

Progress Made In Milk Preservation

The old question about the challenge to dairymen concerning better processes for making canned whole fresh milk suitable for long periods of keeping has not been satisfactorily answered.

One source mentions at least three processes as examples of efforts that have proven more or

less successful. Those are by the Wood-Jon Dairy, Schwarz of San Francisco, and the Perisault Canadian cream product.

USDA's Bureau of Dairy Industry continues to work on the problem, but has not yet found the answer. Some progress has been made, however, as revealed in a recent release on the subject, which we quote:

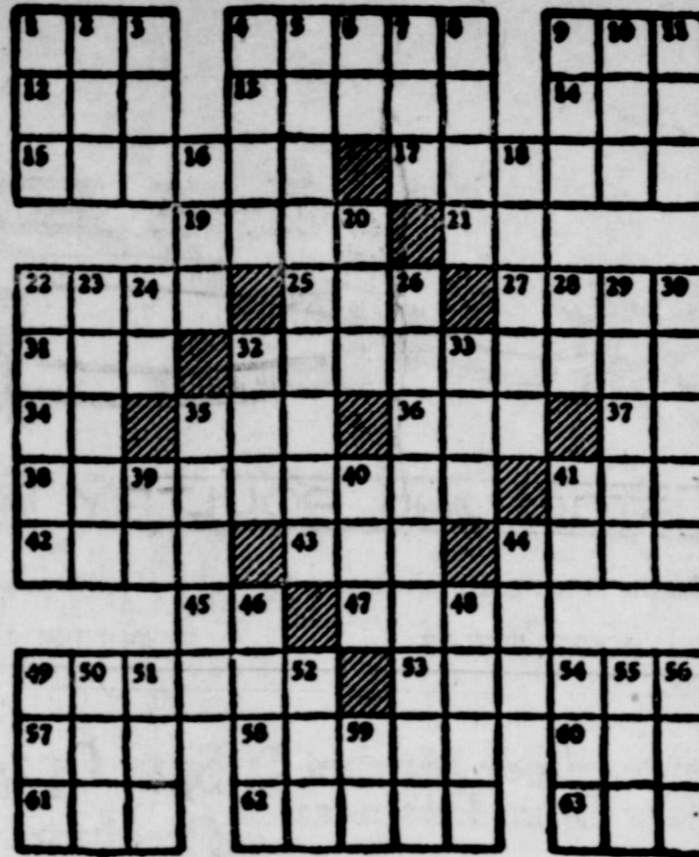
"There is as yet no completely satisfactory method for the preservation of milk that will yield a product comparable in quality

that it may be possible in the near future to preserve milk, either in frozen or sterilized form, that will be acceptable as beverage milk. It is possible to do this now, but there are serious limitations on the condition and time of storage.

"At present there is a great deal of interest in means of supplying fluid milk of good quality to consumers a long distance from producing areas. Reconstituted evaporated milk is one possibility, except for its cooked flavor. We are investigating the cooked flavor

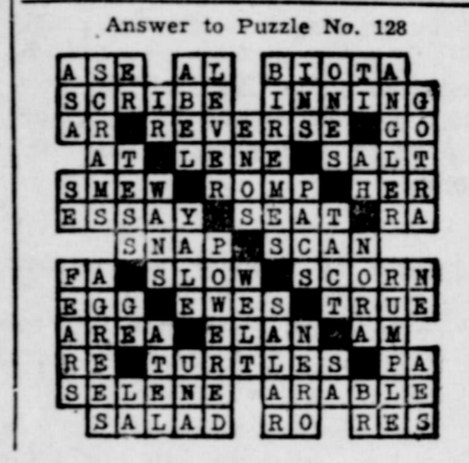

by using less heat for the shorter times, and the other is the use of antibiotics with mild heating.

Intensifies Settling of Protein
 "But use of these methods intensifies the settling of protein in the sterile milk during storage. Research is planned along two lines to overcome this difficulty. One is to attempt to regulate the size of the protein particles so as to greatly reduce their rate of settling. The other is to attempt to associate the fat and protein so that the fat will buoy up the protein and prevent it from settling."

"Reconstituted dried whole milk is being used in some areas as fluid milk. It has less cooked flavor than evaporated milk, but often has oxidized flavors, and frequently it is difficult to reconstitute.

"Another method used to produce a fluid milk at a distance from producing areas is to reconstitute it from non-fat dry milk solids, dry butteroil, and water. Proper heat treatment of the skim milk before drying, and regulation of particle size to make reconstitution easy, are being investigated.

"Preservation of milk in the frozen state offers still another means of supplying fluid milk to consumers in distant places. Flavor and texture difficulties have required research aimed at finding their cause and possible remedies."

