## Whoa, Now!

Church by high winds, an angry, boiling tornado ripped through a section of farm homes and the Soldier Mound Community, four miles north of Spur Tuesday evening about 6 o'clock leaving one dead, nine injured, 11 homes and the Soldier Mound Baptist Church completely destroyed and six other badly damaged. Total damage was placed at \$75,000.

This was the third story in the Texas Spur published one year ago today, on May 19, 1949. With tornado season here, and big black clouds coming up nearly every evening, and the daily papers full of tornado stories, Dickens county residents are reminded daily of the terrible disaster that struck last spring in the small Soldier Mound Community.

The recent construction of storm cellars in our city seems to indicate that local citizens don't place too much faith in the say that they never strike twice in the same place.

Although no figures are available yet concerning the Dickens county losses, a reliable source said this week that he heard from a reliable source that the county probably would not go over 7200. An unofficial rumor from Crosbyton county states that Crosbyton is going to hit close to 1900 instead of the "estimated" 3000, and Falls is hoping to reach 1800. We still think that Spur will reach the 2000 mark, however.

The Spur Experiment station built the first "group plan" system of terraces which also are now widely used. We of Dickens county should be very proud of its conservation. King again was aided by a Dalhart error and scored Hoover, leaving the bases loaded. Smith then doubled to score two and Blair knocked out his second double to score two more. ### Ben Ramsey Announced His Candidacy For Lieutenant Governor

Austin, May 5. Ben Ramsey of San Augustine, who has a long record of service in both houses of the Legislature, today formally announced his candidacy for lieutenant governor of Texas. The tall East Texan resigned this spring as secretary of state in order to prepare to make the state race. He was appointed secretary of state in January, 1949, by the late Governor Beauford Jester and continued to serve under Governor Allan Shivers when he took office. Ramsey began his political career in 1930 when he was elected

to the House from San Augustine County. He served in the House four years and in 1940 was elected to the Texas Senate, where he served eight years. The East Texas Senator has always been held in high regard by his fellow members of the Legislature, regardless of differences in voting, and the Senate demonstrated this in 1947 by electing him President Pro-Tempore of the Senate.

Ramsey, born and reared in San Augustine County, has been a leader in the advancement of rural electrification in the state. For the past ten years he has been attorney for the Deep East Texas Electric Cooperative, and during this time this pioneering rural utility has grown into one of the largest and most financially sound in Texas.

Ramsey attended the San Augustine public school and the University of Texas. After leaving the University in 1931, he began practicing law in San Augustine, and immediately became interested in the serious East Texas problem of soil and forest conservation. The Ramsey farm there now is considered a model from a soil improvement stand point.

After leaving the Secretary of State's office in Austin, Ramsey and his wife returned to San Augustine where he resumed his law practice. He has been active in all community affairs and has been a member of the Methodist Church for most of his 46 years.

Ramsey said he is running for lieutenant governor because he is convinced that the thinking people of Texas must take a more active interest in their state government to solve their own problems in their own way.

Ramsey has been a consistent supporter of improving educational opportunities in Texas, and the farm-to-market road improvement program.

### Spencer Tracy, James Stewart, Head Cast of "Malaya"

Excitement and adventure provide the keynote for "Malaya", new M-G-M offering at the Palace Theatre, with Spencer Tracy and James Stewart playing a pair of reckless buddies in a pulse-hitting drama laid against a sinister background of the Far East.

Stewart plays John Royer, ex-newspaper correspondent who succeeds in getting U. S. government backing for a daring project to smuggle raw rubber out of Japanese Malaya during the war. He ties up with Tracy, enacting the adventurous and tough Carnahan, and the Dutchman (Sydney Greenstreet), proprietor of a bar in a Malaya coastal town. Gambling their odds against those of a crafty Jap commandant, Colonel Tomura, the adventurers contrive to make deals with two rubber growers to buy their hidden stockpiles of rubber. These are run out by a fishing fleet of sampan to waiting camouflaged ships that bring the much-needed rubber to the states.

The plan hits a snag in the person of a German rubber grower who doublecrosses Royer. Faced with almost certain death at the hands of the Japs, Royer and Carnahan are given a choice of continuing their dangerous mission or fleeing for their lives. Their decision and the ultimate consequences to each of the men make for a story development that is as dramatic and suspense-packed as is its logic.

There isn't a flaw in the casting of this picture, with each role filled by an actor who knows his business. Tracy is excellent in the

first all-out adventure role he has tackled in some time. James Stewart gives a compelling performance as his knowing buddy, and Sydney Greenstreet gives his suave villainy a new sympathetic plot thread concerns the romance between Tracy and a sultry native girl, effectively portrayed by the glamorous Italian actress, Valentina Cortese, and there are other expert performances by John Hodiak as an F. B. I. agent, Lionel Barrymore as a powerful newspaper publisher, and Gilbert Roland as a native guerrilla who is devoted to Carnahan.

