Full, Says Report

State mental hospitals are becoming increasingly overcrowded, the National Institute of Mental Health announced recently.

This does not necessarily mean that mental disease is increasing, the statement added. It noted that "increased availability of hospital space and personnel frequently influenced admission and resident patient population rates more than true changes in such mental ill-

But it does mean that the shortage in medical personnel at the hospitals is increasingly severe, the institute said. It surveyed 207 state institutions and their 600,000 patients in 1948.

Overcrowding increased almost 10 per cent during the year, the institute reported. At the end of 1947 the hospitals contained 16.7 per cent more patients than their rated bed capacity. At the end of 1948 the figure had increased to 18.2 per cent.

In three states-Arizona, Louisiana and Illineis-the patient population was about one and one-half times the rated hospital capacity. Only in South Dakota, North Carolina, Florida, Montana and Wyoming was the average occupancy below the rated hospital



The State Health Officer stressed the importance of scrupulous cleanliness of the person. Frequent bathing and immaculately clear clothing are vitally necestary Oral hygiene with thorough brushing of the teeth and the use of a mild antiseptic are recommended. The nasal passage should be kept clean and dental defects corrected immediately.

Sanitation and thorough cleanliness in the home are instinctive with the average housewife, but at this time their importance to health must be re-emphasized. Home sanitation includes those taken-for-granted measures as washing the dishes in hot soapy water and rinsing them in hot clear water; keeping sinks, bathtubs and fixtures scoured clean and rinsed with a mild antiseptic solution; sunning and airing bed clothes, ridding th ehome of flies, rats and roaches which, since poliomyelitis is believed to be a filth-born disease, are suspected as being responsible for trans-



But inspection of all cattle will continue for another two years or until veterinarians say the disease is wiped out. The vaccination campaign, under way since the middle of 1947, has cost the U.S. some \$2,000,000 a month, The Mexicans have supplied an equivalent amount in services of the army, personnel and supplies. The inspection will cost about half as much as the vaccination.

Better grades of scissors are held together with a nut and bolt instead of a rivet. This is desirable because they can be easily adjusted after sharpening or in case they need tightening. They should be kept dry to prevent rusting and use of a wooden pocket for storing is recommended.