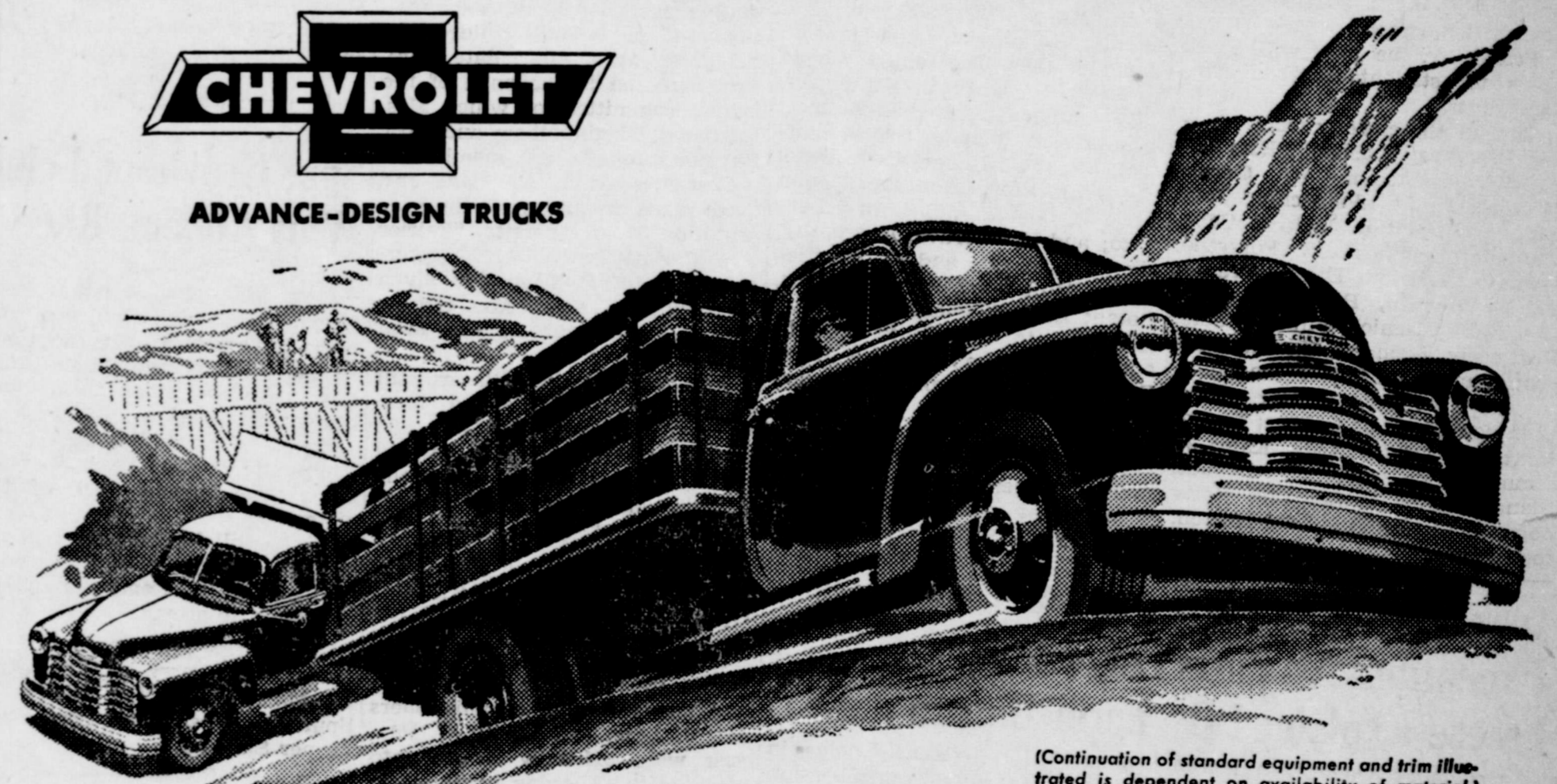

Members of the O. E. S. and Masonic Lodge are invited to attend this service.

