**Poll Reveals 79.5% Favor City Meters**

Grady Elder, manager of the Spur Chamber of Commerce, met with the city commissioners at their regular meeting Tuesday night and presented the findings of the recent poll concerning parking meters in Spur.

The poll, conducted by the chamber and several businesses indicated that 79.5% of the people who either trade or live in Spur favor parking meters on a six-month trial basis. One per cent indicated no opinion on the matter and 19.5% indicated that they are not in favor of the plan.

Although no immediate action was expected from the city officials, the poll was conducted to indicate to the commissioners what the general opinion of the citizens is, states Elder.

According to Mayor Ned Hogan, the city can have the meters installed on a trial basis without the city spending a penny. During the trial period, the city would receive half of the gross intake of the meters.

**Large Texas Area In Grip of Worst Drought Since 1934**

The prolonged dry weather has resulted in the designation of 89 counties in Texas, including Dickens county, as disaster areas. No estimate is available of the actual losses sustained by farmers and ranchmen as a result of these production losses, but L. J. Cappelman, State director of Farmers Home Administration of Dallas said that the situation faced by farmers throughout the state is one of the most serious since the drought of 1934-35. Drought conditions reported by Cappelman follow closely those outlined by Pasture and Land Cover Conditions Map issued by the office of Louis P. Merrill, director, Soil Conservation Service of Texas, under date of January 15, 1932.

The map depicted conditions covering about two-thirds of the state, extending from Bailey and El Paso counties on the west, to Cherokee on the east, and Starr on the south. Over this area, conditions are described as severe. Only in one-fifth of the counties are adequate moisture and cover conditions reported.

A survey completed recently by Cappelman's staff indicates credit conditions are tight, which prompted designation of the counties as disaster areas and Farmers Home Administration has made available funds for crop production purposes.

The record breaking drought cut crop yields drastically and because of low crop income many farmers have been unable to finance production of this year's crop. Disaster loans are available in each county designated as a disaster area. Farmers who have suffered production losses on crops and livestock may apply for funds to pay seed, fertilizer and materials for insect control where needed, gas and oil for tractors, feed for livestock, essential farm and home operating expenses, and repairs to machinery and other expenses incident to production of a crop.

Credit is advanced under authority of Public Law 38 and is available to family-type farmers who have sustained losses, and who cannot obtain from local sources the funds requested to plant a crop this year. Farmers may apply for loans at the office of County Supervisor Howard C. Warner in Spur, in the Latham building in Spur.

Cappelman admitted some concern about the lateness of the season and the lack of moisture and other favorable planting conditions. With the Department of Agriculture calling for full scale production in 1932, many areas of the state are going to be hard put to get acreage planted to the crops wanted in the production program. "Despite adverse growing conditions, I believe farmers will come through," he said.

Improved farming practices that are emphasized in the FHA program will be discussed and agreed upon by the county supervisor and the applicant at the time the loan application is prepared. In discussing farming practices Cappelman emphasized that a program of diversification is the safest course for farmers to follow.

Case files in FHA county offices disclose that farmers who have carried out a balanced farming program with livestock do not need emergency aid this year even though they did sustain losses because of drought conditions last year.

## Burglar Takes \$1500 From Mac's Food Mkt. Sat. Night

Although no arrest has been made yet, Sheriff C. C. Kimmel's office states that investigation is still underway of the Saturday night robbery of Mac's Food Market in Spur.

The local grocery store was broken into late Saturday night or early Sunday morning and approximately \$1,500 in checks and cash were taken, according to Cecil Driver, manager.

The sheriff's office reports that the bandit obviously climbed to the roof of the Leon Ice company building by means of a ladder at the rear of the building.

It is believed that he then went to the front of the building, climbed down onto the wooden awning, and gained access to the grocery store through a transom from which a glass pane had been removed.

It is believed by investigating officers that he then left the building through the back door by removing the screen from the lock.

Driver reported the theft about 8 p. m. Sunday night. He had gone into the store to work on the books and noticed the screws removed from the back door lock. He then checked to see if the money was still in its hiding place and called the sheriff when he found it missing.

The store is owned by Mac Steele of Crowell who came to Spur early Monday morning to aid in the investigation.

Other than Sheriff Kimmel, his deputy Horace Cage and Highway Patrolman J. R. Whitmore are conducting the investigation.

In an effort to stop payment on the stolen checks, Steele has requested that persons who gave checks at the store on Saturday, February 8, to so inform them so that payment may be stopped at the banks.
