Ag. Exports To Be Off 1/4 Say Experts

United States agricultural exports are continuing to decline and are expected to total at least one-fourth smaller in 1952-53 than in the preceding year. This information, says C. H. Bates, farm management specialist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, comes from the U. S. Department of Agriculture.

Exports for April, the most recent month of tabulation, were 11 percent below those for March. The total exports in April 1953 were \$223,535,000 compared to \$296,785,000 for the same month in 1952, says Bates. Among the commodities showing the greatest decrease last April were cotton, wheat and rice, all mighty important crops in Texas. Butter, pork, lard, dried eggs and apples were also listed. Bates points out that this continuing drop in agricultural exports presents an important problem to the economy of the country because this nation normally exports the products from about 50 million acres. Estimates now being made indicate that total exports during 1952-53 may fall short of \$3 billion, compared with approximately \$4.1 billion in 1951-52.

The export decline, according to the specialist, has been attributed primarily to scarcity of dollars abroad, increased agricul-

tural output in foreign countries and restrictive trade barriers. Plans for checking the drop in farm exports and bolstering foreign outlets for agricultural products are receiving major Department of Agriculture attention. The solution of this situation, says Bates, would be a big step forward in solving surplus problems which is bringing back into the agricultural picture control programs.

R. D. and Dan Wright visited friends in Floydada Sunday.

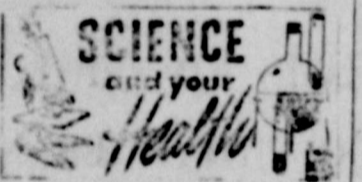

EXPERIMENTAL FACTS by Science Features

Things aren't the same down on the farm any more. Old MacDonold probably wouldn't recognize the place. Science, which in the past few years has affected all of our lives, is changing things in the barnyard, too.


For example, hogs now get feed as scientifically compounded as a baby's formula, and chickens, instead of pecking in the yard, are confined to the poultry house with their dinner on a trough before them. The result of all this is more meat for all of us.

One of the most important discoveries of scientific agriculture was that antibiotics like penicillin and terramycin, added in very small quantities to the feed, can stimulate the growth of farm animals, bringing them to market quicker, at lower feed cost. Today antibiotics are added to animal feeds on a carefully planned basis.


Antibiotics also are used in the treatment of many animal diseases — and even in the treatment of some plant diseases. To further research in these and other agricultural fields, one big pharmaceutical firm, Chas. Pfizer & Co., Inc., recently opened its own experimental farm near Terry, Texas.

A unique feature of this 700-acre farm is that it contains, for the first time on a large scale, facilities for research in both animal nutrition and veterinary medicine. This makes it possible for scientists in both fields to coordinate their efforts to bring to the farmer the benefits of modern science.

Colbert To Receive Special Award

A Leon County farm boy who sent himself through Texas and Harvard universities trading cotton and who now heads a major automobile company will receive the second annual "Texan of Distinction" award of the State Fair of Texas.

He is L. L. (Tex) Colbert, 47, president of the Chrysler Corporation and a native of Oakwood, Texas.

State Fair president, R. L. Thornton announced that Mr. Col-

bert has accepted the award and will make the principal address at the annual fair banquet Oct. 13, where the award will be presented.

Mr. Colbert has attended the State Fair, where Chrysler has a large exhibit in the Automobile Show, for the past two years.

The "Texan of Distinction" award was inaugurated last year, and the initial honoree was Eugene Holman, president of Standard Oil Company of New Jersey.

The award is made each year to a native-born Texan who has lived at least 15 years of his life in Texas and who has distinguished himself in industry, science

One Dime Provides REAL Health Food

Almost everybody eats at least three times a day and almost everybody worries about what he eats. Some people worry so much that they fall for the food faddist's advice and load up on expensive items. Others eat only specific classes of foods.

All this when the fact of the matter is that most people simply need a well balanced diet of common, ordinary food—meat, vegetables, dairy products, fruits, wheat products—to maintain a healthy weight. And if they are overweight they still need all these things but merely a reduction in the total consumed daily.

In any case, people interested in maintaining proper weight will be glad to find out that just ten cents worth of the commonest food of all—plain, everyday enriched bread—can provide significant quantities of a number of essential food elements.

"Wheat: A Bargain in Food," by Anna May and Dr. James R. Wilson, in the July issue of Today's Health, published by the American Medical Association, explains why people on reducing diets are making a mistake if they give up bread, flour and other wheat products.

Dr. Wilson, who is secretary of the AMA's Council on Foods and Nutrition, and his wife point out that wheat flour furnishes far more than calories.

"If you give up bread when on a reducing diet," they say, "you deny yourself an inexpensive source of a number of things your body needs."

Bread contains a significant amount of protein. All of the essential amino acids necessary to good health are found in the proteins of wheat and bread. However, the quantity and proportions of these amino acids are such that wheat proteins do require supplementation with animal proteins such as occur in

milk, eggs, meat, fish, and poultry. When eaten along with these animal foods, it is safe and economical to supply one half to two-thirds of the body's daily protein needs from plant sources, the article says.

"At current prices," the article goes on to say, "ten cents worth of bread will give you almost one third of the daily recommended allowance of protein (70 grams) while also supplying 600 food calories, which is about one fourth the caloric needs of an office worker."

"Wheat protein today is considerably less expensive than the protein of whole milk and much cheaper than protein in the form of meat. Wheat proteins are a real bargain."