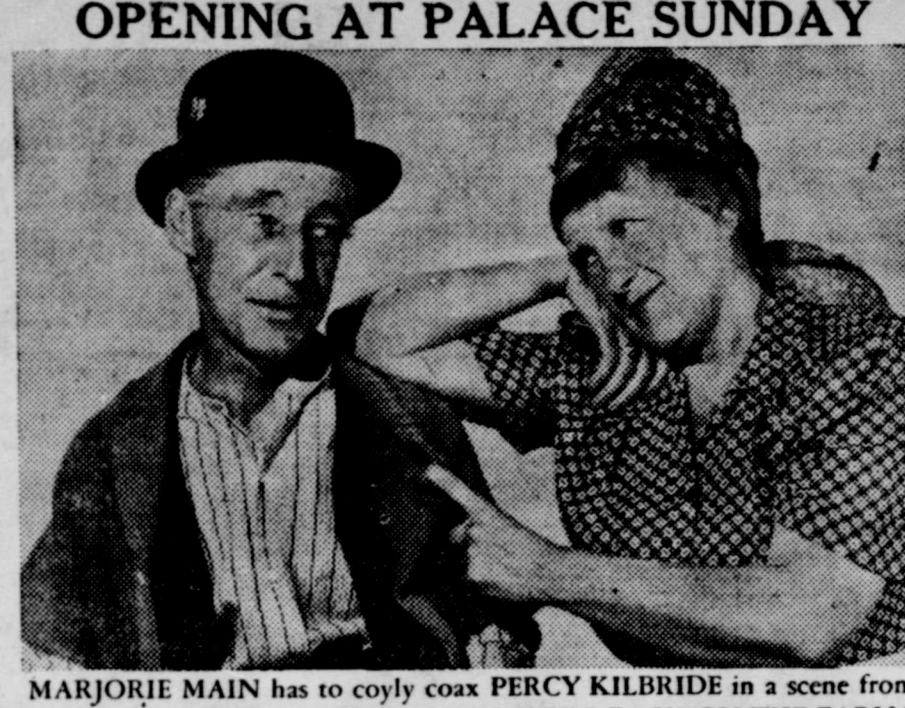
Wesleyan Guild Hears Program

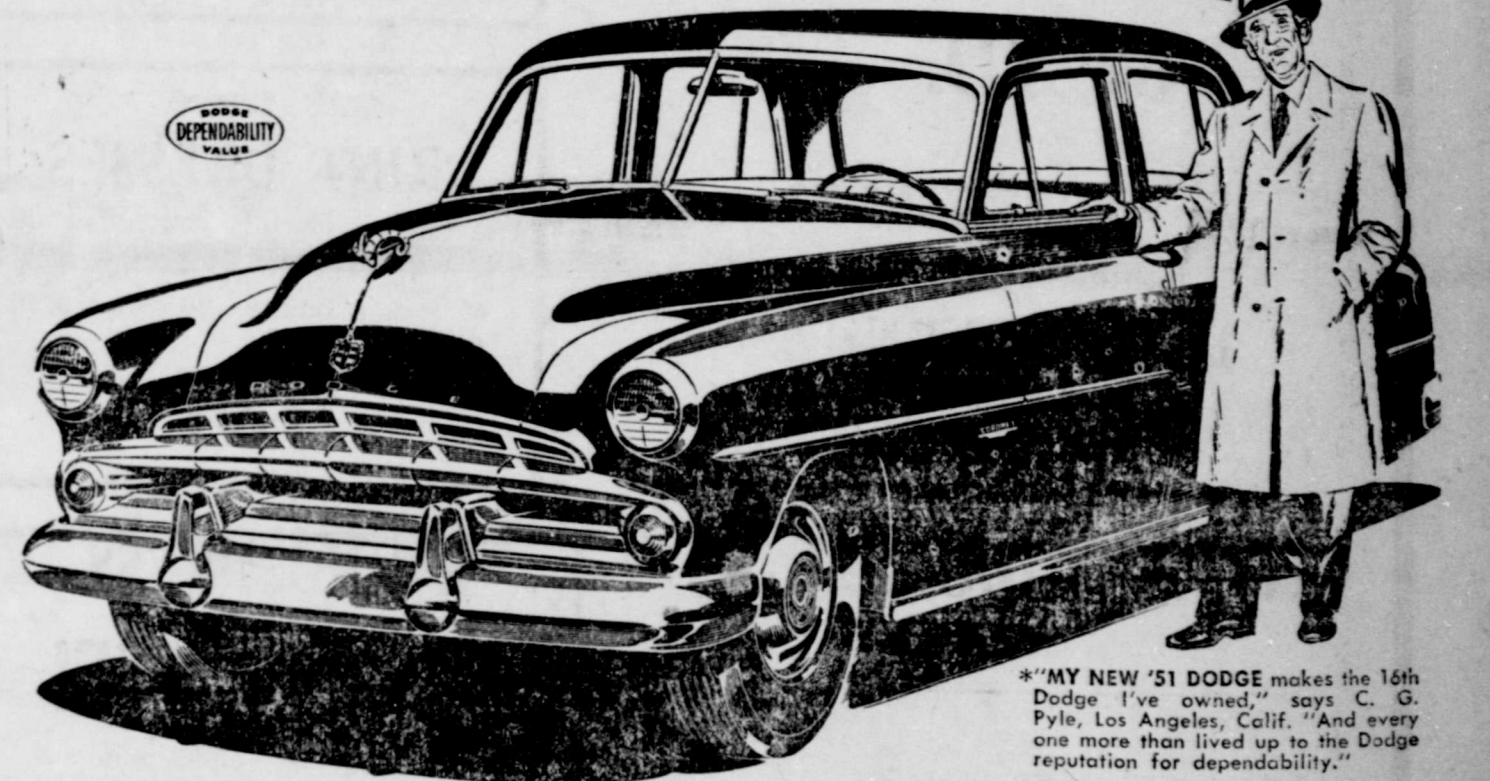

Cortisone-Producing Plant Is Sought

Agriculture scientists are hopeful that they can find a plant for making cortisone, the miracle anti-arthritis drug. They point out that if they find one it will mean a new crop for farmers.

Cortisone now is made from ox bile, an inadequate and high-priced method. The scientists feel sure they will find a suitable plant from which to make cortisone in great quantities and economical.

Other plants studied by D. J. J. Williams, head of the department's biochemical division of the eastern research laboratory in Philadelphia, says that many plants contain steroids, a substance which can be made into cortisone.

The problem, says he, is to find a plant that contains enough of steroids to justify development of the species into a crop plant.

This substance, according to Williams, occurs most common in the lily family. Government plant collectors and chemists are blanketing the western hemisphere to find a member of the lily family which will produce enough steroids to produce cortisone cheaply, and which can be grown on U. S. farms.

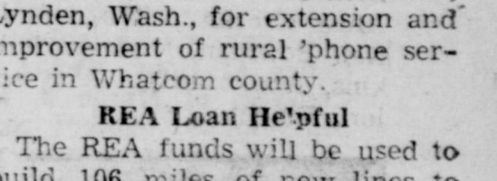
The Rural Electrification administration, meanwhile, has approved a \$1,087,000 loan for the Farmers Mutual Telephone Co., Lynden, Wash., for extension and improvement of rural phone service in Whatcom county.

REA Loan Helpful

The REA funds will be used to build 106 miles of new lines to bring telephone service for the first time to 1,626 rural subscribers in the county.

When the expansion under the loan is completed, officials say the company will operate a modern dial telephone system serving 7,024 subscribers over 779 miles of line.

Electric Co-ops To Get Material

A lump allocation of aluminum and copper to the Rural Electrification Administration was ordered recently by Interior Secretary Chapman of the Defense Emergency Power Administration.

The DEPA is a defense arm of the Interior department charged with allocation of scarce strategic materials to private power companies and government-backed electrification co-ops.

The more than 1,000 REA co-

operatives, which provide electric power for farmers were affected by a 20 percent cut-back in the use of aluminum and copper under defense mobilization rulings.

McManus, president of the Southern company, a private power holding company, planned to investigate each REA co-operative to find out whether it duplicated existing power lines before authorizing use of strategic materials.

REA Administrator Claude Wickard balked on the plan. He said it would hamper and delay REA construction and servicing of farms at a time when electricity is vital to farm defense production.

Agreement to Be Sought
The lump allocation plan, however, applies only to the second quarter of 1951, Chapman emphasizes—pending development of a permanent plan to be worked out between McManus and Wickard.

The Agriculture department, meanwhile, announces that the U. S. has fulfilled its export quota under the international wheat agreement for 1950-51.

Officials say the U. S. quota of 248,164,000 bushels is now filled and sales of wheat and flour, regardless of destination, will no longer qualify for export payments under the agreement.

