Any time animals are crowded through a gate there are going to be bruises on the sides, which will have to be cut away when the carcass is hanging on the rail. The meat cut away is not the only loss. The loss because of drop in grading of the piece amounts to much more than the piece cut away. If the bruise has to be cut out of the loin or any or less per pound as it would have been worth had it not been bruised.
