Assignments Are Made For New Highway Officers

According to Colonel Homer J. ... Director, Department of Public Safety, Austin, the first recruit training school for the Texas Highway Patrol authorized by the last session of the legislature has now been completed, and effective April 1, 1943, seventy-five men will be assigned to the State Highway Patrol. The assignments are: Gainesville, Bonham, Dallas, Fort Worth, San Antonio, Lubbock, Pecos, San Angelo, Uvalde, Corpus Christi, Houston, Tyler, Harlingen, Fort Worth.

Examinations have already been given for the second recruit training school and men are now being called for this school which begins April 1, 1943, at Camp Mabry, with approximately 50 recruit patrolmen in attendance.

Two more recruit schools will be held for 50 or more men in each beginning August 1, 1943 and examinations for these positions will be given at an early date at the following District Offices of the Texas Highway Patrol: Austin, Dallas, Abilene, Wichita Falls, Amarillo, Lubbock, Pecos, San Angelo, Uvalde, Corpus Christi, Houston, Tyler, Harlingen, Fort Worth.

The patrolmen for these two final schools will be chosen at the above places and later brought to Austin for training.

Chief W. J. Elliott, Texas Highway Patrol, Austin, states that the qualifications for these recruit patrolmen positions are: must be between 21 and 35 years of age; must be at least 5'8" tall without shoes, and must not weigh less than two pounds per inch of height nor more than three and one-half; must be of excellent moral character; must

VETERANS NEWS

Veterans and dependents of deceased veterans of the Indian Wars will receive a 20 percent increase in their service pensions effective with payments due for the month of March, the Veterans Administration has announced.

The increases are provided in Public Law 398 of the 80th Congress approved January 19. They affect about 750 living veterans, 2,100 widows and some 50 helpless children of deceased Indian War veterans.

Under the increased rates which followed the granting of similar increases for pensioners of other wars, the veterans will receive from \$24 to \$120 a month, depending upon extent of disability, age and qualifying status. Widows' rates will range from \$30 to \$80 monthly, with additional allowances for children.

VA said the average age today of Indian War veterans is 85 years, and that dependents average 80 years of age.

More than half a million World War I veterans in 1947 bought homes of their own with the aid of Government - guaranteed loans under the GI Bill, VA reports.

VA said 540,000 GI home loans were made to veterans during the years compared with 410,000 in 1946. This brings to 1,056,771 the total number of GI home loans approved since the program started late in 1944.

VA found that the average home bought by veterans in 1947 carried a price tag of \$7,300. About 290,000 loans were for existing homes and 160,000 for newly constructed homes.

An estimated 14,000,000 veterans still have nearly 10 years in which to exercise their loan guarantee rights under the GI Bill. Real estate loans carry a Government guarantee of 30 percent of the amount of the loan, up to a maximum guarantee of \$4,000.

QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS
Q -- I am a World War I veteran and would like to know if I have the right to choose the hospital I prefer in case of service - connected ailment?

A -- The VA probably will offer such treatment in the Veterans Administration hospital nearest your home, or in the nearest VA hospital equipped and staffed to take care of your particular case.

Q -- I am now drawing 10 percent compensation for a service physically able to past the rigid examination; must have a high school education or the equivalent; and must have been a resident of the State of Texas for one year or more. He also states that he has a large number of applicants now on file and that he will be glad to hear from those having the above qualifications who are interested in this type of work.

A -- Veterans Administration will pay for the knee brace if VA doctors approve the recommendation of your physician.
Q -- May my private physician be called in as a consultant while I am hospitalized in a Veterans Administration hospital?
A -- No, except in the event your physician happens to be a regular consultant on the hospital staff and the staff agrees to call him in to study your case.
Q -- Can veterans of the Spanish - American War get Government insurance because of his wife's right hand pleading for service in the armed forces?
A -- No. Government Insurance was first made available to veterans of World War I.

How Jesus Prayed

(The following is a summary of a Bible study lecture delivered at the Victory Bible Class -- a public service of the Christian Church, 610 Burlington Avenue; conducted on Monday nights at 7:30. Bring your Bibles, your questions, and problems, and help us "search the scriptures.")
The Son of God was a man of prayer. Although we are told that the world would not hold the books needed if all His works were to be written down, we are told of many instances where He prayed in His three and one-half year ministry. Let us notice some of the times when Jesus prayed.