Under the agreement, the U. S. was obligated to sell that amount of wheat abroad at the maximum price of \$1.80 a bushel. Exporters are now free to sell their wheat at any price and to any nation.



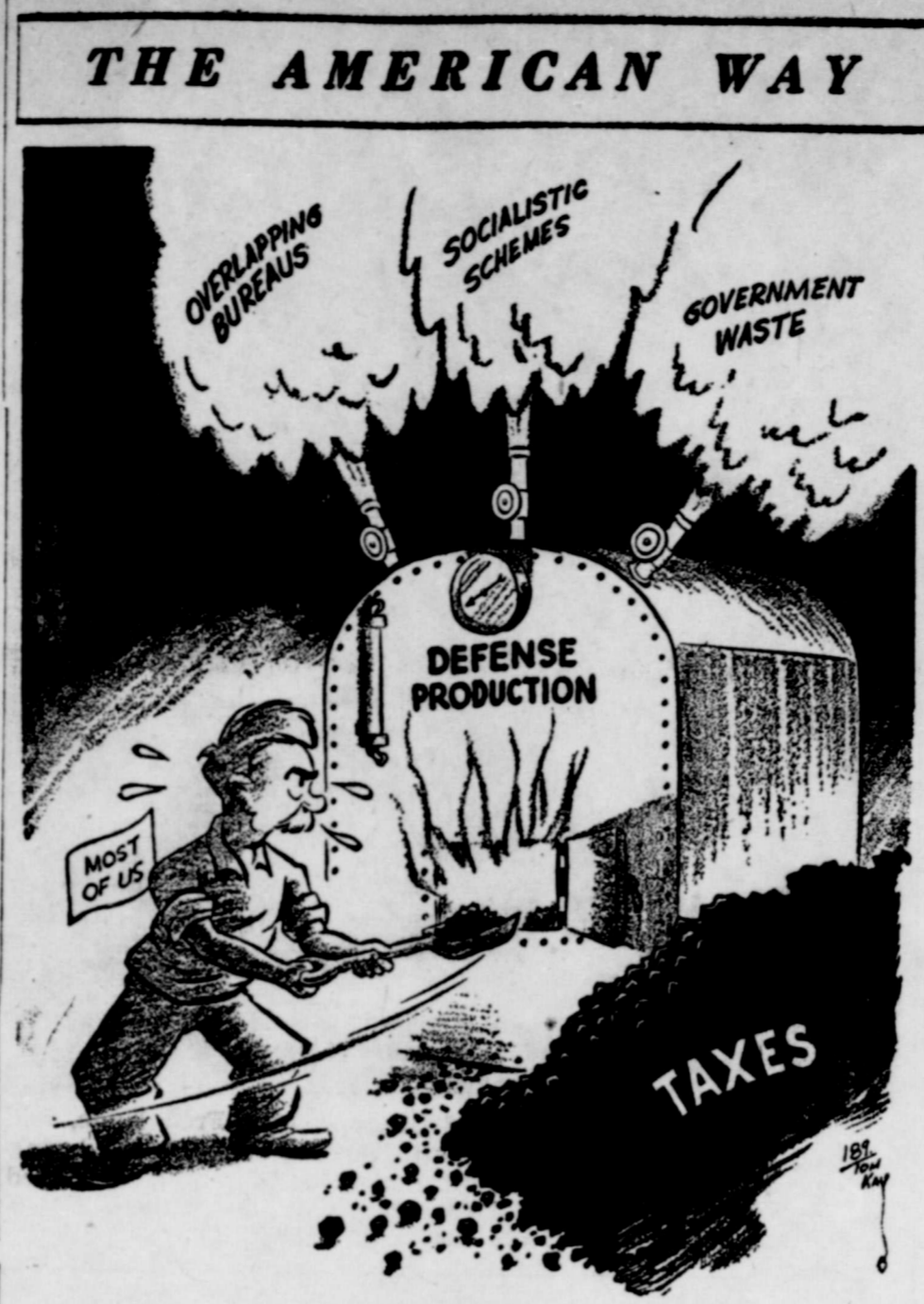

New Plane Designed For Crop Spraying

More than 6,000 airplanes will be used this year to dust and spray farm crops, it was estimated recently by the government.

The estimate was made by a Civil Aeronautic Administration official at the unveiling of a new type of agricultural airplane designed specially to haul and spread fertilizer, insecticides and other chemicals to increase crop productivity.

The government spokesman said

that about 5,000 planes were used by farmers in 1950. The number is expected to climb this year because of demands for record harvests.

The new airplane is being produced by the Piper Aircraft Corp., Lockhaven, Pa. It was developed independently of a government-sponsored project to design a plane especially suited to farm needs.

The Piper craft can carry a half ton of chemicals and takes off and lands within 325 feet. It can be equipped with four-wheel landing gear to operate from extremely rough, rocky or soft, sandy fields.

Both government and industry officials say that farming by air is the coming thing—in fact, it has arrived. They believe that much of the increase in farm production this year will be due to aircraft.

They admit, however, that the farm airplane has limited uses. It is valuable for large farms, but not for small ones. Only certain crops can be sprayed, seeded or

fertilized by air, such as cotton, rice and wheat.

Piper aircraft officials say the airplane's biggest asset to farmers is the amount of labor that can be saved through its use—an especially attractive angle considering forecasts of labor shortages in the offing this year.

been discovered by a University of Texas scientist.

The development, reported by the Texas Cotton Research Committee, is termed by Dr. Vernon L. Frampton, University research scientist, as a method "expected to strengthen all types of cotton products."

The scientist and his associates said they found the process by accident while conducting experiments to find a way to stop degrading effects of fungi, bacteria and the sun's ultra-violet rays on cotton fibers.

