### Cook Announces Opening Dates, New Faculty Members

Monday, September 1, was announced as the opening date of the Spur Public Schools by superintendent of schools, C. F. Cook, this week. A schedule of enrollment will be announced at a later date.

Haynes School, Negro, will open two weeks earlier on August 18 in order that the school may have a recess after approximately four to six weeks after session is begun. This recess will enable the children of the school to pick cotton and do other work that will help their families.

The school administration has been hard at work this summer in an effort to select teachers that will be an asset to our school system, Cook stated. "We think that those that have been employed are good teachers and will greatly benefit our schools," added Cook.

Included among the new teachers which have been employed are the following:

R. A. Williams, who will teach high school science. Williams has taught school in the Rotan schools for the last six years and is highly recommended. He has a master's degree from Texas Technological College and served four years in the Army during World War II. He and his mother are now living in Spur.

Miss Jean Galloway, who will teach commercial subjects in the high school. Miss Galloway has a bachelor of business administration degree from Texas Tech. This will be her first year to teach. Her home is at Benjamin, Texas, where she attended high school.

Miss Wanda Rhine, who will teach homemaking in high school. Miss Rhine was graduated from high school in Lockney, Texas. She has a bachelor of science degree from Texas Tech in homemaking. Miss Rhine is now serving on the staff at Ridgecrest Baptist Assembly in Ridgecrest, N. C. This will be Miss Rhine's first year to teach.

Bob Key, who will be the band director. Key graduated from the Ardmore, Okla., high school and has a bachelor of music degree from the teachers' college at Ada, Okla. At present he is doing graduate work on his master's degree at the University of Oklahoma. Key served two years in the Army and has three years of teaching experience. He will be in Spur on August 6 to assume his duties as band director.

H. M. Allison, who will be the East Ward principal. Allison has twelve years of experience in teaching. For the past four years he has been superintendent of the Flomot schools. Allison has a bachelor of arts degree from North Texas State College and a master of arts degree from Hardin-Simmons University. He served in the Army for four years during World War II. Mr. and Mrs. Allison and their daughter, Janie Susan, 2 1/2 years old, are now living in Spur.

Mrs. H. M. Allison, who will teach eighth grade English. Mrs. Allison has eight years experience in teaching. She taught high school English in the Flomot schools for the last four years. Mrs. Allison has a bachelor of science degree from North Texas State College.

Guy Dickson, who will be the assistant principal of East Ward and teach the sixth grade. Dickson is a graduate of North Texas State College with two degrees, bachelor of science and master of arts degree. He has had three years' experience as principal of the grade school at Cranfills Gap, Texas. Dickson and his family now live in Spur.

Mrs. Guy Dickson, who will teach seventh grade English. Mrs. Dickson has several years experience in teaching English. She taught in the Rotan schools for a number of years. Mrs. Dickson is a graduate of North Texas State College with a bachelor of arts degree.

Mrs. Norton Barrett, who will teach the third grade. Mrs. Barrett has taught in the Spur schools before and is welcomed back to the system again. Mrs. Barrett has six years of experience in teaching and is a graduate of Texas Tech College. Mrs.

A record number of votes turned out in Dickens county last Saturday as 2228 journeyed to the polls to cast their ballots.

The race for sheriff turned out to be the hottest—not for top spot, but for a spot in the run-off. Cleo E. Rogers topped his two opponents by 300 votes with 999 in his favor. Raymond Beadle and Deputy Horace Cage ended up just eight votes apart with the latter on top. Cage received 675 to Beadle's 667.

For constable Precinct 3, C. A. Finch and A. T. Duncan emerged for a run-off from the array of five candidates. Finch received 373 votes. Duncan 295, Roscoe McCombs 282, Byron Jenkins 233, and R. D. (Bill) Greer 164.

Fred Arrington of Dickens and Horace Hyatt of Spur together polled the largest number of votes in the county in their race for District and County clerk. Arrington, now serving the incomplete term of Jake Varnell, was elected with 1390 votes to Hyatt's 938.

Roy Ward was re-elected commissioner of Precinct 1 with 357 votes to Jack Gipson's 142 and L. H. Richard's 69.

In Precinct incumbent E. J. Offield was elected with 132 votes. J. B. Greenwood, Jr. received 62 and J. R. Speights 42. Amer Watson took a 883 to 471 victory over J. B. Kimmel in Precinct 3.

Funeral services were held for Mrs. Cora El Hicks on Wednesday afternoon, July 30, at the Afton Baptist Church, with Rev. A. P. Stokes officiating. He was assisted by Rev. Tommie Allen, pastor of the First Baptist Church of Spur where Mrs. Hicks was a member.

