## Chamber of Commerce Doing Commission Considering Street Widening Project Sponsored by Chamber

The City Commission is seriously considering the recommendation of the Spur Chamber of Commerce to widen Burlington avenue six feet. The proposed project would include three blocks, extending from the City light plant to the corner of Third street. The street would be widened by cutting back the sidewalks on each side. It would necessitate the moving of utility meters, poles, and fire plugs. The project has been on the agenda for some time, but has not been previously considered seriously because it was thought that the cost would make it unfeasible.

Midnight snacks can be a lot of fun with a combination sandwich grill and waffle iron. While sitting around the kitchen table talking and laughing about the activities of the evening, sandwiches toast or waffles bake right in front of you.

couple for a bite after the movies, prepare one of these simple but tasty suggestions.

If you have a can of tuna fish on the shelf and feel like eating sandwiches, you will probably choose:

- Grilled Tuna Toasties**  
1 7-oz. can of tuna fish, flaked  
1-3 cup finely chopped celery  
1-4 cup mayonnaise  
1 tablespoon lemon juice  
1-8 teaspoon salt  
Dash of pepper  
1 egg, slightly beaten  
1-4 cup milk  
1-4 teaspoon salt  
2 teaspoons shortening  
7-12 slices of bread.

Combine tuna fish, celery, mayonnaise, lemon juice, pepper, and

1-8 teaspoon salt. Spread the mixture on 4-6 slices of bread; cover with remaining bread slices. Put the egg, milk and salt in a bowl; stir together.

Preheat the sandwich grill to a high heat; then open the grids out flat. Melt 1 teaspoon shortening on each grid. Dip both sides of the sandwiches into the egg mixture and place 2 sandwiches at a time between the grids. Toast 3 to 4 minutes or until a golden brown; serve hot. Makes 4 to 6 sandwiches.

Waffles hit the spot any time—and with pecans they're doubly delicious! So take out the sandwich grids, slip in the waffle grids and try

#### Quick Pecan Waffles

- 2 eggs  
1-12 cups milk  
6 tablespoons melted shortening  
1 3-4 cups sifted all-purpose flour  
3 teaspoons baking powder  
1 teaspoon salt  
1-2 cup finely chopped pecans.

Place eggs, milk and melted shortening in a small mixer bowl; beat at a medium speed until blended. Then sift together flour, baking powder and salt and add

to the mixture. Beat until blended (about 1 minute) and stir in pecans.

Preheat the waffle iron to a high heat. Spread the batter over the grids, close the cover and bake until the waffles stop steaming. Makes 3 11 x 6 inch waffles.

To make these waffles an extra special treat let them cool and serve with whipped cream and peaches.