The scientist compares the thing to a long freight train, saying that a cellulose (cotton) molecule consists of a long line of carbon atoms attached to each other, like a long train, and each carbon atom carries around itself hydrogen and oxygen atoms. The cotton deteriorates because micro-organisms and the sun's rays attack the cellulose-molecule train, uncoupling the cars, which turn into glucose (grape sugar) units. That process, he said, is what makes a shirt or sheet rip unexpectedly after some use.

They said they were trying to measure the caboose on the cellulose molecules when they made the fiber-strengthening discovery.

In treating the molecules with hydrocyanic acid, which is a "cousin" of the extremely poisonous potassium cyanide, they found that a carbon atom was added to each.

The discovery is called quite an advance in the long-range program started in 1947 to develop resistance in cotton fibers to all

deterioration. It is a part of the extensive program of the Texas Cotton Research Committee.

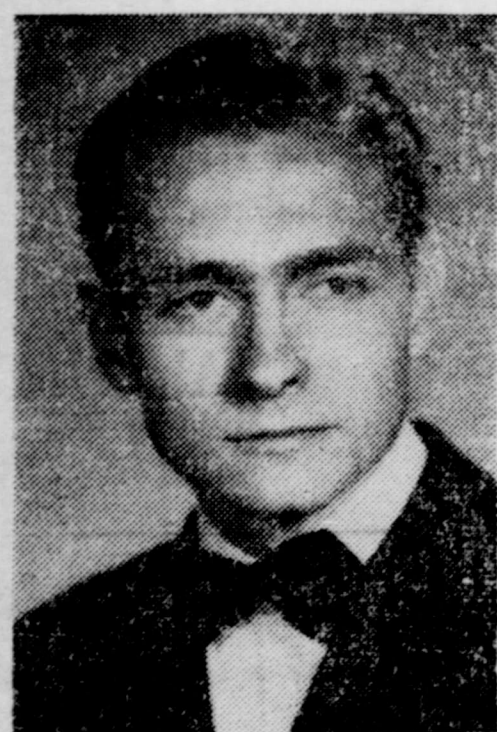

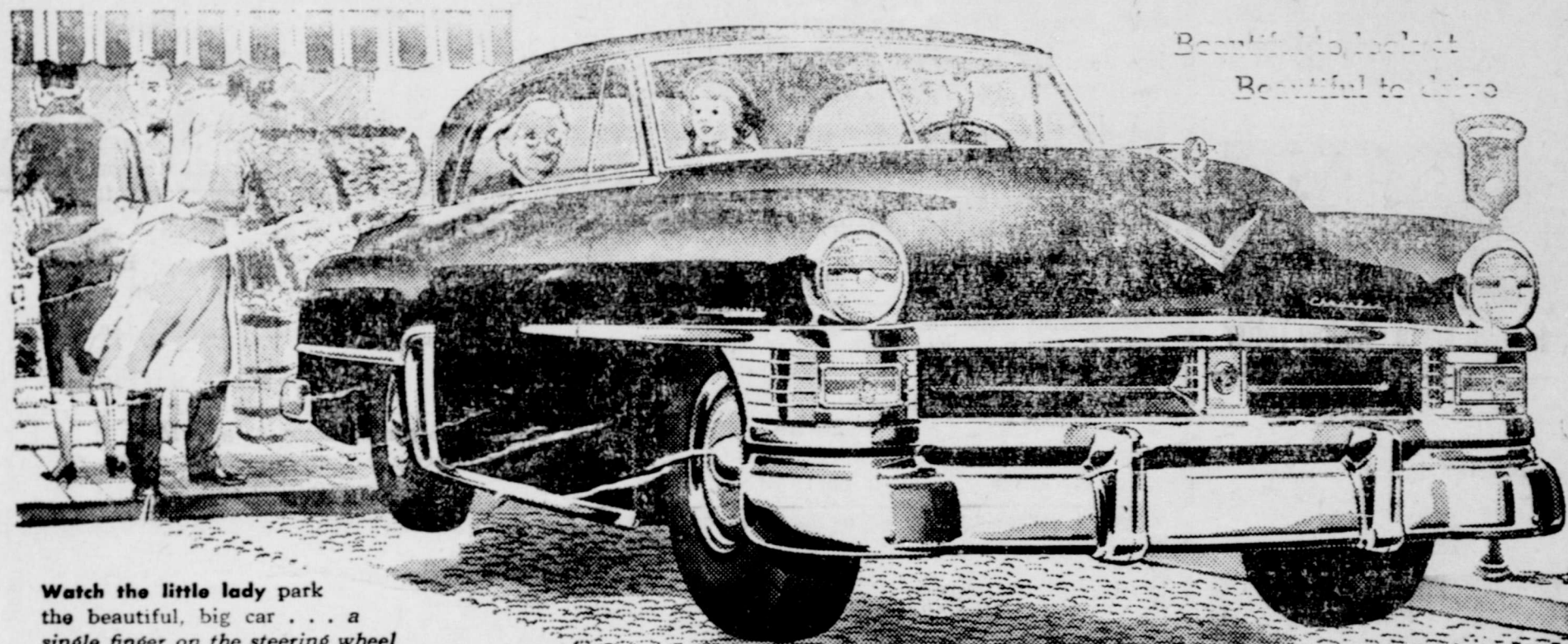

Dickens County Farm Bureau News... Exceptions To Farm Labor Wage-Freeze Explained By Farm Bureau

Farm labor wages are frozen. Questions relative to this matter have come to the office in the last few days. The general wage stabilization regulation No. 1, issued Jan. 29, 1951, made no exception for farmers or farm laborers as such.
Exceptions made in the regulations provide (1) for increases for merit if it is a part of an already established plan, (2) for a 10 per cent increase above the wage paid for the same job on Jan. 15, 1950, and (3) that the ceiling shall not cause a wage to be lower than that paid during the period May 24, 1950 to June 24, 1950.
No employer shall pay and no employee shall receive wages or other compensation at a rate in excess of the rate at which such employee was compensated on Jan. 23, 1951, without prior approval of the Wage Stabilization Board.