Mrs. Hicks died Monday night at her home after a very brief illness at the age of 76. Born January 29, 1876 in Comanche County, Texas, she came with her husband to Dickens county in 1902. She was married to T. J. Hicks in 1891 in Comanche county.

### 1 1/2 Mile Parade Thrills Spectators; Gregory's, Rotary Floats Win Contest

The largest crowd ever to assemble in Spur viewed the longest and most elaborate parade ever to appear in Spur Wednesday afternoon to officially open the 1952 Spur Cowboy Jubilee which already has the largest entry of any previous rodeos in Spur.

The day of superlatives for the city opened at 2:30 with the big parade which included 29 entries by local businesses and organizations and approximately 700 horses.

The gala displays extended a mile and a half, beginning at the city light plant and moving up Burlington and on toward the rodeo grounds.

In the float contest, sponsored by the 1931 Study Club of Spur, and with prizes donated by Godfrey's Furniture, Gregory Motor Co. was judged most unique, the Rotary Club float the most colorful, Fred Dalby the most typical cowboy, Carolyn Adams the most typical junior cowgirl.

### Bollworm Infestation Is Found In County

County Agent Chales Taylor warned local farmers today to be on the alert for bollworm infestation.

Bollworms have been found, Taylor stated, at Afton, East Afton and between Spur and Dickens.

Farmers should inspect 100 stalks of their cotton and if 3 or 4 bollworms or their eggs are found, immediate poisoning is recommended. According to Taylor, due to the weather conditions, one-third pound of BHC or 1 1/2 pounds of DDT should be sufficient to check the infestation, if poisoning is repeated in five to seven days. Two applications would be necessary.

If the inspection does not show that degree of infestation, Taylor advised against poisoning.

