

The total number of school districts dropped from 4,412 in 1948-49 to 2,492 operating districts during the last school year. A total of 1,300 of these consolidations were mandatory under new school school districts, however, voluntarily merged with other districts,"

Edgar said. In addition, the total number of county unit systems (one school system for an entire county) doubled, making the total twentyfour. Edgar also predicted that consolidations for the 1950-51 school year would total an additional 400, bringing the total number in the state down to approximately 2,000.

Most of the smaller schools the state could not afford adequate library and laboratory facilities, or equipment and teachers for vocational agriculture ,trades and industries, and home economic

courses, Edgar pointed out. "While there has been commendable increases in library, visual aid and departments," Dr. Edgar

"Vocational departments increased slightly more than 500 during the past year, making a total of 2,087 in the state," the commissioner declared. "The trend indicates that an additional 400 school districts will offer courses in agriculture ,home economics and trades and industries during

the 1950-51 school year. "With Texas being an agriculture state and gaining rapidly in the world of industry, we on the state level of education certainly encourage our school districts to offer a diversity of courses to train their students to lead Texas in advances in agriculture, home building and trades and indus-

N. C. Outlaw Sterling Williams Wheat Farmers Fight Seed Disease



Across the winter wheat belt, hundreds of seed cleaning and treating plants are at work preparing for the 1950 planting. Grain elevators and seed houses are processing seed through cleaners to take out weeds and broken kernels, and through treaters which mix "Ceresan" seed disinfectant on the seed to destroy the spores of stinking smut and disease organisms which cause seed rot.

The statewide deer and turkey season as well as the quail season are set by law and are not affected by the latest commission action. Deer and turkey seasons for the state at larg run from November 16 through December 31, inclusive, with a limit per hunter of 2 buck deer and 3 gobblers. The quail season is from December 1 to January 16, inclusive, with a bag limit of 12 per day and a possession limit of 36 per week.

The Commission ,after a lengthy hearing, authorized an increase in the quota of commercial fishing boat licenses from 1550 to 2325. It also approved experimental studies in connection with authorizing issuance of licenses for 14 additional menhaden seines, to be used until September 1.

Other action concerning the new Panhandle regulatory area include: squirrel season. May 1 to July 1 and from October 1 to December 31, with a bag limit of 5 per day and a possession limit of 5; trapping season on furbearing animais, December 1 through January 31, except muskrat, which will be December 1 to December 26; limiting crappie bag to 15 per day and 30 in possession and similar provisions for channel cat, with black bass limited to 6 per day and 12 in possession, and no bag limits for sunfish, perch, bream, blue cats and mud cats; counties excepting Armstrong, restricting each fisherman to one Randell and Briscoe. 

Working Together

"A HOME is a place to go when everything else has shut up" is not a true proverb. For if that is all it is, it is not a home. It is only a boarding house and not a very attractive one at that.

It is the people who live in it who make it. But just throwing people together within four walls, even if the people are closely related, will not make a home. When you read the story of Ruth you see one thing standing out: they were all working people.

To this day, there are fewer divorces in the country than in the cities, and one big reason for that is that courtry families have to work together, while city families often have little in common. In the country everybody turns to and

does something about the house, everybody helps everybody else; while in the cities where so much is done by machines and houses! are very small, there isn't much a! family can do together. Still, it is! worth while for any family to try to work out something that they can all do together.

Unity in Variety TT is striking that in the Bible the warmest expression of devotion shown by one person to another, is expressed by one woman to her mother-in-law, by Ruth to Naomi, Ruth was of a different race and generation and nation. Yet she takes Naomi's family for her own.

That illustrates another beautiful feature of living in a famfly. You learn to live with all Linds of people. Even in so small a group, no two are alike. And the thing that holds a family together almost better than anything else is not similar tastes in breakfast foods, or identical eduactions, or equality of age or temperament: it is common ideals, it is agreement about the important things in life.

What do you, for example, think is the greatest thing in the world? Do your family agree with you? If they do (or you with them) then you have a basis for a happy fami-. . .

Unity in Worship HIGH ideals, held by all in com-mon, are almost the best family cement; but better and best is religion. When you read the story of Ruth you are struck not only by their high ideals but by their natural, heart-felt, everyday religious faith. It comes out in the remarks of Boaz. It was one of the things that no doubt had attracted Ruth to the family in the first place. The climax of her famous promise to her mother-in-law is "thy God shall be my God."

It is at best confusing, and at worst tragic, when families are divided in their religious faith. Some one has said that when the father belongs to one denomination and the wife to another, the children are likely

to become Nothingarians. The old family pew, happily not out of style in many places, is more than a quaint custom. It is a fine symbol of family life at its best. Where are the most of the broken homes? Among the families where father and mother send the children to Sunday school while they themselves lie around at home reading the paper, or among the families where all go to the house of God together? A home without real religion is a home without its surest foundation.

Cockleburs Cause **Costly Swine Loss**

Perhaps it isn't too late this year yet for an effective warning on cockleburs, a hardy and prolific weed unknown in the plains until recent years, and a pest that is deadly to livestock if eaten in