Parade To Open Stock Show Saturday; Officials Ready For Record Entry

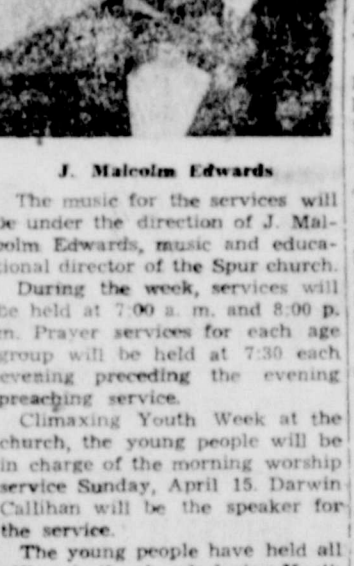
The Dickens county F. F. A. and 4-H club Fat Stock show committee announced this week that plans are being completed for a colorful parade to open the show Saturday.

The old question about the challenge to dairymen concerning better processes for making canned whole fresh milk suitable for long periods of keeping has not been satisfactorily answered.

One source mentions at least three processes as examples of efforts that have proven more or

less successful. Those are by the Wood-Jon Dairy, Schwarz of San Francisco, and the Perisault Canadian cream product.

USDA's Bureau of Dairy Industry continues to work on the problem, but has not yet found the answer. Some progress has been made, however, as revealed in a recent release on the subject, which we quote:

"There is as yet no completely satisfactory method for the preservation of milk that will yield a product comparable in quality

that it may be possible in the near future to preserve milk, either in frozen or sterilized form, that will be acceptable as beverage milk. It is possible to do this now, but there are serious limitations on the condition and time of storage.

"At present there is a great deal of interest in means of supplying fluid milk of good quality to consumers a long distance from producing areas. Reconstituted evaporated milk is one possibility, except for its cooked flavor. We are investigating the cooked flavor

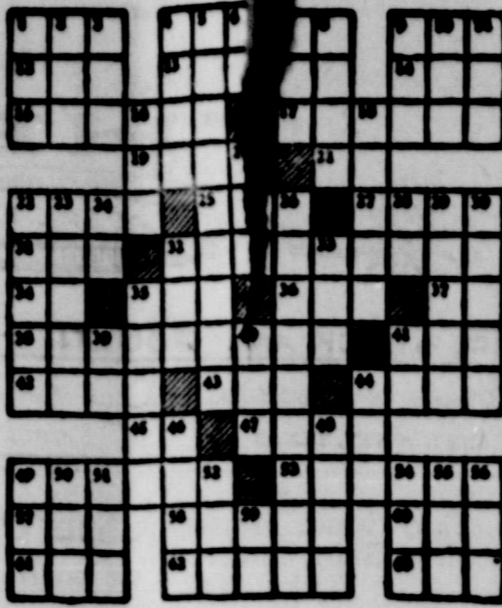

by using less heat for the shorter times, and the other is the use of antibiotics with mild heating.

Intensifies Settling of Protein

"But use of these methods intensifies the settling of protein in the sterile milk during storage. Research is planned along two lines to overcome this difficulty. One is to attempt to regulate the size of the protein particles so as to greatly reduce their rate of settling. The other is to attempt to associate the fat and protein so that the fat will buoy up the protein and prevent it from settling.

"Reconstituted dried whole milk is being used in some areas as fluid milk. It has less cooked flavor than evaporated milk, but often has oxidized flavors, and frequently it is difficult to reconstitute.

"Another method used to produce a fluid milk at a distance from producing areas is to reconstitute it from non-fat dry milk solids, dry butteroil, and water. Proper heat treatment of the skim milk before drying, and regulation of particle size to make reconstitution easy, are being investigated.

"Preservation of milk in the frozen state offers still another means of supplying fluid milk to consumers in distant places. Flavor and texture difficulties have required research aimed at finding their cause and possible remedies."

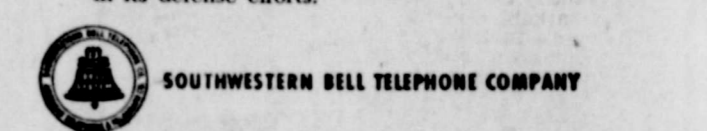

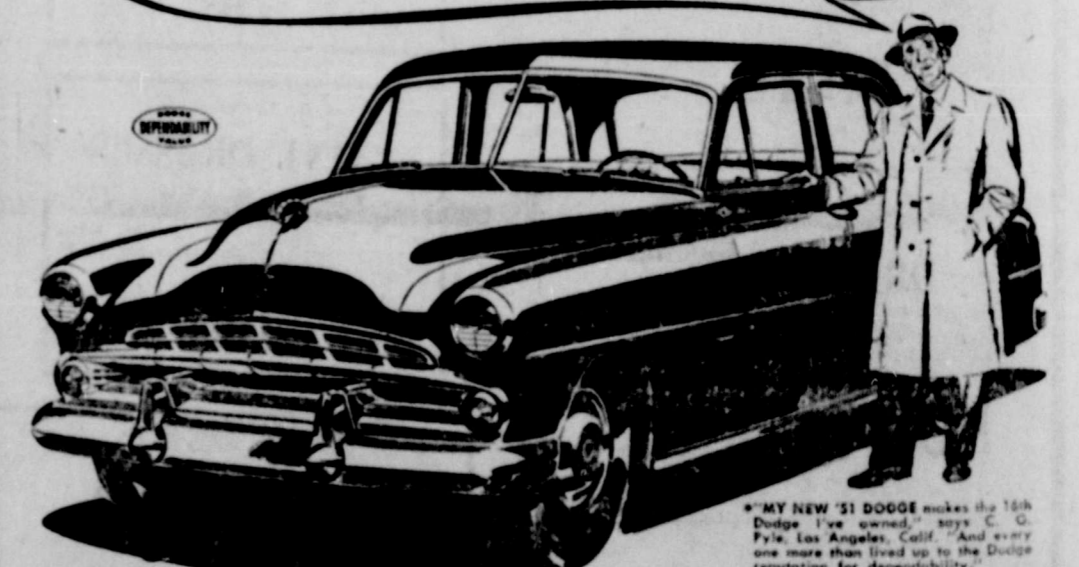

Cortisone-Producing Plant Is Sought

Agriculture scientists are hopeful that they can find a plant for making cortisone, the miracle anti-arthritis drug. They point out that if they find one it will mean a new crop for farmers.

