Fruit Orchard Check Is Due Now; Promising New Varieties Are Listed

Check over your fruit orchard now. Not only is your orchard of value for the fruit it bears, but it brings a colorful type of beauty to your door with its blossoms. Old world peoples valued—and still value—the beauty of the fruit tree in flower as much as they valued the fruits. We need to build up our appreciation for this colorful beauty.

your nursery stock, do so at once and thus insure getting the size trees you want, as well as varieties and delivery date. Here are some promising new fruit varieties, listed by John E. Hutchinson, associate extension horticulturist, Texas A&M College: Peaches—Dixiegem, with moderate cold requirement, large yellow freestone, five to six weeks ahead of Elberta; Southland, very large yellow freestone,

with low cold requirement, ripens one week ahead of Halehaven or about three weeks ahead of Elberta. For a freezing peach in the home orchard, Sunbeam is outstanding, ripens the last two weeks in June, is a yellow freestone, of good quality and non-browning, smaller than most standard varieties, but sets heavy crops. Pears—the Orient is listed as very resistant to fire blight, and of superior quality. A cover crop planted before trees are set is a help, if rain comes. Secure bulletin 73 on Orchard Management from Texas

A&M College This is an excellent reference book for use at tree planting time. Inspect your orchard carefully and prune where necessary, finishing this work before the Christmas season if possible. Bad weather later may postpone the pruning job until it is too late in the year. If limbs of trees are badly infested, with San Jose scale (a gray mass), remove and burn such. Follow a good spraying chart throughout the year for a successful orchard.

Kitchen planners should keep in mind the four phases of activity in the kitchen . . . preparing food, cooking, serving and cleaning and washing dishes, when they are making plans for the new kitchen.

Texas Polio Toll Reaches New High

A 20 per cent increase over the record 1949 total of polio cases is indicated for Texas this year on the basis of official figures.

According to the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis, Texas will have over 2,800 new cases of polio in 1950. Texas reported 2,684 cases up to November 18. During November and December in 1949, the state had 217 new cases. The Foundation, using this as a basis of what to expect this year, says Texas will have more than 2,800 cases. The 1949 total was 2,355. Meanwhile, Texas has received from the NFIP for patient care slightly more than \$322,708 more than the state sent in to the national headquarters during the last three years.

The state thus has had to depend on other states to handle the complete research financing burden and to even aid with care of Texas patients. Texas, which has been among the hardest hit of the states, has received almost one tenth of the cash advances made from the National Foundation. The state is counted on to make up the deficit when the only financing campaign for polio care and research is conducted—the 1951 March of Dimes, January 15-31.

Education Heads Seek Television For

Leading educators are asking the government this week to reserve one television channel in each large city for non-profit shows that will carry the three "R's" to adults and children alike. The drive will open with a demonstration of visual aids to teaching presented by the joint committee on education television before the Federal communications commission.

At least eight major teaching groups have combined in asking FCC to reserve one TV channel in each large city and educational center exclusive for non-profit educational telecasts.

Gen. Telford Taylor counsel for the educators, commented: "We plan to document our case with examples of educational television in order to show them (FCC) results of programming research for television exclusively."

"Some of our educators have developed extremely interesting and informational programs which will have their place in evening and nighttime program selection for the adult population.

"While some excellent things are being done by commercial televisions, stations and networks now tend to broadcast the same general types and categories of programs."

Taylor, former general counsel for FCC, stated that additional telecasting under the stewardship of universities and foundations, independent of advertising support, "offers the only way to give the television viewer a new and distinctive service and real choice of program types."

The joint committee concedes that it will be some time before potential educational stations can

New High School Goals Are Planned

New goals for high schools have been formulated after a three-year study by a commission of educators under the direction of the U. S. Office of Education. The program is called life-adjustment education.

There have been such rapid changes in our social and economic life that ways must be found to accelerate the changes needed in the secondary schools in order that the schools may be geared closely to life in the workaday world.