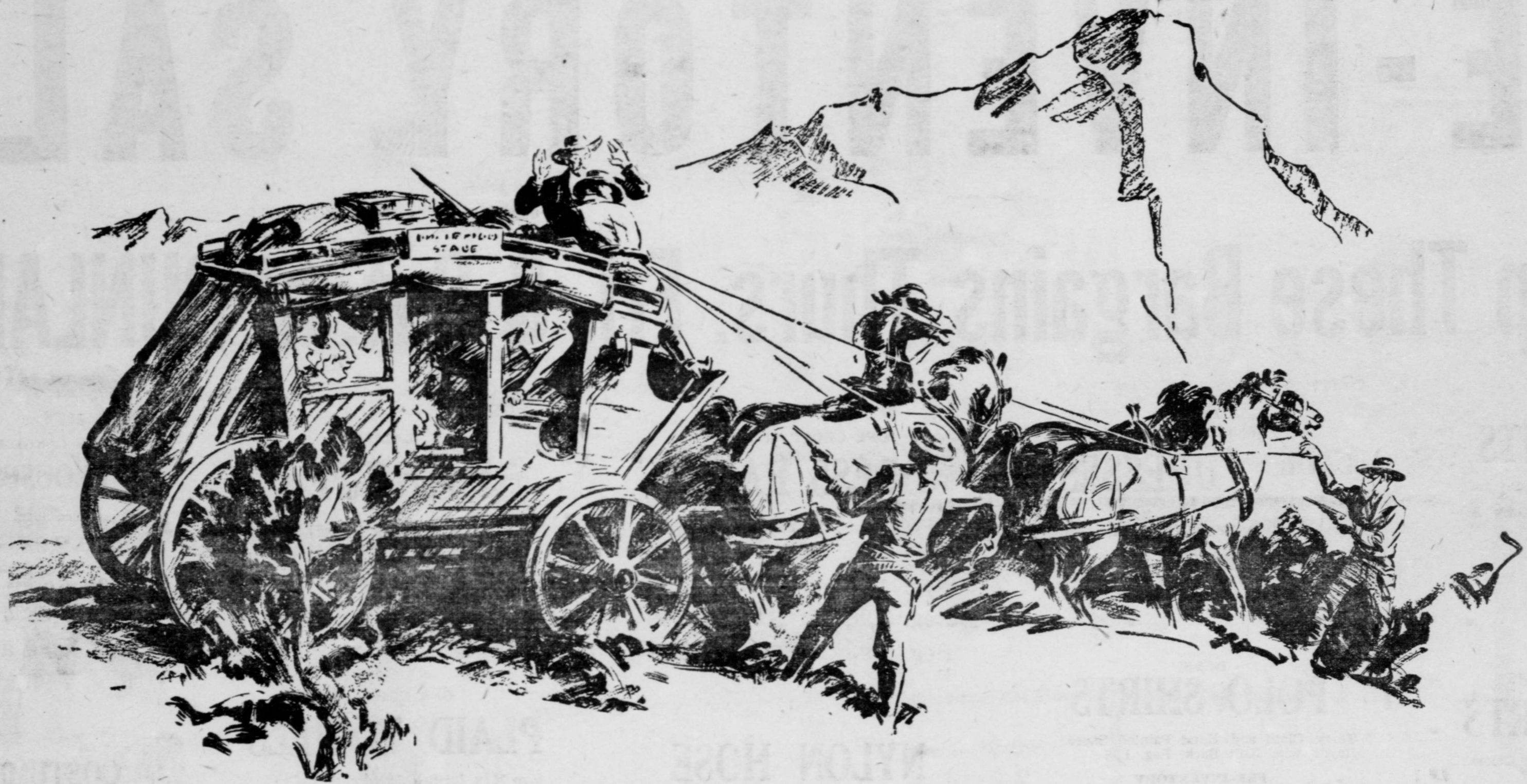

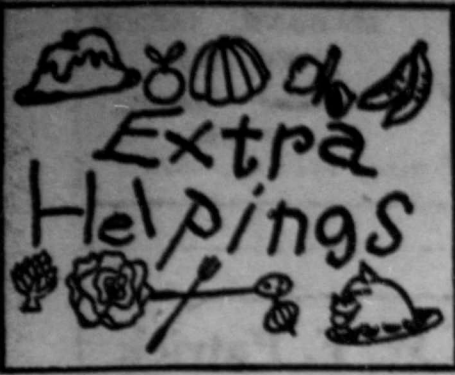

The trend has been toward selling more and more pre-packaged ice cream at grocery stores where the housewife buys it when making other food purchases.

Meats to be roasted require an oven temperature of 325°F. This slow heat is recommended to prevent excess shrinkage. Meat experts advise: do not add water; do not cover; do not baste roasts.

Taffy ice cream sundaes are a new innovation in the dessert world though the two ingredients called for have been known for centuries... a scoop of ice cream with a topping of unsulphured molasses. The molasses sauce is ready direct from jar.

