Chamber of Commerce Doings. SPUR EXPERIMENT DISCUSSED BY WTCC COMMITTEE IN AMARILLO

On November 18, David McAteer was officially elected by the managers and presidents of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce to serve on the board of directors of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce. Mr. McAteer succeeds J. D. McCain whose term officially ended this month. McCain has done a commendable work and gained recognition throughout West Texas.

The Spur Experiment Station was the subject of discussion in a meeting of the agriculture committee of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce meeting this week in Amarillo.

O. M. McGinty is the committee man from Spur and explained in an informal discussion some of the problems of farmers in this area. Some of the subjects mentioned were tenant-farmer relations, mesquite control and erosion, water and soil conservation, and the prospect of multi-cultured meetings of farmers for the purpose of discussing erosion and soil conservation. McGinty took an active part in the meeting and helped formulate the policies of the committee by making suggestions and citing problems.

The Spur Experiment Station was praised for the excellent experimental work being done in its four-point program, and it was especially praised for the mesquite control program. It seemed that the local experiment station was used as a measuring stick of agricultural activities in an area covering a large portion of Texas.

A vote was taken on the program of work for the agriculture committee of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce and was adopted unanimously. The program included the promotion of the above-mentioned projects.

J. D. McCain, David McAteer and Grady Elder also attended this and other meetings.

Delegates of the Spur Chamber of Commerce talked to Senator Kilmer B. Corbin, president of the Broadway to Big Bend Highway Association, and E. H. Thornton, chairman of the Texas Highway Commission, in regard to the highway from Spur to Post at the meeting in Amarillo last week. The completion of the road will be a slow process, but with the recent allocation of thirteen miles of road toward Spur by the Garza County Court the prospects look much better.

Senator Corbin stated that it was a most essential highway and would be built, but that it will take time. E. H. Thornton stated before the entire assembly that the improvement of secondary roads of the state was urgently needed but that the state was in critical need of more revenue in order to build this type of road.

The merchants' committee of the local Chamber of Commerce has called a mass meeting of all merchants in Spur for Wednesday at 10 a. m. in the Lions-Rotary club hall. The meeting time was decided on Monday morning in a meeting of the committee.

The committee also discussed the Christmas program and special events which promise a good holiday season for Spur. The Treasure Hunt Day will feature Santa Claus with all his reindeer on December 4.

Progress Noted In Spur Schools Music Program Under Director Melvin King

An important phase of the education of the young people of the Spur schools has been handled quite capably for more than two years now by Melvin King. King, who came to the local schools as band instructor in August of 1949, has done a marvelous work in developing the musical talents of the students. At the present, the schools have two bands, the high school band and the East Ward band, which have a combined enrollment of 154 students.

The high school band, with 74 players, will be enlarged after Christmas, King states, according to the number of new uniforms purchased. The band has been sporting 74 new uniforms bought through the donations of local businesses and individuals, and the sponsorship of the Band Boosters organization. Twelve different types of band instruments are used by the band with \$6200 used to purchase new instruments during the summer.

A concert, featuring the high school band, was presented Friday afternoon, November 16, before a number of parents and friends, as well as the student body of both the Junior and Senior High Schools. Under the direction of King, the group played "Storm King March," "The Man I Love," "Night and Day," "Stout-hearted Men," "The King John Overture," and "The New Colonial March."

Accompanied by the band the high school chorus club which is also directed by King, sang "A-Hunting We Will Go" and "Whispering." A Christmas concert has been scheduled for the band for 7:30 p. m. Friday, December 14, at the East Ward auditorium, to which the public is invited. A more detailed program will be announced at a later date.

Twenty members of the local band plan to attend the band clinic sponsored by Texas Technological College to be held in Lubbock, December 7 and 8. Professor Wylie and his assistant, Joe Hadden, are in charge of arrangements for the clinic.

