THE FULL meaning of what the Bible has to tell us about God can be discovered best by coming toward an understanding of what the covenant idea means. What is meant by the Covenant God, one who makes covenants with men?

First of all, it means that God is living. He is not a mere observer of events with which He has nothing to do. If we could put it into moders American language, God does not at in the bleachers; He plays the game. He does not, as it were, read the newspapers to see how the war against evil goes on; He is out on the field directing the battles.

God is not something to be talked about, a problem, an X; He is not a creation of men's minds, God is not a name for an idea. He is more alive than any one who thinks about Him, He is more real than any who ever doubted Him.
