## Itinerant Merchants Law To Be Enforced

Strict enforcement of a city ordinance governing itinerant merchants in Spur was indorsed by the city officials at their regular meeting in the City Hall Tuesday night of this week.

The ordinance passed on October 25, 1939, sets forth three main requirements for merchants selling merchandise in Spur on a temporary basis. It requires a license to be issued by the city for a fee of \$25.00. Application for such a license must be made ten days prior to doing business in Spur.

The application includes an affidavit concerning the nature of the merchandise, the character of the vendors, etc. Bond of not less than \$1,000 must be posted upon application.

James Cowan, city manager, states that the \$25.00 license requirement was changed by the city commission at a later date and now costs \$25.00 for a full year, \$18.00 for six months, \$10.00 for three months, and \$5.00 for one month.

Cowan points out that the ordinance does not effect commercial traveling men handling wholesale merchandise direct to retailers. It also excludes vendors of farm produce and those selling donated merchandise for charity or philanthropic causes. Those now operating under a city license in Spur are requested by the city officials to meet the other requirements of the ordinance before continuing operation.

Highlighting the gathering were talks by Judge E. H. Boedecker of Lubbock, and John H. Hollyfield of Austin.

Judge Boedecker spoke on the importance of efficient law enforcement, and Hollyfield spoke on the benefits of cooperation in law enforcement.

Kimmel has been an officer of the association since its beginning and is this year retiring from his office as sheriff and tax assessor and collector of Dickens county.

The meat for the noon barbecue was furnished by the Swenson ranch. Local businesses furnished most of the other food consisting of baked potatoes, onions, pickles, beans, ice cream, cookies, lemonade and coffee.

The meal was served to the officers by the directors and visiting business men from Spur.