In Luke 3:21 we find that Jesus prayed at His baptism, as the Holy Spirit descended upon Him. Before He chose the apostles, Christ prayed all night, Luke 6:12, and spent the following day teaching and healing the sick.

At His transfiguration He had gone into the mountain to pray, and while praying He took on the glory of heaven, Luke 9:28-29. In Matthew 14 we read of a busy day in which Jesus taught, healed, and fed a multitude of well over five thousand souls. Then sending the multitude away He prayed alone until He rejoined His disciples in the early hours of dawn (the fourth watch) to begin another day of busy ministry. Mark 1:32 -- 39 tells of another such instance when Jesus after a long, strenuous day, of sweat a great while before day and went out to pray before going on a preaching tour. Sometimes the need for prayer was so great that He left the seeking crowds and went out alone to pray, Luke 5:16. "He offered up prayers and supplications with strong crying and tears," we are told in Hebrews 5:7. Before His betrayal, as He knelt in Gethsemane, "being in an agony He prayed more earnestly; and His sweat became as it were great drops of blood falling down upon the ground," Luke 22:44. He prayed for Peter that his "faith fail not," Luke 22:32. He prayed for those who nailed Him to the cross, "Father, forgive them for they know not what they do," Luke 23:34. Truly He was a man of prayer.

And still He is praying, Romans 8:34 and Hebrews 7:25 tell how even now He is at the Father's right hand pleading for service in the armed forces? His people.

Duck Creek Soil Conservation District News Notes

A grass seed drill will be loaned to the Duck Creek Soil Conservation District from March 24 to 31 inclusive. Cooperators who want to use it to seed grass this spring should contact the local Soil Conservation Service office.

Grass cannot be planted on abandoned farm land and is expected to do well without some cultivation to keep weeds down. The seed is very small and produces a small shoot at germination. It must have an even chance at moisture and sunlight like any other crop. Once grass has become established it will hold its own with weeds and will eventually cover the land.

Land preparation is usually necessary to establish a grass cover. It can be sown on clean tilled ground in the spring with an ordinary planter, and cultivated as often as needed to kill weeds. The grass will not be ready for grazing until the following growing season.

One of the best systems of seeding grass requires preparation a year in advance. Sudan is planted and allowed to grow until it starts heading out. where it falls. If the sudan makes heads, it will volunteer the next year and compete with the grass. This residue will form a mulch over the ground, helping to keep down weeds and keep the surface of the ground moist. Grass is sown right in this much the next spring, as early in the season as possible.

It is generally known that each kind of grass likes a particular kind of soil, and that some grasses make better grazing than others. Grasses will also vary widely in the season which they are most palatable to livestock. For those reasons, landowners should give considerable thought to grass reseeding before spending their time, money, and acreage.

At the close of the lecture, the group returned to the home of Mrs. Berry where they were served a lovely refreshment plate.



Adams, Social Security Administration representative, will be in Spur at the Post Office at 7:30 a. m. on Thursday, March 11, for the purpose of answering any questions you may have on Social Security; discussing possible benefits and taking claims from persons who seem to be entitled to benefits; and taking applications for Social Security account number cards.

Every day last year an average of 700 people qualified for retirement benefits under the Federal old-age and survivors insurance program, but the record shows that one out of every six could have qualified sooner and saved some monthly payments that were lost because of the delay. 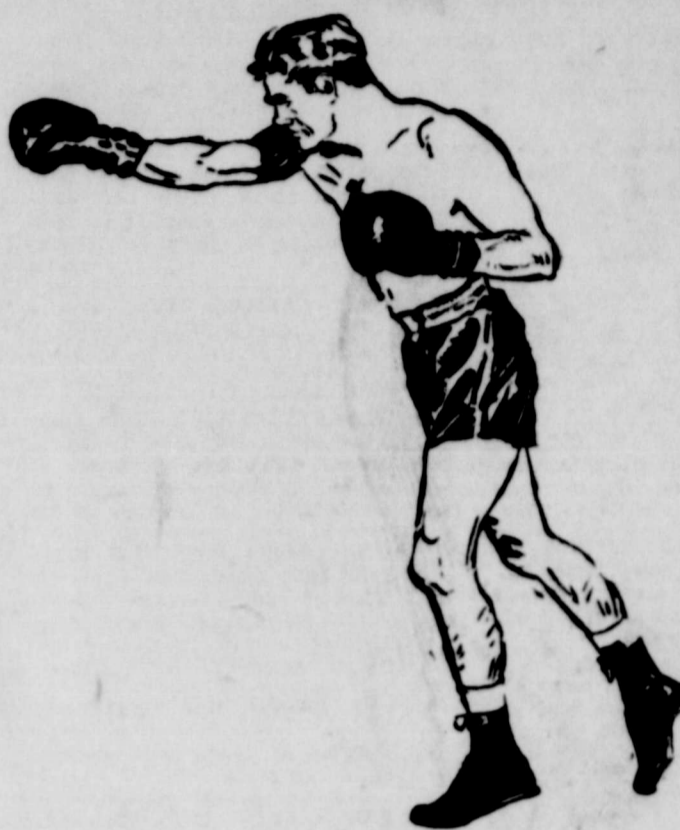

