Our heart has been saddened and a vacant spot remains in our shop, and life with his passing.

We've two new employees in the shop now. Last week Mrs. Louie Johnston started to work as our bookkeeper. She is the daughter of Ray Williams of Girard.

Our new linotype operator is Bill Miller. Bill worked for the Texas Spur in 1948.

Spur School Trustee Candidates Announce

The Wednesday night deadline found a total of six men announcing their candidacy for vacancies on the Spur school board.

Two trustees will be elected. The trustee for Place 1 will hold a term of one year. This is the unexpired term of Raymond Higginbotham who has moved from the city. Announcing their candidacy for Place 1 are Lloyd Hindman and Eldon (Bigboy) Reynolds.

Place 2 will be for a three year term. Candidates for Place 2 are Jerry Ensey, Cecil Estep, Willie T. Williams, and Walter E. Gruber. Ensey is a present member of the board and will be seeking reelection.

Names will be drawn for placement on the official election ballot.

The election of trustees which is scheduled for Saturday, April 5, will be held at the City Hall. Election judges will be J. I. Me-com, A. Z. Hays and C. O. Fox.

Chamber of Commerce Does City to Receive Bids on Hospital April 22; Construction to Start Soon

The City Commission of Spur will take definite action this week to complete the final plans before construction is begun on the City Hospital. Construction is expected to begin within thirty days.

The Commission will meet with a state representative from Austin in a special session slated for Wednesday night. The purpose of this meeting will be to iron out last-minute problems and make preparations for the final approval of the plans by the architects.

On Tuesday afternoon, April 22, the city will receive bids and let the contract for the long-awaited \$250,000 hospital to be located on Highway 70, north of the El Patio Motel.

A petition requesting the admission of property on the east side of the highway extending from the El Patio Motel to the present city limits into the City was recently circulated among residents of this property by the Chamber of Commerce, and was submitted to the Commission.

This plot of land, which includes the site of the hospital, was accepted by the Commission in its regular meeting Tuesday night.

The construction of the hospital should prove to be a definite forward step for Spur and Dickens County.

The City Commission is also seriously considering the proposal of the Chamber of Commerce to widen Burlington Avenue by six feet in order to prevent traffic congestion and to allow automobiles to back out from either side of the street without crossing into opposite lanes.

The project, as proposed, would widen the street a total of six feet by cutting the sidewalk back on each side. It would necessitate the moving of several poles, water meters and fire plugs. The

James Monroe Hahn, long time resident of Spur and Dickens county, died Sunday at 11:15 p. m., March 23.

Funeral services were conducted at the First Baptist Church Tuesday at 2 p. m., March 25, with Rev. T. B. Allen officiating, assisted by Rev. A. P. Stokes.

Hahn was born in Gainsville, Texas, February 22, 1879. In September of 1900 he was married to Addie Craft at Brazos Valley in Stone-wall county.

He, with his family moved to Spur in December of 1920, where he farmed until the time of his death.

Hahn was converted to the Christian religion at an early age. Survivors include his wife, two daughters, Mrs. Ellis Draper and Mrs. C. A. County Farmers To Discuss Mexican Farm Labor at Meeting April 4

Byron Haney, president of the Dickens County Farm Bureau, announced this week that there will be a general meeting of the farmers of Dickens county on April 4 to discuss the procurement of Mexican Nationals for farm labor for the 1952 cotton crop.

Present at the meeting will be Fred Pressley of the US Employment Service. He will explain the new regulations governing the use of Mexican National labor and will lead the general discussion.

Haney stated that every farmer who is interested in using this labor to crop or to gather cotton this year should be present. He explains that last year it was very difficult and expensive to get the Mexican laborers, but with the cooperation of the area farmers, the County Farm Bureau will handle the labor from Dickens county.

"If we can work out this plan, it will save the farmer time, money, and a lot of red tape in obtaining sufficient labor where and when he needs it," states Haney.

The meeting is scheduled to start at 2:00 p. m., Friday, April 4, in the Spur Theatre.

City Mail Delivery to Begin Here Tuesday

Final preparations for city mail delivery service for Spur have been made and this service will be installed on April 1, Guy Karr, local postmaster, has announced. This service has been sponsored by the Spur Chamber of Commerce.

All necessary equipment for mail delivery including parcel post has been received. Jackie Simmons, Rt. 1, and Billie Pat Winkler, Rt. 2, have been employed as part-time carriers.

Approximately 90 families have accepted this service by filing a change of address card at the local post office. Only four business firms have filed changes for delivery of all mail. Karr reported, but 78 firms have filed for delivery of parcel post only. Many more individuals as well as firms are expected to request this service after it has been actually installed.

Post Office Inspector Bell of Lubbock will be in Spur, Tuesday, April 1, to assist Karr in establishing the new delivery system.

The new system is expected to be a great improvement over the present post office box method of getting mail to the individual.