Director Richard Thorpe has captured the full flavor of the Far East in his exotic Malaya jungle background and has kept the adventurous action of his story moving without a lagging break. And a word should also be said for George Folsey's fine photography of a difficult assignment.

**Soil Conservation Jumped From Tenth To First Place**

Austin, Texas, May 13. During the past six months, the need for water and soil conservation, the mounting cost of government, and the issue of racial equality have moved into the forefront of public opinion as the biggest problems facing Texas.

From last November to April water and soil conservation has jumped from tenth to first place in the list of the ten top problems mentioned by a statewide cross section of Texans. Recent drought and dust storms no doubt have helped to impress the public with the importance of this problem.

Rated eighth six months ago, the high cost of government now replaces the high cost of living as the second most important problem. Added emphasis on government cost comes in the wake

of recent increases in taxes by Texas Legislature and forecasts of still more taxes to keep the state budget in balance.

Persistent efforts of Negroes to break down the barriers of segregation have made the public increasingly more conscious of the issue of racial equality. From seventh place six months ago, racial equality has moved up to third place.

Periodically, The Texas Poll asks a cross section of adults in all parts of the state this question: "What would you say is the biggest problem facing Texas?"

In the latest poll of 1,000 adults the top ten problems in order of frequency of mention were these:

1. Water and soil conservation.
2. Cost of government.
3. Racial equality.
4. Unemployment.

Rated eighth six months ago, the high cost of government now replaces the high cost of living as the second most important problem. Added emphasis on government cost comes in the wake

5. Education.
  6. Tidelands.
  7. Mental hospitals.
  8. Russian threat of war.
  9. Cost of living.
  10. Crop controls and reduced farm acreage.
- In a poll last November, the legal battle over Texas tidelands topped the list of the ten biggest problems. Neither the state's mental hospitals, now rated seventh; threat of war, now eighth; nor crop controls, now tenth, received enough mentions in November to place among the top ten.
- The line-up last November was as follows:
1. Tidelands
  2. Cost of living.
  3. Unemployment.
  4. Health, polio danger.
  5. Education.
  6. Housing.
  7. Racial equality.
  8. Cost of government.
  9. Politics.
  10. Water and soil conservation.

Two of every three persons interviewed in the latest survey mentioned one or more problems. In addition to the top ten problems mentioned, here are some other matters about which segments of the public seem to be concerned: (11) housing, (12) labor trouble, (13) politics, (14) highways, (15) old-age pensions.

**Smith-Doxey Plan Announced For Cotton Farmers**

Details of the 1950 Smith-Doxey cotton classing program for cotton farmers were announced today by Mr. H. J. Matejowsky, in charge of the Abilene office of the cotton branch, Production and Marketing Administration, U. S. Department of Agriculture.

"Farmers will follow the same

procedures as they did last year in signing up for this program," Matejowsky said.

Under it, he continued, they receive without cost cotton classing and market news from U. S. Department of Agriculture. Any group of farmers organized to promote the improvement of cotton is eligible for these services.

Matejowsky urges all cotton farmers interested in Smith-Doxey benefits to organize community groups immediately and submit applications.

Applications and more details about the program can be secured at the cotton office, 1407 South First Street, Abilene, from County Agricultural Agents, County PMA officers and ginners.

Austin, May 18. State Health Officer Geo. W. Cox believes chronic diseases represent the biggest problem facing health officials today.

Recent statistics compiled by the Bureau of Vital Statistics, Texas State Department of Health show:

1. One-third of all deaths among 15-9 years olds are due to chronic diseases, with tuberculosis being the leader.
2. "Well over half" the mortality in the 30-40 age group is due to chronic disease, with heart trouble, cancer and tuberculosis being the leaders.
3. "Almost 8 out of 10" deaths in the 45-59 bracket are caused by this disease classification, with the proportion rising to 85 per cent for those 60 to 74 years old.
4. For those 75 and over chronic diseases cause 82 per cent of the total mortality. The slight decrease in percentage over age 75 is because of the high susceptibility to accidents, pneumonia, and influenza among the aged.

"When chronic disease is mentioned, all too many people think of the problem as being confined to the middle-aged or older," the health chief said, adding that such an idea was not consistent with the facts.

The term chronic, Dr. Cox explained, means the opposite of acute. When applied to a disease, chronic means of long duration. That would mean cancer or tuberculosis is chronic, while smallpox or poliomyelitis is acute.