Cortisone now is made from ox bile, an inadequate and high-priced method. The scientists feel sure they will find a suitable plant from which to make cortisone great quantities and economical.

Other plants studied by J. J. Wilbourn, head of 1 department's biological division of the eastern research laboratory in Philadelphia, says that many plants contain steroids, a substance which can be made into cortisone.

The problem, says he, is to find a plant that contains enough steroids to justify development of the species into a crop plant.

These scientists, regarding Willman, occurs most common in theilly family. Government plant collectors and chemists are blanketing the western hemisphere to find a member of theilly family which will produce enough steroids to produce cortisone cheaply, and which can be grown on U. S. farms.

The Rural Electrification administration, meanwhile, has approved a \$1,087,000 loan for the Farmers Mutual Telephone Co., Lynden, Wash., for extension and improvement of rural phone service in Whatcom county.

REA Loan Helpful

The REA funds will be used to build 196 miles of new lines to bring telephone service for the first time to 1,026 rural subscribers in the county.

When the expansion under the loan is completed, officials say the company will operate a modern dial telephone system serving 7,024 subscribers over 779 miles of line.

Electric Co-ops To Get Material

A lump allocation of aluminum and copper to the Rural Electrification administration was ordered recently by Interior Secretary Chapman of the Defense Emergency Power administration.

The DEPA is a defense arm of the Interior department charged with allocation of scarce strategic materials to private power companies and government-backed electrification co-ops.

The more than 1,000 REA co-

operatives, which provide electric power for farmers were affected by a 20 percent cut-back in the use of aluminum and copper under defense mobilization rulings.

McManus, president of the Southern company, a private power holding company, planned to investigate each REA co-operative to find out whether it duplicated existing power lines before authorizing use of strategic materials.

REA Administrator Claude Wickard balked on the plan. He said it would hamper and delay REA construction and servicing of farms at a time when electricity is vital to farm defense production.

Agreement to Be Sought
The lump allocation plan, however, applies only to the second quarter of 1951, Chapman emphasizes—pending development of a permanent plan to be worked out between McManus and Wickard.

The Agriculture department, meanwhile, announces that the U. S. has fulfilled its export quota under the international wheat agreement for 1950-51.

Officials say the U. S. quota of 248,164,000 bushels is now filled and sales of wheat and flour, regardless of destination, will no longer qualify for export payments under the agreement.

Under the agreement, the U. S. was obligated to sell that amount of wheat abroad at the maximum price of \$1.80 a bushel. Exporters are now free to sell their wheat at any price and to any nation.

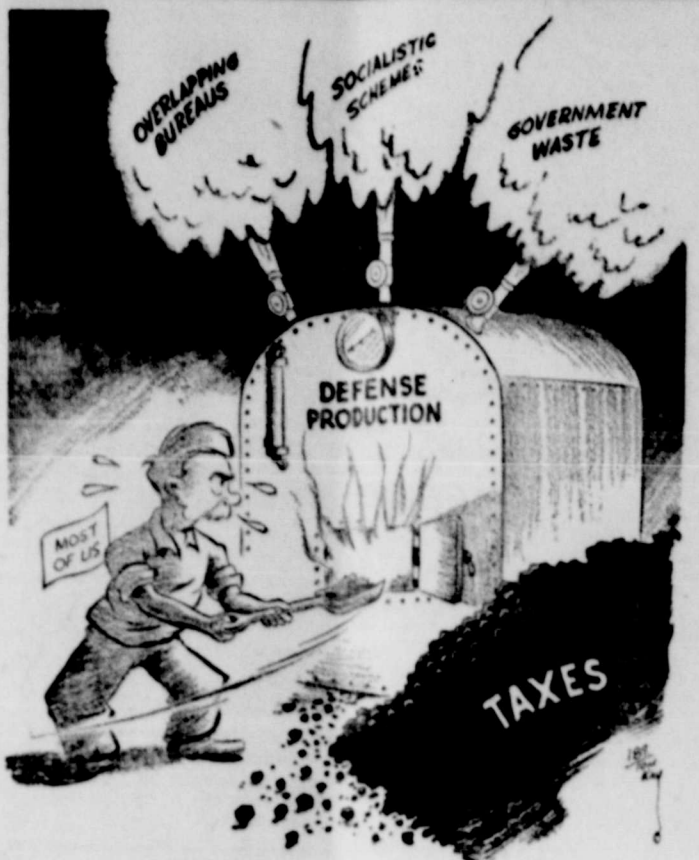
New Plane Designed For Crop Spraying

More than 6,000 airplanes will be used this year to dust and spray farm crops, it was estimated recently by the government.

The estimate was made by a Civil Aeronautic administration official at the unveiling of a new type of agricultural airplane designed specially to haul and spread fertilizer, insecticides and other chemicals to increase crop productivity.

The government spokesman said

that about 5,000 planes were used by farmers in 1950. The number is expected to climb this year because of demands for record harvests.

The new airplane is being produced by the Piper Aircraft Corp., Lock Haven, Pa. It was developed independently of a government-sponsored project to design a plane especially suited to farm needs.

