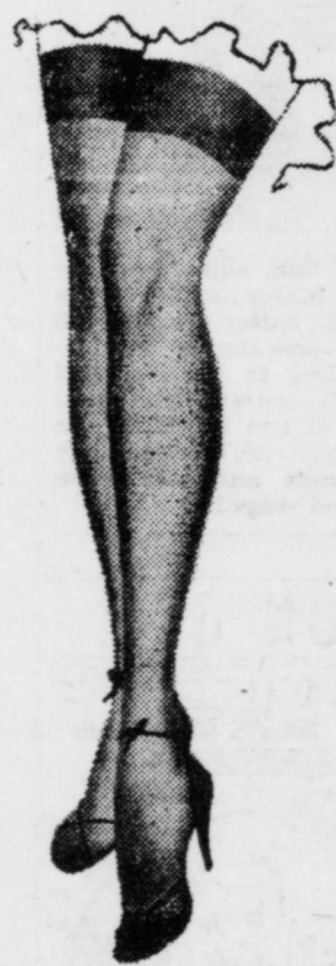

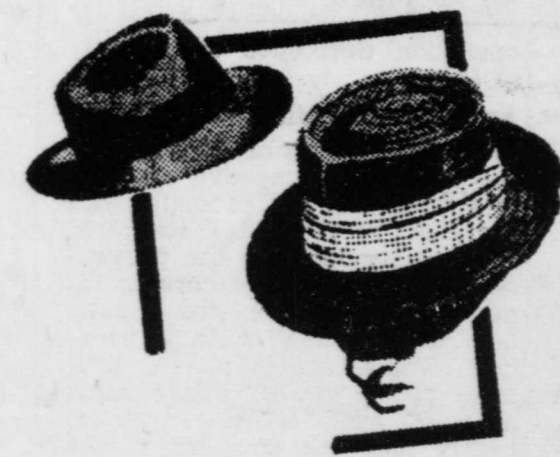

Hints For Homemakers

Every hot summer day should have at least one refreshing moment for the busy housewife. It could be the lunch hour, supper hour, or a pause in the shade in mid-afternoon for a frosty drink. Don't let anybody say a frosty drink isn't cooling—try a chilled drink on a cold day and count the shivers!

For the housewife who has laid in a generous supply of fruit juices during the freezing and canning season, a variety of refreshing drinks is practically no problem. With strawberries, logan berries, red and black raspber-

ries, pineapple, cherries and blackberries to choose from, a long vista of enticing summer drinks opens. Failing the home supply of juices, there are always grape juice, grapefruit juice, orange and lemon juices, fruit flavoring powders, not to mention iced tea and coffee.

Much can be done to add to the fruit punches by decorating the ice cubes. In the heart of the freezing ice cube put a tiny sprig of mint, a maraschino cherry, a thin slice of lime, or a small slice of orange, strawberry, or any available fruit that adds picture value. Richly colored fruit juices such as loganberry, frozen in cubes, give color to an otherwise characterless punch. Even plain water tinted with vegetable coloring frozen in cubes looks zippy cruising about a sea of punch. Of course, there are always a few half slices, very thin, of orange floating about in the pitcher or punch bowl.

Orange-Pineapple Punch

1 large can pineapple juice
2 cans frozen orange juice
1 small can frozen lemon juice
½ cup sugar
Mix juices and sugar. Pour over chopped ice. More sugar may be added if needed.

For an extra special drink add a dip of ice cream to each glass of punch to produce a refresher that wins votes from old and young alike.