Twelve members are expected to be selected to play in the clinic band and five members plan to try out for the "All-State Band." The five band members who will compete with band students from all the towns, both large and small, are on the Plains and South Plains. They are Beverly Wood, Maxine Wilcox, Beverly Wood, Maxine Wilcox, Lou Ann Comer, Mack Fry and Wayne Hoover.

1. Bake cookies that can stand a few knocks such as soft drop cookies and soft bars and squares.
2. Select a metal or wooden box. Line it with waxed paper. Place cushion of crumpled waxed paper on bottom of box.

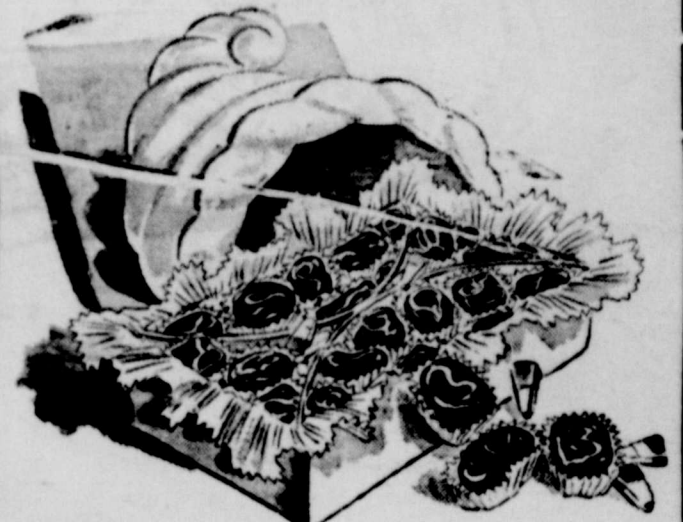

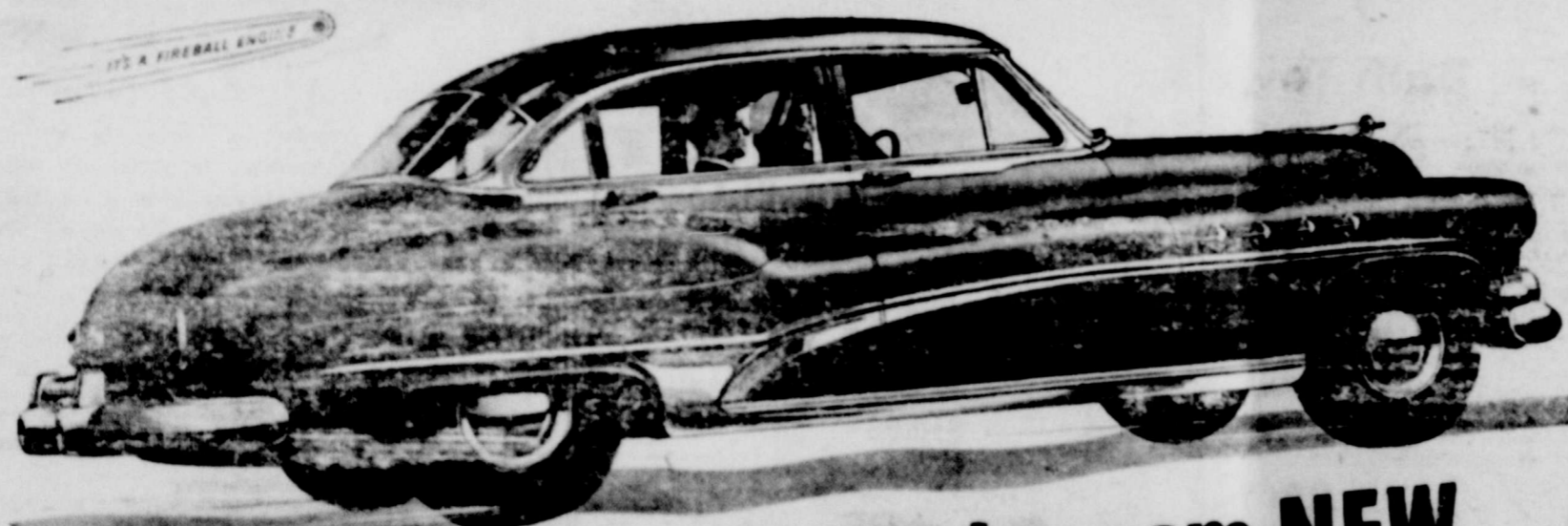

Remember the story? The date was September 6, 1620, when 102 courageous men and women set sail from Plymouth, England to seek and establish freedom in America.