A typical high school today is a cross section of society itself, and the high school must serve the needs of the entire society rather than the selected few, the commission reports.

What is life-adjustment education?

The consensus of the commission can be summarized in part as follows:

It is for all American youth and offers them learning experience appropriate to their capacities.

It is concerned with ethical and moral living and with physical, mental and emotional health.

Above all, it recognizes the inherent dignity of the human personality.

It is education fashioned to achieve character.

It respects the dignity of work and recognizes the educational values of responsible work experience in the life of the community.

It recognizes that main events of importance happened long ago.

It secures the necessary money and work out operational details.

They are fearful, meanwhile, that all available channels will be allocated to commercial telecasters.

but holds that the real significance of these events is in their bearing upon life today.

It recognizes the importance of personal satisfactions and achievements for each individual within the limits of his abilities.

Rubber From Oil Process Saves Critical Materials

Successful production of synthetic rubber from butadiene without the use of critically short styrene, has been attained by oil scientists. The new rubber is made entirely from raw materials derived from petroleum. The process makes possible greatly speeded production of synthetic rubber without dependence on scarce materials.

Over half of the 10,000 to 12,000 geologists in the United States are engaged in the continuous search for new deposits of petroleum.

Childhood Happiness Idea Is Studied

The belief that "childhood is the happiest time of a person's life" is a tender sentiment that seems to have little or no basis in fact.

Letters received over a twelve-month period by the Parents' Consultation Service of The Book House for Children, dealt with more than 30 problems which commonly harass youngsters between birth and adolescent age.

In these letters, parents from all over the United States, Alaska, and Hawaii, expressed concern about a wide variety of physical, mental and emotional conditions that cause unhappiness in their children.

Finds "Rivals"

There are letters that tell of children who have been rejected by other children because they are "different" in some way. From their mothers' report it is quite evident that these children suffer just as keenly as any adult who has failed to achieve social acceptance.

The conflicts that arise in the older child who is suddenly confronted with a "rival" in the form of a new baby brother, are no less agonizing and probably no more imaginary than those of the mother who feels a new daughter-in-law has displaced in her son's affections.

Many Causes

A child's humiliation because

of failure to pass in school, or to qualify for certain school activities or teams, is just as intense as that of the adult who gets fired from his job or does not get the promotion he expected.

Nor is an adult any more devastated by the discovery that his boss regards him with contempt and has no respect for his opinions than is a child by the realization that his teacher thinks he isn't very smart in school.

In using their measuring stick of values for appraising a child's problems, adults frequently fail to realize how important they may be to him and how detrimental to his peace of mind and to his personality.