"The significant thing," Dr. Cox indicated, "is that the chronic disease classification cause one-third of all deaths among young people in the 15-29 age bracket."

"Obviously, that makes the teen ages the first age at which the diseases assume a major mortality role."

The spirose ear tick can be controlled by swabbing the ears of infested cattle with smear 1029. A five-tenths solution of toxaphene or chlordane sprayed on the area surrounding salt boxes, feed troughs and water tanks will help eliminate the tick.

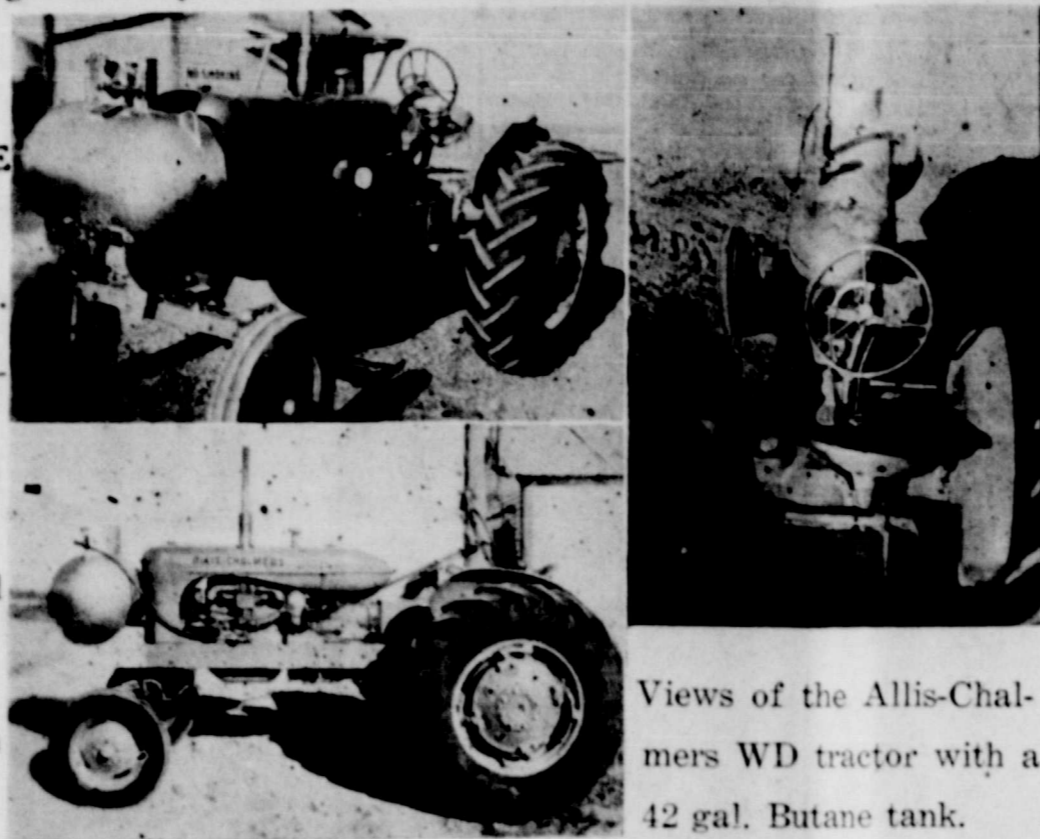

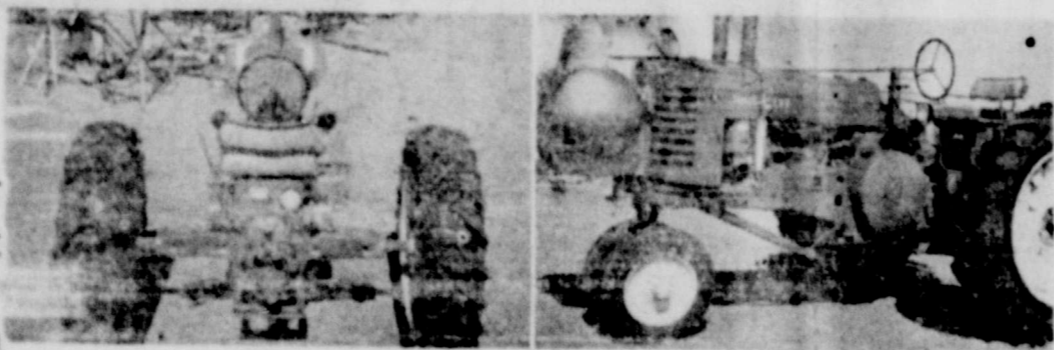
