Next Wednesday is "Give a pint to save a life" day in Spur and we're all going out to the new hospital to donate a pint of blood to the Red Cross.

### COLLECTION OF BLOOD TO BE HELD IN NEW HOSPITAL BUILDING

Over 200 pledge cards have been signed by potential blood donors for the Red Cross bloodmobile which will be in Spur next Wednesday, July 1. The county's goal has been set at 150 pints, states Cecil Godfrey, and about 225 pledgers are needed to insure our reaching this goal.

Dr. Bob Alexander will be the local medical doctor in charge of the blood campaign in the county. Several others are being signed up to help in the program. Donors cards have been distributed by the ladies of the City Federation and by the Spur Lions club. People who wish to donate to the blood program may sign a card at Peyton Legg Grocery in Afton, John Jackson Grocery in Glenn, Koonsman Drug in Dickens, Godfrey's Furniture in Spur, or at Nickels Butane in McAadoo.

### COUNTIANS TO DISCUSS DROUGHT RELIEF FOR FARMERS, RANCHERS

The farmers, ranchers and businessmen of Dickens county will meet on the courthouse tomorrow in Dickens to discuss the existing drought conditions in the county and to elect representatives to meet with Secretary of Agriculture Ezra Benson in Lubbock, on Saturday.

Factors affecting eligibility are: secure tenure arrangements for 1954; arrangements agreed on with present lien holder to carry debt on livestock and equipment; unable to get credit from regular lending concerns.
