 40 schools designated by the Texas Education Agency is to develop effective reading programs that may serve as demonstration schools for furthering the goal of the improvement of reading achievement, In 1974-75 80 school districts will be involved and by 1978-79 all Texas school districts will be in this program.

The National goal of the "Right to Read Program" is "that by the end of the 1970's the right to read shall be a reality for all - that no one shall be leaving our school without the skill and the desire necessary to read to the full

limits of his capability." Insistence upon employment of sound programs, wise choices of instructional material, and continuing improvement of the instructional staff is the

thrust for the Texas Schools. Wayland Ethride, principal of Muleshoe Junior High, said that the reading teachers in grades six, seven and eight will participate in this program.

The Right to Read Program is not something new to be added, but rather a plan of action to diagnose each child and see if his reading performance is equal to his full Vonne McKillip. capability. After the diagnosis, then teachers will know specifically the strengths and weaknesses of each child and can re-organize and evaluate continuously to remediate the problems. From in-service training, teachers will know better how to help children with specific reading problems and will know what materials to use.



However, the world's hunger for oil will not diminish for several years until alternate sources of fuel are developed and Americans in particular, change their driving habits and living standards when it comes to fuels.

Since the price of oil isn't expected to drop much below present levels, the earnings of

oil companies will depend on just how well they increase output and where that output comes from. The big push now is away from the Mideast and into countries where embargos are unlikely, even though the cost of crude poduced in those "safe" countries will rise with worldwide crude prices. "Safe" producing areas would be the North Sea, Nigeria, Canada, Venezuela, Peru, Columbia, Ecudor, Trinidad, Australia, Indonesia and West Africa. The Mideast, with the possible exception of Iran, would be "un-

But remember, "safe" means only that production is assured. not that is secure from the threat of higher prices as the price of crude goes up. There are numerous ways the producing country can jack up the price to the oil company, through royalties and/or taxes or out right demand of a participation

the expense of the producing on company.

The only "safe" country in the Mideast today as far as production is concerned, is Iran. But it is high-risk in terms of taxes or other means of getting the maximum share of revenue out of the oil produced. Indonesia is regarded thus far as reasonable both as to production and price. Venequela, however, put through a severe price increase in the form of a tax of 70% of the price it sets for oil produced in that country. The current price is \$14.08 per barrel with the producer paying the country \$9.86 per barrel. This means that the oil company has to get \$11.00 or more to produce a profit on Venezuelan crude. But Aramco (owned by Exxon, Texaco, Standard of California and Mobil), which has the oil concession in Saudi Arabia, pays royalties and taxes on the postin the actual oil production at ed price of \$11.65. This means

that Aramco starts making a profit above \$8.50 per barrel. The highest known price anywhere was \$20 for Libyan crude

shortly after the embargo was imposed.

Arab oil supplies a substantial part of the oil produced by the largest U.S. oil com-panies, but not all of it. For instance, Movile, Standard of California and Texaco get much more oil from the Mideast than they get from the Western Hemisphere. But Exxon gets almost 60% of its oil from the Western Hemisphere and the balance from the Mideast. Standard of California and Texaco also obtain substantial amounts of oil from Indonesia.

Those companies getting the bulk of their production in the U.S. are Cities Service, Shell, Skelly, Getty and Union of Cal-Mornia. Amerada, Contenental and Marathon are heavily dependant on Mideast oil.





Residents of Bailey County will receive the annual Easter Seal Appeal letters in the mail beginning March 1. The Easter Seal Appeal, conducted year-ly to provide treatment and services to disabled persons and their families, will continue through Easter Sunday, April 14.

Crawford is one of 223 men and women throughout Texas who are serving in this ca-pacity. The cost of the statewide Easter Seal program is over one million dollars, financed mainly by the Easter Seal Appeal. Almost 90 per-cent of all funds raised by the Texas Easter Seal Appeal remain in Texas to support the growing needs of the disabled in the State.



disabled. If an eligible individual's income is less than \$140 per month 'floor' or higher; per couple, \$210 per month. SSI eliminates many of the

varying eligibility standards and payments in State and local public assistance programs. Eligibility and payment standards will be uniform nationwide. The Federal law does not require liens on the homes of recipients or require relatives to support the needy as is now the case in some states.

Supplemental Security Income payments and Social Security Benefits are not the same. SSI payments are based on financial need. Some may be eligible for both programs -Social Security and Supplemental Security Income.

People on the State welfare rolls in December 1973, were automatically converted to SSI, effective January 1, 1974. SSI checks are "gold" in color. Eligibility of persons age 65 or older or blind or disabled will be determined by the value

of their resources - things they own, and the amount of monthly income. A single person can have up to \$1500 in resources that could be converted to cash for support. A couple can have \$2250.

Example resources are checking and savings accounts, stocks, bonds and cash on hand. Not all possessions are resources.

The court thereupon tossed out Madge's complaint, saying that a moderate amount of noise must be accepted by those who choose to live in apartments.




