Sorghum Gluten Stars In Truck Shows Feeds May Be Used In Feeding Stock

Gluten meal and gluten feed tained from grain sorghums as by-products from the extraction of starch may soon be available in significant quantities for feeding livestock.

According to information from Dr. J. C. Miller and Fred Hale, of the department of animal hushandry, and Dr. Carl M. Lyman, of the department of biochemistry and nutrition, all of Texas A. & M. College, some work has been done in the past on the uses of corn gluten feed and corn gluten meal as feeds for swine. However, there are no reports on the uses of sorghum gluten feed and meal.

In the fall of 1947 and the summer of 1948, feeding trials were conducted by the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station to study the value of sorghum by_products as pig fattening rations. The first experiment was made up 40 Duroc pigs, averaging 79 pounds each, and divided into four lots of 10 pigs each.







The group of pigs getting the soybean meal as 30 percent of the protein mixture made 10 percent greater daily gains did the pigs fed the sorphum by-products. Since grain sorghum by-products are low in lysine, it may be a better practice to replace a part of the grain with these by-products rather than use them in the protein supplement when feeding the grain and protein supplement free choice in self feeders, these, men report.



Heart disease is rapidly becoming the chief cause of death in the United States, being far ahead of cancer, the second on the list of diseases which kill the greatest number of people in the United States every year.

Incidentally, of the ten leading causes of death in the country, only one-tuberculosis thas shown a steady decline during the past few years. Whether this is to be attributed to the steady campaign which is waged against the whit plague, or not, we have no way of knowing, but we suspect that there is some close connection.

Concerning heart disease, a recognized authority reports that coronary sclerosis is sometimes called the ('disease of the intelligensia" because of the susceptibility of physicians, bankers, lawyers and clergymen. The characteristics of the disease including the hardening of the nerves, ligaments lives. and blood vessels around the heart and its incidence is highest among those who do mental work and lowest among those who do manual labor.

State Health Officer. His advice to persons who even suspect the presence of pyorrhea is to seek an early diagnosis from their dentist so that proper treatment can be instituted while the disease is still curable

"Early detection and proper treatment of pyorrhea represent the formula for a successful cure. This means that the dentist must have an opportunity to discover the presence of the disease at the earliest possible moment. Since the symptoms are often so vague that the patient is unaware of having pyorrhea," Dr. Cox said, 'regular visits to the family dentist are extremely imporant in the control of this disease.

The treatment of pyorrhea is not an involved procedure. In the average early case one of the main therapeutic features is the proper hygienic care of teeth and gums as outlined by any reputable dentist. Carelessness regarding mouth hygiene is usually the basic cause for the condition. The family dentist can usually remove the cause of the trouble, Dr. Cox said, and when this has been done, intelligent routine care of the mouth by the patient will help to effect a fairly quick cure in the majority of early cases.
