Spur Dresses Up For Rodeo; Streets Being Decorated

Concrete Reservoir Contract Let For City Of Spur

Recently a contract was let to Fitzgerald, Newton and Corley of Waco and Donna, Texas for \$40,860.00 for the construction of a \$500,000 Gallon Reinforced Concrete Reservoir for the city of Spur. Work is to begin approximately within two weeks. The new reservoir is to be located immediately to the north of the present concrete reservoir; the present reservoir will be used for fire storage. Chlorination equipment is to be installed in order to provide means of sterilization of water to provide against typhoid and dysentery. Booster pumps are to be installed in order to give adequate pressure for fire fighting; this is in compliance with the Fire Insurance Commission Requirements. A necessary step to take in order to reduce key rate below 41 percent a possible \$2,000 a year in insurance premiums. This contract is only a portion of the water improvements. The city is now working on an additional well supply driving at a 1000 gallon per minute production. A scarcity of water from all over the State has been reported in the past months and the city officials are to be commended for taking care of this situation in Spur before it becomes acute.

Veteran Director At Texas A. & M. To Be Honored; A. B. Conner, Will Receive Degree On June 4

Well Known In Agricultural Authority; In Father Of Bob Conner, Spur

A. B. Conner of Marlin, father of Bob Conner of Spur prominent nationally known agricultural authority and veteran director of the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, will be honored in a special ceremony on June 4, 1948, at the commencement exercises at Texas A. & M. College, will receive the honorary degree of Doctor of Engineering.

Two other honorary degrees will be awarded on the same occasion. Fleet Admiral Chester W. Nimitz, of the United States Navy will receive the honorary degree of Doctor of Laws. Eugene Wheelock Bohne, a former graduate of Texas A. & M. College, will receive the honorary degree of Doctor of Engineering.

AND IT RAINED

Beginning Tuesday evening, a slow drizzle began to fall and within a short time the streets were covered with water, and from all appearances it looked like the weather man was favoring this section of the country with a good shower, but the reading this morning at the Texas Experiment farm shows that we only had .85 of an inch and the rain fell for the entire month of May was only .95 of an inch.

Mr. Dickson at the farm turned up a scoop of dirt and the moisture was only about 1 1-2 inches deep. This is not nearly sufficient moisture for planting stated Mr. Dickson, but prospects are still good for further rains.

TEXAS COWBOY REUNION QUARTERHORSE SHOW

A handsome saddle will go to the grand champion quarter horse in the new performance class at the meeting of the American Quarter Horse Association in connection with the Texas Cowboy Reunion here July 2, 3, and 5. Roy Arledge, chairman, said this week. Other new prizes will also be offered. The saddle will be presented by the American Quarter Horse Association. Two performances classes are being added to the quarter horse show this year for the first time when those entered in those classes will perform under saddle. Only the

finals, with four animals competing, will be shown in the arena when grand champion and reserve champion will be named. This will probably be held on July 5, Mr. Arledge said. The same judges who judge the cutting horse contest will decide upon the winners in this new contest.

Two new halter classes have also been added to the American Quarter Horse show this year, making ten in all.

Some Land Is Lost When Taken Over By Weeds

Not all cropland and pasture that is lost is blown away or washed down the river, says Howard T. Kingsbery, Chairman of the Texas FMA Committee. When land is taken over by useless plants which prevent the growth of useful plants, it is lost as far as production is concerned—lost until it can be brought back into the production of useful plants. This explains, says the chairman, why some conservation practices under the Agricultural Conservation Program are for the eradication and control of noxious weeds and competitive plants. A good example of conserving soil and putting it back into production is the case of F. W. Pulliam, a small rancher in Texas. Mesquite eradication was carried out on 87 acres of a 265-acre pasture on Mr. Pulliam's ranch. This particular pasture had carried one animal unit for each 20 acres. During 1947, after the mesquite was eradicated, the pasture carried 65 head of cattle for 7 months. The mesquite was killed with kerosene in the spring of 1946 and cattle were kept off this range throughout the year. In 1947 a good stand of grass had replaced the mesquite and grazing was resumed.

Uncle Eb Shaw Phophesies

Dear Texas Spur: I see I have broken into the Texas Spur again as a weather prophet for the paper and prophesied the year of 1948 as being another dry year.

I don't see why I done that unless it was to play safe, Prophesey drought when it was a drought and rain when it was raining. I didn't believe it and still don't believe it, basing my belief on passed conditions we have gone through. Two dry summers in succession is as many as I have ever seen. These continuous high winds filling the elements with dust has been a forerunner of torrential rains to follow. I believe this drought will break in this month, and should it do so, judging from the past we will have good rains through the summer.

This statement has been made about North West Texas people, that nobody but a fool or new comers will prophesy weather conditions in this country. The answer to that I believe is about right for that is about the only two classes I have ever met out here. Possibly there is some truth in that statement.

So I say do not be discouraged, there is time yet for row crops. I had my cotton killed in the bloom about the middle of June. I planted again and finished about the 20th of June. I gathered two bales of well matured cotton; had we had the baling machine we have now, I would have made a half bale to the acre. It would have been strained to some extent, but would have been good sizable cotton. The Combine Red maize when planted the 10th of July has been known

to make 50 bushels per acre. So again I say cheer up don't take the drought blues and give all you have away and leave the country.

I pitched my camp here nearly 58 years ago and have made about seven fair crops to every near failure.

Hoping we will have drought breaking rains soon, and wishing all health and good luck. I am very respectfully yours. E. B. Shaw

1904, and received a Master of Science degree in 1923. After graduation, he served with the United States Department of Agriculture doing research work with forage crops at Chillicothe, Texas. He was the first to plant sudan grass which has become one of the important annual cultivated grasses in North America. In 1911 Mr. Conner became Vice Director of the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station and in that capacity was largely responsible for developing the system of research substations in Texas. He continued his research work, particularly in breeding improvement of great sorghums. This work was basic research work on soil and water conservation at the Spur, Texas, station. In 1928 he became director of the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station and in that position maintained an aggressive leadership in agriculture which has clearly benefited the entire state.