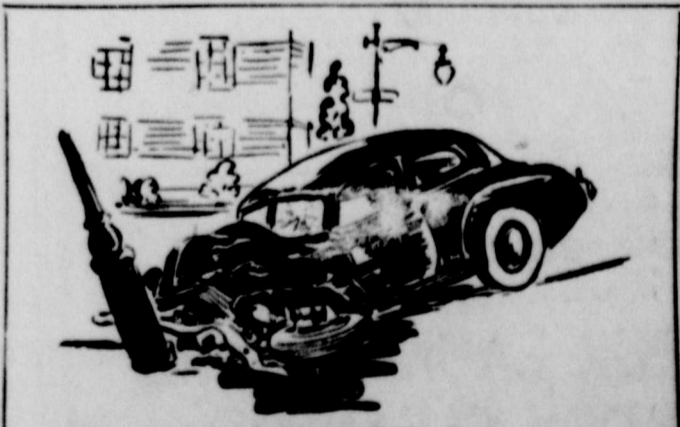
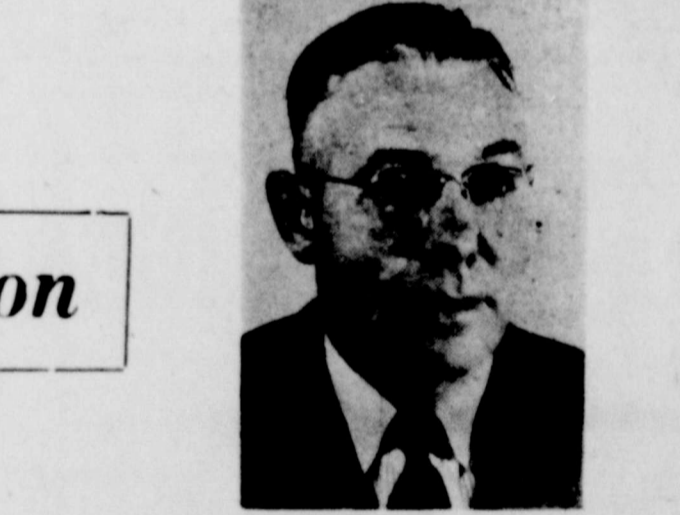

College Station, March 3, Cotton farmers had a good year in the Panhandle and South Plains. Yields were higher than many of the early crop estimates, even though the summer was dry.

This, according to Fred C. Elliott, cotton work specialist of Texas A. & M. College, pointed out again the value of storing soil moisture during the winter.

Conditions on the Plains are looking up and the supply of moisture in the soil before planting time is encouraging. As usual, land listed on the contour caught and held more water.

County agents have pointed out to Elliott that recent snows and freezes have left the finer soil particles on top of the ground where they are likely to start blowing.

Many Plains cotton farmers are standing by with chisel plows, and others will use them for the first time if blowing starts. Still others will stop blowing with lister equipment.

"No matter how they do it -- just so they do it," Elliott says.

"Right now prospects are good for another big cotton crop on the Plains -- if blowing is kept down."

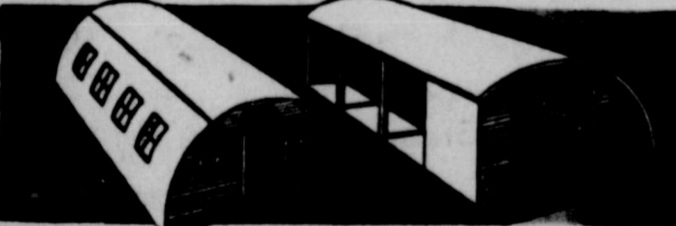