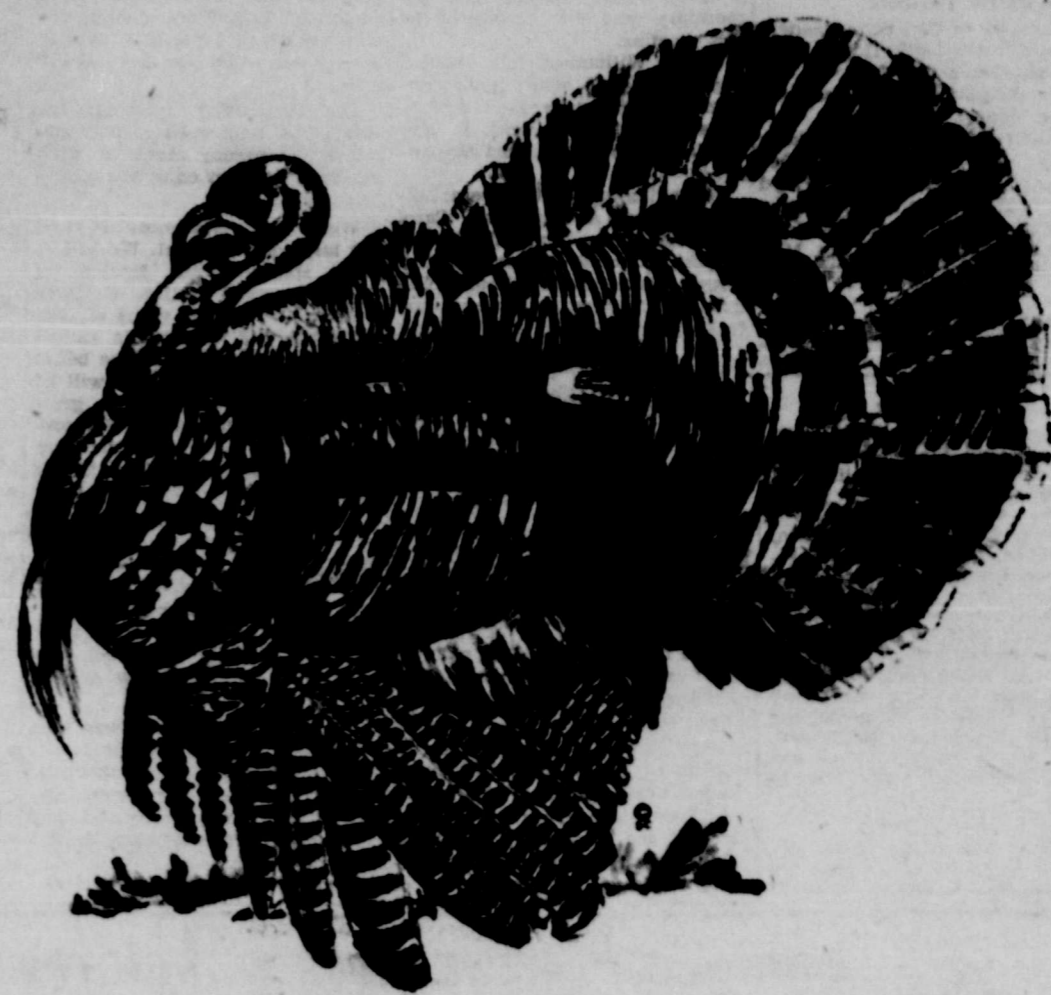