The Piper craft can carry a half ton of chemicals and takes off and lands within 325 feet. It can be equipped with four-wheel landing gear to operate from extremely rough, rocky or sandy fields.

Both government and industry officials say that farming by air is the coming thing—in fact, it has arrived. They believe that much of the increase in farm production this year will be due to aircraft.

They admit, however, that the farm airplane has limited uses. It is valuable for large farms, but not for small ones. Only certain crops can be sprayed, seeded or

Process Adds To Fiber Strength

Expected to greatly strengthen the life of cotton garments that are laundered in soap, a method to make cotton fibers stronger by 10 per cent or more by treating them with hydrocyanic acid has

been discovered by a University of Texas scientist.

The development, reported by the Texas Cotton Research Committee, is termed by Dr. Vernon L. Frampton, University research scientist, as a method "expected to strengthen all types of cotton products."

The scientist and his associates said they found the process by accident while conducting experiments to find a way to stop degrading effects of fungi, bacteria and the sun's ultra-violet rays on cotton fibers.

The scientist compares the thing to a long freight train, saying that a cellulose (cotton) molecule consists of a long line of carbon atoms attached to each other, like a long train, and each carbon atom carries around itself hydrogen and oxygen atoms. The cotton deteriorates because micro-organisms and the sun's rays attack the cellulose-molecule's train, uncoupling the cars, which turn into glucose (grape sugar) units. That process, he said, is what makes a shirt or sheet rip unexpectedly after some use.

They said they were trying to measure the calboose on the cellulose molecules when they made the fiber-strengthening discovery.

In treating the molecules with hydrocyanic acid, which is a "cousin" of the extremely poisonous potassium cyanide, they found that a carbon atom was added to each.

The discovery is called quite an advance in the long-range program started in 1947 to develop resistance in cotton fibers to all

deterioration. It is a part of the extensive program of the Texas Cotton Research Committee.

Silage is a basic feed. A silo filled with good silage is mighty good insurance against pasture failure. Dairymen and other live-

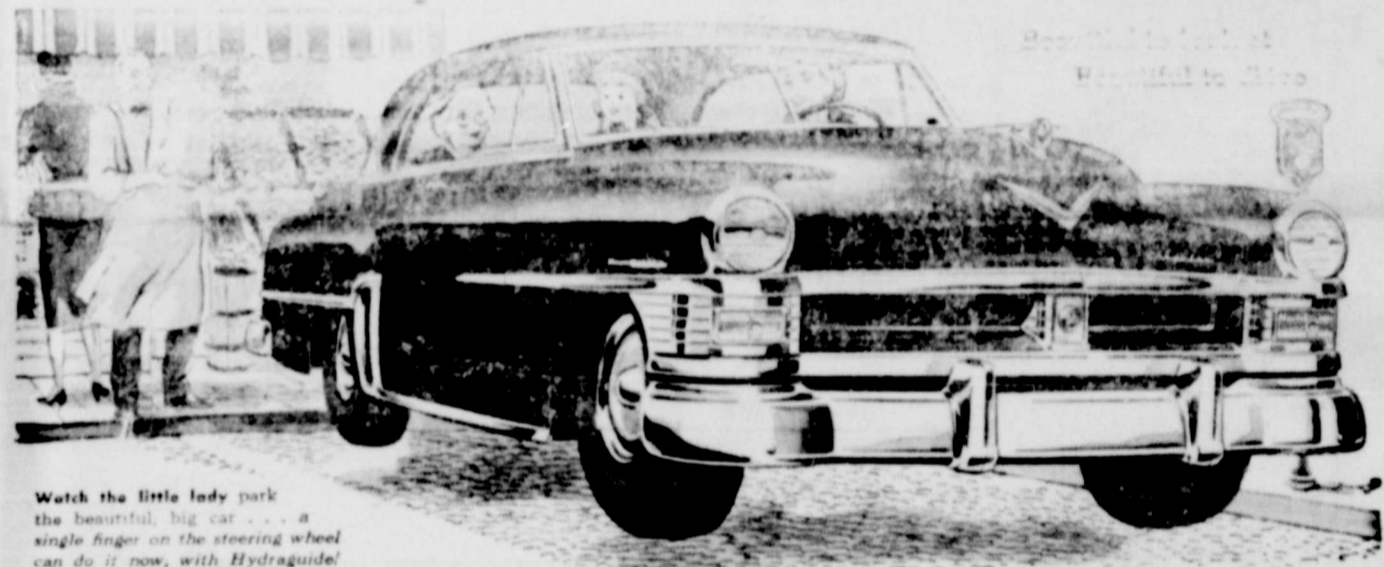

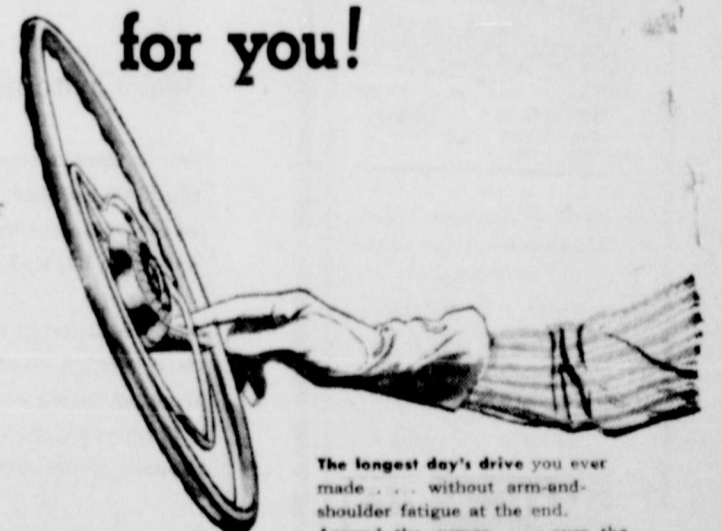