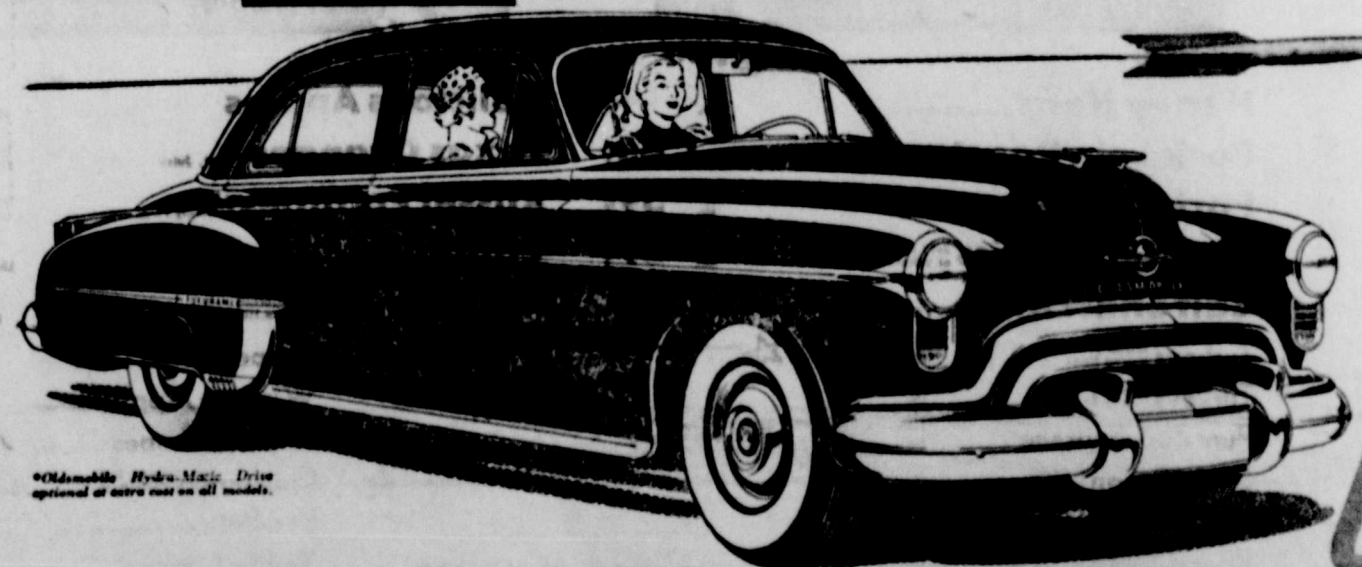

H. D. Clubs Study Color In Clothing

The Home Demonstration clubs of Dickens County have studied color during the month of November. According to Mrs. Harriette Hatcher, county home demonstration agent, who gave the demonstrations on color, the women received basic principles in color that will apply not only to the phase of clothing that they will be studying during the year of 1951, but also to any composition in which color may be used.

Mrs. Hatcher explained that the sun is the ultimate source of color. Sunlight can be broken down into three basic colors of red, yellow and blue from which all other colors are derived. These colors can be seen in the rainbow in the heaven as the sunlight passes through drops of rain which acts as little prisms that break the sunlight into its different colors. Many have noticed the same example as the lawn sprinkler has been in operation in the sunlight. As the agent placed colors in a circle she explained the basic colors of red, yellow and blue; the secondary colors of green, orange and violet; and the intermediate colors of yellow-green, blue-green, blue-violet, red-violet, red-orange and yellow-orange.

With the colors in a circle Mrs. Hatcher explained the graying of colors, the knowledge of which is necessary to one who mixes colors, if pleasing results are to be accomplished. The colors in relation to their position on the circle became an important guide in the selection of color schemes.

Colors have decided effects upon the emotions of people and therefore it is well that they know how to select the colors that are the most becoming and pleasing to them. During the demonstration the agent tried materials of different colors on members of the home demonstration clubs, to help them to select colors that are becoming and to show how some colors enhance and others detract from one's appearance.

Because of the great amount of interest in the Color Demonstration Mrs. Hatcher states that she will be glad to give the demonstration to other groups if they will contact her and make arrangements for a suitable time.

Duck Creek Soil Conservation News

Last week Luther Bowen who farms near Girard showed Soil Conservation Service technicians a field trial that he has made using cane sorghum for green manure.

Bowen told the technicians about the 12 acre field on which he had grown and turned under two crops of cane this year. He explained that he wanted to build up his soil and figured that a green manure crop would help. "To get two crops in the same year," Bowen told them, "I first planted the cane in rows. As soon as it got waist high I took some more seed and broadcast them by hand over it," he went on, "and then I turned under that first crop. That covered the seed I had broadcast and they soon came up. This time," Bowen said, "I let it get waist high before I turned it and that caused some of it to be left on top of the ground."

The technicians were surprised to find that moisture conditions on the land where the cane was turned under were better than on the land that had been turned under the first time. When the cane had been turned under they found the soil to be moist to a depth of 40 inches, and near the surface it was wet enough to make the clay ball up. Where the cane had been grown on the same type of soil, dry dirt was reached at 20 inches and in some places there was not enough moisture to make the clay stick to-
