

Electronic Device Is Cancer Detector

A kind of electronic "adding machine" which may permit automatic detecting of cancer cells is being developed.


It may even ring a bell or buzz a buzzer when such a cell is detected. The American Association for Cancer Research heard a description of the device recent-

And, if it is perfected as envisioned, said Dr. Robert C. Mellors, it will offer opportunities for the "mass screening" of the entire population of the country. Such screening would separate many non-cancerous people from those suspected of having major forms of the disease.

Essentially, the device would work this way:

Tissue cells under examination would activate electronic devices in the machine in such a way that numbers would automatically appear on a dial-just like figures on an adding machine. Numbers at various levels would be characteristic of different types of cells, so the operator of the machine could quickly estimate whether a particular cell was normal or possibly cancerous. And, it would be uasy to incorporate certain sound-making instruments to alert the operator.

The instrument is designed to save time for the cancer diagnosistician rather than to be a diagnostic tool in itself, Dr. Mellor declared. Any final diagnosis of cancer would be the province of a cancer specialist, he explained.