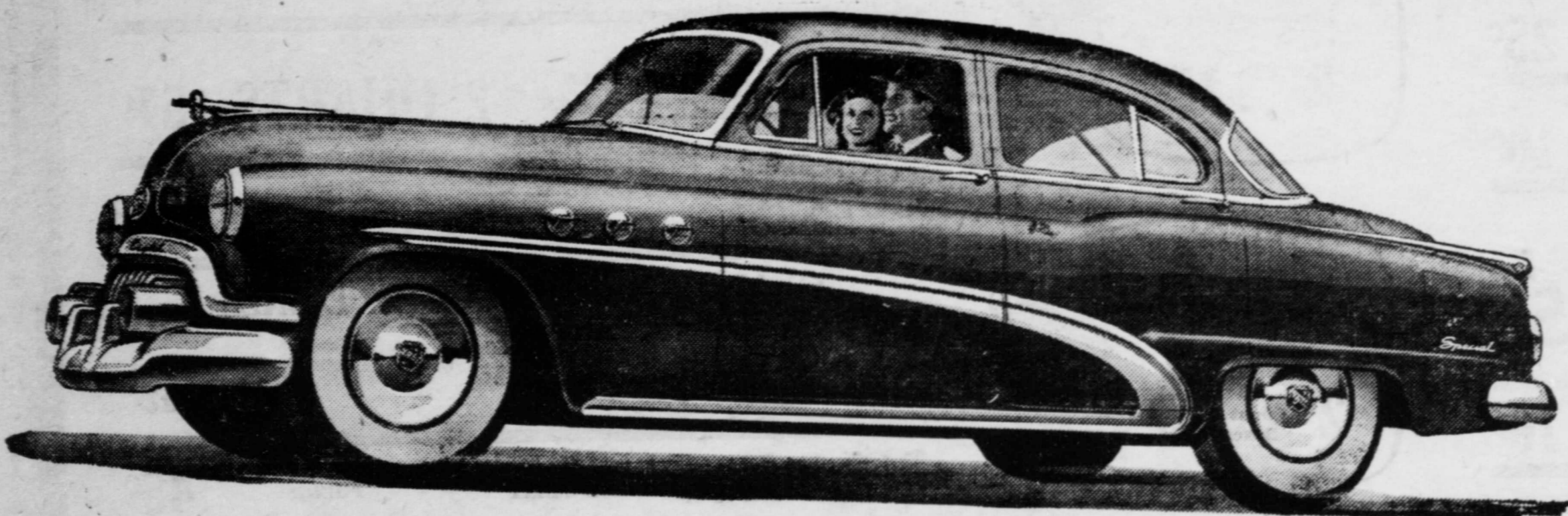

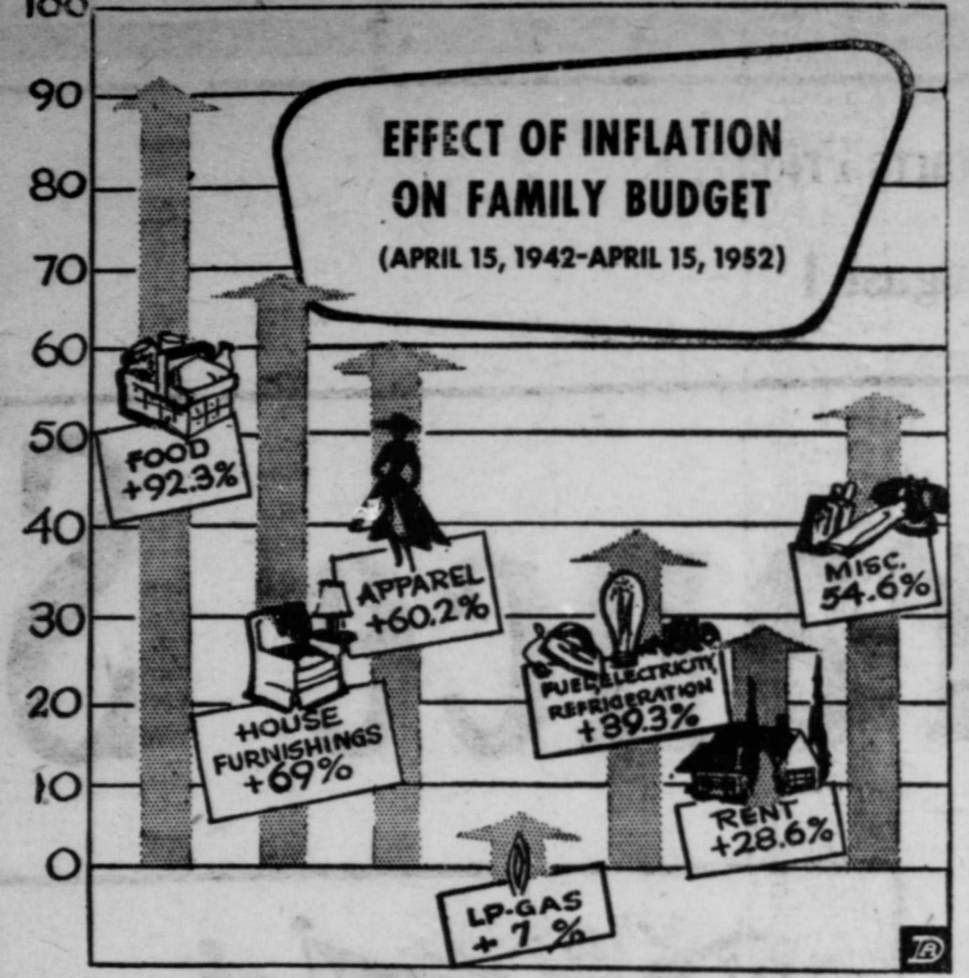

Despite zooming general living expenses, the cost of liquefied petroleum gas has remained relatively stable, "spot survey" by LP-Gas Information Service, Chicago, among nation's dealers reveals. In contrast to an average rise of 63% in all items contained in U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics cost of living index, LP-gas rates increased only 7% in ten-year period ending April 15, 1952. Also known as butane, propane, bottled and tank gas, the fuel is used principally in farm, small town and suburban areas.

**HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 38** providing an amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas by the addition of a new Section to be known as Section 50a, providing for the establishment of a State Medical Education Board and a State Medical Scholarship Fund from which grants, loans or scholarships may be made to students desiring to study medicine; providing that such students shall agree to practice in rural areas of this State; providing for an election and the issuance of a proclamation therefor.

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**  
Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new Section to be known as Section 50a which shall read as follows:

"Sec. 50a. The Legislature shall create a State Medical Education Board to be composed of not more than six (6) members whose qualifications, duties and terms of office shall be prescribed by law. The Legislature shall also establish a State Medical Education Fund and make adequate appropriations therefor to be used by the State Medical Education Board to provide grants, loans or scholarships to students desiring to study medicine and agreeing to practice in the rural areas of this State, upon such terms and conditions as shall be prescribed by law. The term rural areas as used in this Section shall be defined by law."

**Section 2.** The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, A. D. 1952, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon (or in counties using voting machines the machines shall provide for) the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment authorizing the establishment of a State Medical Education Fund from which grants, loans or scholarships may be made to students desiring to study medicine."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment providing for the establishment of a State Medical Education Fund from which grants, loans or scholarships may be made to students desiring to study medicine."

"Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State. The expense of publication and election for such amendment shall be paid out of proper appropriation made by law."
