

BREAKFAST BREADS

Hot sweet breads and coffee cakes add variety and interest to breakfast, making it a meal that even the usual breakfast-skippers cannot resist. Here is a recipe for a basic dough which can be varied temptingly for different breads. Foundation Sweet Yeast Dough

- 2 packages yeast, compressed or granular 1/4 cup lukewarm water
- 1 cup milk % cup sugar
- 5 cups flour (about) 2 teaspoons salt
- 2 beaten eggs

% cup melted margarine 1 teaspoon grated lemon or orange

Soften yeast in lukewarm water. Scald milk; add sugar and salt to the hot milk: cool to lukewarm. Add 2 cups flour. Mix well. Add softened yeast, eggs, and grated rind. Beat well. Add melted margarine. Mix well. Add enough flour to make a soft dough. Turn out on lightly floured board and knead until smooth. Place in margarined bowl. Cover and let rise until about doubled in bulk. Punch down. Shape tea rings, rolls, or coffee cakes. Let rise until doubled. Bake in a preheated moderate oven (325° to 375° F.) for 20 to 30 minutes, depending on the size. This will make two 12-inch tea rings, 31/2;

EGG AND SPINACH CASSEROLE

2 lbs. spinach or 1 box frozen spinach 3-5 hard cooked eggs 2 tablespoons prepared mustard 2 tablespoons fortified margarine


1 cup milk 1/4 cup grated cheese

2 tablespoons flour

If the spinach is fresh, wash well. Steam until tender in lightly salted water. Hard boil eggs. Lemove shell and cut in half lengthwise. Remove the yolk; season it with salt, pepper, and mustard. Soften the mixture with milk if necessary. Refill the whites. Melt the margarine in a sauce pan; add flour. Mix until smooth. Add milk; stir over low heat until creamy and smooth. Season to taste with salt and pepper. Add cheese. Stir. spinach and stuffed hard cooked eggs in casserole. Reheat in moderate oven (375° F.) about 10 minutes. Serve at once.



Not Much Chance

MOSES was such a man. At many times in his life, if you had been there, you would have thought, he had very little chance to live. much less to succeed. Suppose you seen him in the first three months of his life? He was born under a death sentence; his parents were breaking the law of the land by keeping him alive at all

Then later if you had seen him in his sea-going bassinet among the reeds in the river, you might have thought: Will the contraption float? Even if a princess finds the baby, won't she know what he is and send him straight off to be killed?

Or years later, when Moses was a sort of pampered stepson of the palace, what promise was in him? Pharaoh's court was full always of proud young fellows spoiling for a fight. Moses might have looked to you just like another useless aristocrat. And then when Moses was out in the wilds, tending another man's sheep, married to an ignorant back-country lass who never understood him in the least; would you have put much faith in that discouraged old ranch-hand?

Ged's Man BUT don't judge a man by what his contemporaries say. We know now, we have known for

centuries, that Moses was one of God's greatest and best. Consider what the world owes to that one man. Of all his services, let us note three in particular. For one thing, we trace the Ten Comgandments back to him. Not that he was the first to call stealing or jultry or greediness wicked; men are known as much since early mes. But we do associate the Ten 'ommandments with Moses' name. le preached and taught that religion is ethical: that is, right living | is tied in with and tied up to right religion.

Faith and life flow into and support each other. Some religions declare that if a man pleases God that is all that matters; he can ride his neighbors as he pleases. Other religions (or substitutes for religion) say that if a man treats other men right he can let God go. Not so Moses; not so the Jews nor the Christians!

Moses was also the man through whom God revealed some of the most important truths we know about God. Moses taught his people, and through them teaches us, of a spiritual God, not like anything "in heaven above or the earth beneath or in the waters under the earth." God has "no manner of form." God is pure spirit, without a body like men or like anything.

To this day men find that hard to take in; but it is an important truth for any one who wants to think truly about God and to find


Moses and Christ

A BOVE all, there would have been no Christianity if Moses had never lived, or if he had failed. If the children of Israel had done what they wanted to do, slink back to Egypt and slavery, the whole great history of the Old Testament would have been unwritten. Poets and prophets would have died

Taxes Advance On Rural Real Estate; School Levy Highest

COLLEGE STATION, June .-Sharp increases in Texas farm and ranch real estate taxes during 1949 were revealed in a recent survey made by L. P. Gabbard, head of the Department of Agricultural Economics and Sociology, and Robert G. Cherry, professor cf agricultural economics, Texas A.

Levies made by State and local governments totaled an average of 25.7 cents per acre, raising from 22.4 cents the previous year. This is an increase of 3.3 cents per acre or 15 percent over the 1948

1949 was the third successive year that land taxes have advanc-ed say economists. During the 11 York led the advance with 54 year period, 1936-46, taxes were quite stable, varying only slightly from an average of 18 cents per acre. The typical farm or ranch tax bill in 1949 was 40 percent above that level.

Most of the rise in 1949 was accounted for by increases in State and school district taxes. County and special district levies have increased very little since 1948. The advance in the State rate on farm and ranch real estate from 42 cents per 100 dollar evaluation in 1948 to 72 cents was the largest item in the 1949



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