Countians Urged to "Answer the Call" For Arkansas Relief

County Red Cross Chairman George S. Link received a personal letter this week from the International Red Cross Organization urging the citizens of Dickens County to make a greater effort to "answer the call" with donations to the Red Cross because of the recent storm tragedy in Arkansas.

Link states that over \$1,000,000 has already been spent in the storm-stricken areas, and that \$5,000,000 more will be needed.

The county drive has passed the half-way mark with work still to be done toward obtaining the goal.

Dr. W. F. Patrick, funds drive chairman, reports that over \$1,250,000 has been turned in. The ladies' club booth at Burlington last Saturday collected \$97.00.

The door-to-door collections amount has not been reported.

Both Link and Dr. Patrick state that they and the entire organization of the Red Cross appreciate the fine work done by the volunteer workers who have given of the time and efforts in helping in the drive.

LARGE CROWD HEARS ADDRESS BY JOHN BEN SHEPPERD FRIDAY

Secretary of State John Ben Sheppard was guest speaker for the annual Spur Chamber of Commerce banquet attended by 230 persons, Friday evening, March 21.

Held in the high school gymnasium, the banquet featured the introduction of George Gabriel as president of the organization for 1952, succeeding J. D. McCain.

Other new officers include Cecil Godfrey as vice-president, and Fike Godfrey as treasurer.

Grady Elder was commended by outgoing president McCain for his service to the community as secretary-manager of the local chamber during the past year.

Jack Leiston was master of ceremonies for the banquet, which gave recognition to D. J. Dyess as Spur's "Man of the Year." Dyess was presented a certificate of merit by the incoming president.

Special music was provided by the Maurice Goodwin family of Afton.

The invocation was given by Rev. Tommie Allen, pastor of the First Baptist Church; the benediction was given by Ralph Huns-well, minister of the First Christian Church.

Rev. T. B. Elder, pastor of the First Presbyterian Church and a personal friend of Sheppard, introduced the speaker of the evening to the group.

The American citizen was scolded by Sheppard in his talk on "Our Citizenship Character." Our complaints "about corruption in high places... about high taxes and over-government... about the trend toward socialism" were showed aside with the explanation that "corruption in high places is due to apathy in low places... big government due to small citizenship... and the desire to make money a proxy for responsible participation."

Public lethargy was blamed for the fact that the "we" is disappearing from "We, the People."

Local government was emphasized at the place to begin to rid ourselves of this plague. The little things that individuals can do should not be minimized, Sheppard urged. "All the taxes in the world will not pay the salaries of enough bureaucrats to take the place of government by the people."

Sheppard concluded his speech by stating that "all we need is BB's—yes, BB's—Backbones from the home, Bibles from the churches, brains from the school, and ballots for the government."

Dinner was served by the Spur High School homemaking class under the supervision of Miss Lavena Wilson.

The chamber manager and the board of directors express their sincere appreciation to all of those who helped to make the banquet a success.

**"Appreciate Texas"
Say Navaho Indians
On Pitchfork Ranch**

Navajo Indian women, adorned in the native dress of their people, afforded local residents the sight of an added touch of colorful splendor last Tuesday, when six families of them shopped in Spur.

There was a commensurate in their mode of dress, in the respect that each woman wore an ankle length skirt of floral design, cut full and gathered onto a waist band. Each wore low heeled oxford type shoes over dark heavy weight hose. Their hair was pulled straight from the face, forming on the back of the head a tight coil, bound and tied by gay colored woolen knitting thread.

Virginia P. Guerra, wife of Jose Guerra, (pronounced Ware), was uniquely dressed in a purple velvet blouse of the deepest hue, extravagantly embroidered with

the type of ornaments produced by a silversmith. Around her neck she wore a rope made from pieces of petrified wood and held together with gold links. Across her shoulders she had loosely thrown a blanket shawl of the most radiant brilliance.

These people have been brought from the Alamo Reservation in New Mexico, and employed by D. Burns of the Pitchfork ranch to repair fences. They live in tents, making and moving camp as their work takes them to different parts of the ranch. They favor Texas working conditions to those found in New Mexico. They expect to be at the Pitchfork about two more months.

1 fryer
1 can of Cream of Mushroom Soup
Salt
Pepper

Heat one bottle of Coca-Cola to boiling. Add one package of Jello and stir until dissolved; then add other bottle of Coca-Cola. Place in refrigerator. When jello begins to jell, stir in cherries and pecans. Return to refrigerator to set until firm. Serve topped with salad dressing or whipped cream.

