





# -00 200 **Business Taxes** Fall On Public

The influence of taxes on the American family will be uppermost in the minds of members of Congress for the next few weeks. They are seeking the answer to this \$64-question:

How can they satisfy increasing public demand for tax reduction and at the same time find other taxes to offset such a reduction? Their problem is made doubly hard by the fact that Uncle Sam wants to spend \$5 1/2 bil-

lion above his income next year. The Council of State Chambers of Commerce today pointed up the problem in a special study by its Washington research staff. It found that the \$40 1/2 billion in all taxes collected by the Federal Government last year came from these sources: 44 1/2 per cent rom personal income taxes, 281/2 per cent from corporation income taxes, 6 per cent from social security taxes and the balance of 21 per cent from a great variety of excise and miscellaneous taxees. A tax study issued this month

by the Brookings Institution, an impartial research organization, revealed that three fifths of all manufacturing corporatons take the corporate income tax into account in determining the prices of their products. This means that the consumer pays a large part of corporation taxes too.

Ernest Breech, executive vice president of the Ford Motor Co., in reply to a question whether the price of cars would go down if his company's taxes were cut,

"Certainly it would cut prices. In the long run, every corporation nust price its products so as to make a reasonable return after taxes in order to survive and grow . In the final analysis, income taxes are just as much a cost of doing businss as payroll." A group of Congressmen, doing some rough figuring on their own recently, concluded that a family of three prsons with an income of \$3,000 pays \$201.60 of that income in corporation income taxes which are included in the prices of the things they buy. A family of four with an income of \$5,000 pays \$316.80, and the same sized family with an income of \$7,500 pays \$414.

## — es **Tech Survey Says** Low Cost Funeral Most Desired

LUBBOCK, June 22, 1950-Most people would prefer a low-cost funeral and are pretty indifferent to the whole business of dying, a survey made at Texas Technological College has revealed.

The poll was made by W. J. Neal, Lubbock student who based his questionnaire on the kind of funeral folks would prefer. He found that 67 per cent of the interviewed persons were either against elaborate burials and funerals, or didn't care much-one way or the other. Only 33 per cent said they wanted an expensive funeral rite.

To the question, "How expensive a funeral would you desire?" about half the polled group wanted a burial costing \$350 or less. The other half preferred expensive ones, with \$700 getting the nod as an ideal expense.

Neal found that 57 per cent either preferred a wooden casket or didn't care whether they were buried in a wooden box or a metal one. Thirty-six per cent wanted an air-tight casket but 64 per cent didn't want one or didn't care. Only 29 per cent wanted a new suit (or shroud) for their burial.

A break-down of Neal's figures showed that divorcees were most indifferent to their burial plans. Seventy-five per ent of the divorcees wanted inexpensive funerals including wooden caskets Single men preferred burial in old suits by a 91 per cent majority but 33 per cent of the married men



## HEALTH NOTES

AUSTIN, June 22-Death rates from diabetes is three times as high in diabetes whose condition was not discovered until after complications developed than for patients whose illness was recognized and brought under treatment before advanced symptoms ap-

Based on recently completed national studies, this was revealed Thursday by State Health Officer

Geo W. Cox. "Diabetes has not always been a public health problem," the health officer declard. "It became one whe nwe found that the death rate is much greater when the condition is discovered late

"Public education makes for lower diabetes death rates ,and public education in such matters .s a healt hdepartment job"

Dr. Cox teld this story about

It used to be that many diabetic patients sought treatment only after having developed serious complications. A considerabl number of all diabetics examined at autopsy showed active pulmonary tuberculosis

The discovery of insulin gave physicians a specific treatment for prolonging patients' lives, even before it was entirely clear what the disease was and what its effects were Thus event after event took place with insulin therapy, eventually leading to the realization that early discovery means longer life.

"Diabetes mellitus" - called sugar diabetes by some people-is a condition in which the body cannot properly process the sugar it needs. The result is chronic thurst, hunger, and weakness. Eventually, without insulin, the patient will literally starve to death. Insulin nicctions will correct the faulty body processes.

"In 1949, there were 739 diabetes deaths in Texas" Dr. Cox said "By were only 189 polio deaths.

"It's the family physician who is in the best position to discover diabetes or a pre-diabetic condition. That's just one more point in favor of regular medical checkups," the doctor concluded.





Survey Reveals Business Taxes Fall On Pabli

The interior of taxes on the ost in the minds of members of Congress for the next few weeks. They are seeking the answer to this \$64-question:

How can they satisfy increasng public demand for tax reducand at the same time find other taxes to offset such a reduction? Their problem is made doubly hard by the fact that Uncle Sam wants to spend \$5 1/4 bilon above his income next year.

The Council of State Chambers erce today pointed up the roblem in a special study by its Washington research staff. found that the \$40 1/2 billion in all taxes collected by the Federal Government last year came from these sources: 44 1/2 per cent rom personal income taxes, 281/2 per cent from corporation income taxes, 6 per cent from social security taxes and the balance of

21 per cent from a great variety of excise and miscellaneous taxees. A tax study issued this month by the Brookings Institution, an impartial research organization, revealed that three fifths of all manufacturing corporatons take the corporate income tax into account in determining the prices of their products. This means that the consumer pays a large part of corporation taxes too.

#### - Charles Tech Survey Says Low Cost Funeral Most Desired

LUBBOCK, June 22, 1950-Most people would prefer a low-cost funeral and are pretty indifferent to the whole business of dying, a survey made at Texas Technolo-gical College has revealed.

The poll was made by W. J. Neal, Lubbock student who based his questionnaire on the kind of funeral folks would prefer. He found that 67 per cent of the interviewed persons were either against elaborate burials and funerals, or didn't care much-one way or the other. Only 33 per cent said they wanted an expensive funeral rite.

To the question, "How expensive a funeral would you desire?" about half the polled group wanted a burial costing \$350 or less. The other half preferred expensive ones, with \$700 getting the nod as an ideal expense.

Neal found that 57 per cent either preferred a wooden casket or didn't care whether they were buried in a wooden box or a metal one. Thirty-six per cent wanted an air-tight casket but 64 per cent didn't want one or didn't care. Only 29 per cent wanted a new

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

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
