During Governor Shivers' administration, Dickens county has received \$573,385 rural road benefits from state highway user taxes as follows:

License fees \$158,451, road bond surplus \$54,324, bonds paid \$20,109, construction of farm-to-market roads \$171,100, authorized but not under construction

In this county, 16 miles of farm-tomarket roads have been built, and an additional 15 miles have been authorized for construction, for a total of 31 miles.

Governor Shivers' administration has consistently supported the Dickens county road building program and will continue to do so in the future.





Governor Allan Shivers today said that the new auto inspection law should be either modified or re-

The Governor told the Press before he left Austin for Houston to make a campaign appearance that he had some ideas for changing the controversial law.

His idea is to take the red tape and confusion out

"The law was intended to bring about real safety

and not inconvenience," said Governor Shivers. "We need to stop killings on the highways. Texas has become the number one State in the United States for murder on the highways.

"The Legislature passed this inspection law by a vote of 117 to 12 in the House of Representatives and 19 to 9 in the State Senate, with the thought that it would save more than 200 Texas lives each year. If the law fails to do this and instead causes confusion and inconvenience, it ought to be changed or repealed."

The Governor said that he would recommend to the next session of the Legislature that it re-study and examine this law in view of the experience and either modify or repeal it.

(Several months ago, when it became apparent that the new law was causing inconvenience and confusion, Governor Shivers ordered it suspended until it can be reviewed by the Legislature.)