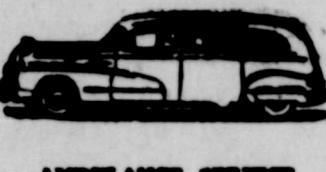

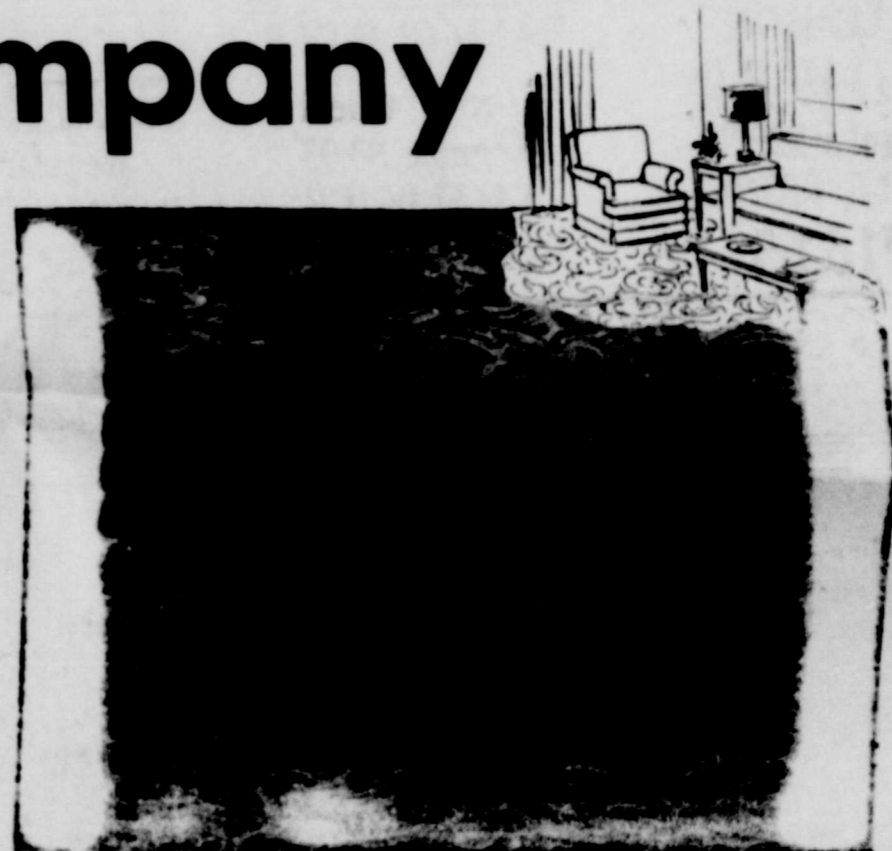

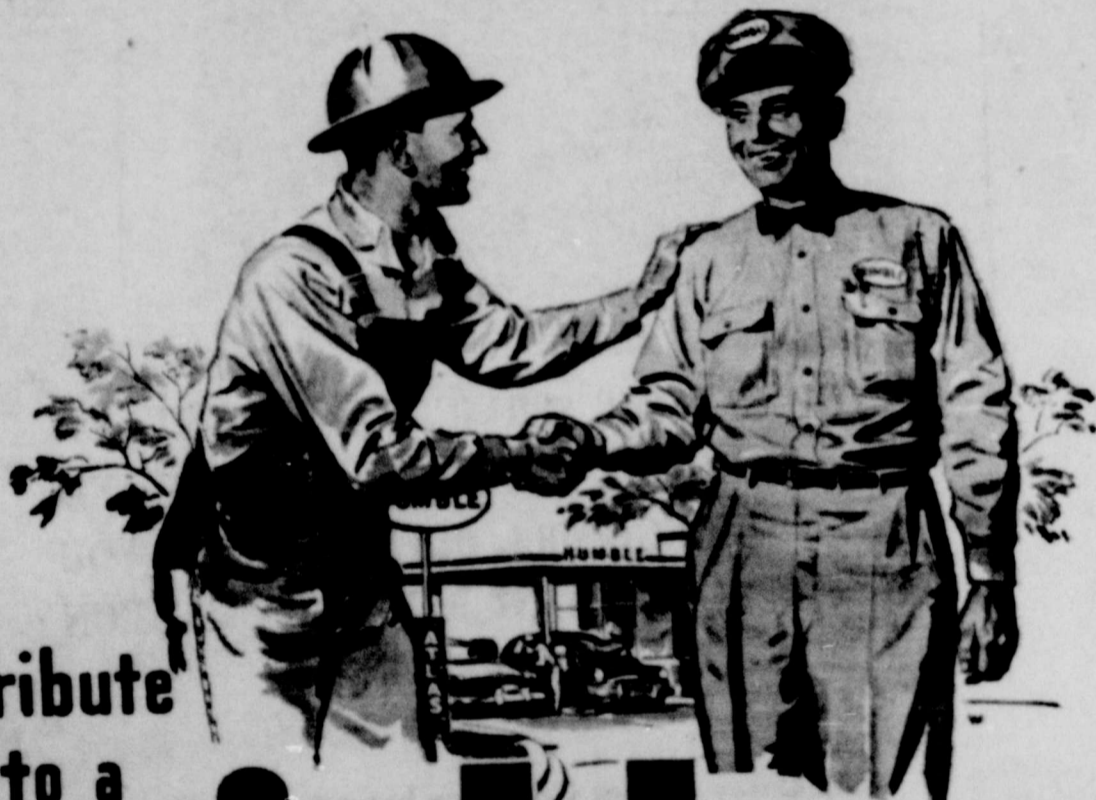