Flour and bread have other bonuses, according to the article. In addition to the nutritive values already mentioned, ten cents worth of bread will buy the following portions of the recommended daily dietary allowances of these four essential nutrients: nearly half of the thiamine; between one sixth and one fifth of the riboflavin; between one third and one half the niacin, and about one third the iron.

The article says that while bread does not supply all of the essential nutrients, no single food item does that.

"Wheat rightfully plays an important role in our basic food economy," Dr. and Mrs. Wilson say in conclusion. "Its cost is no measure of its importance as a part of the good diet. Ten cents worth goes a long way in supplying the body's need for food. And it is not bread alone that does this. Breakfast cereals and other wheat food products made from whole grain or enriched white flour supply about the same proportions of nutrients at a comparably low cost."

Mr. Colbert joined the Chrysler corporation and became an expert on labor law. At 30, he was made vice president and director of the Dodge division. In 1948 he became president of Dodge.

Handsome, rugged Mr. Colbert and his wife and three children live in a 13-room home just outside Detroit. Mrs. Colbert, the former Daisy Gorman, is the girl he decided, at 15, that he was going to marry.

Mr. Colbert was born in 1905 in Oakwood, Leon County. His first job was soda-jerking at an Oakwood drugstore.

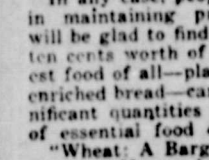

KNOW YOUR INDORSERS

"Let's see the check," said Joe, the service station operator. The stranger handed him a check made out to Ray Gar, for \$68.10 and signed by John Jones.

"Sure, I know John Jones," said Joe. "Do business with him all the time - good as gold. I'll be glad to cash it for you. Just scribble your name on it."

Two weeks later the bank returned the check. The stranger who had signed the name "Ray Gar" on the back of the check was not Ray Gar. Joe had failed to identify the indorser of the check, and had no idea where the stranger could be found. As a result, he was out one tire and \$38.10.

The next week a taxi driver friend, Rex Fenders, came in, ordered \$3.00 worth of gas, and handed Joe a \$50.00 check pay-

able to Pete Smith, and signed, "Miller Aluminum Company, Inc., James Pope, president."

On the back, across the top, were the signatures:

"Pete Smith, Rex Fenders"
Having completely forgotten his recent unfortunate experience, Joe shelled out \$47.00 change. The check turned out to be worthless, there being no Miller Aluminum Company, Inc., in existence.

But this time, Joe was protected. He collected the \$50. back from Rex Fenders.

An ordinary check, legally known as one form of negotiable instrument, is merely an order by its signer to the bank upon which it is drawn, to pay the specified amount to the person named on the check, or to the order of that person. The bank must pay only as directed by the signer of the check, or stand the loss itself.

What is meant when it is said that a check is a "negotiable instrument?" The ordinary check, that is, one payable to a designated person or order, or bearer, is negotiable, and by that is meant that any good faith or bona fide holder for value takes the check free from any defense that may exist against it in the hands of the named payee.

When is the holder of a check an "innocent, good faith, or bona

fide" holder? When anyone receives a check from a person other than the drawer of such check, for value and without knowledge of any defense which such drawer may have against the payee named in the check, he is said to be an innocent, good faith or bona fide holder.

For instance, if the drawer should find, after delivering the check, that the consideration received by him had been misrepresented to him, this would be a good defense against payment of the check in the hands of the payee, but a third party receiving the check without knowledge of this defense would be an innocent, good faith or bona fide holder.

Anyone who indorses a check thereby warrants that the check is good and that all signatures thereon are genuine. Where it turns out that a check is worthless, or where the signature of the maker or one of the indorsers has been forged, the person holding the check may collect back the amount of the check from the last indorser. But obviously, if the holder doesn't know the last indorser, or where he is, his chances of collecting are very poor.

Know your indorser.

GROUP OF COWBOYS STARTED JUBILEE RODEO HERE IN 1948

In 1948 a group of cowpokes gathered in the Dickens County REA office here at the ranch headquarters town with an idea in their heads and no money in their pockets. They wanted to start a rodeo, and, as far as we know, no one cowboy can be given credit for the idea, but several at their first meeting got their two bits worth in on how things should be started.

They had a lot of problems

to begin with, such as money, material, and labor. These cowpunchers were strong enough believers in their bright idea to think that it might pay off the first year. These boys who were interested in the atmosphere of rodeoing and the wild west decided to start on this win or lose proposition. They borrowed \$500 for their first show, but they were out of money before the first performance, and they had to depend upon the amount of

money they received at the gate and the number of people who were willing to see some rough cowpokes tangle with some of Goat Mayo's wildest stock.

Before the first show, the boys formed a rodeo association and asked Eric Swenson to help out on their first show. Many a cowboy hit the dust and it was a challenge between man and beasts. These cowpokes came through in 1948 and 5,000 people

crowded into Spur to see their show. Over \$2500 was made on that first show.

The Spur Cowboy rodeo association is now fully organized and incorporated. All income goes toward improving the football stadium and park and no officer or manager receives any pay for his work.

The first Spur Cowboy Jubilee was held in 1948 in the same place that the 1953 show will be

held, the beautiful natural arena located in Swenson Park. With the beautiful atmosphere of West Texas at its best, the rodeo grounds are nestled beneath a huge hill where the spectators are seated in concrete bleachers. The rodeo is held in the natural park facilities for cattle and horses to make it an excellent place for the roughest rodeo ever to be presented.

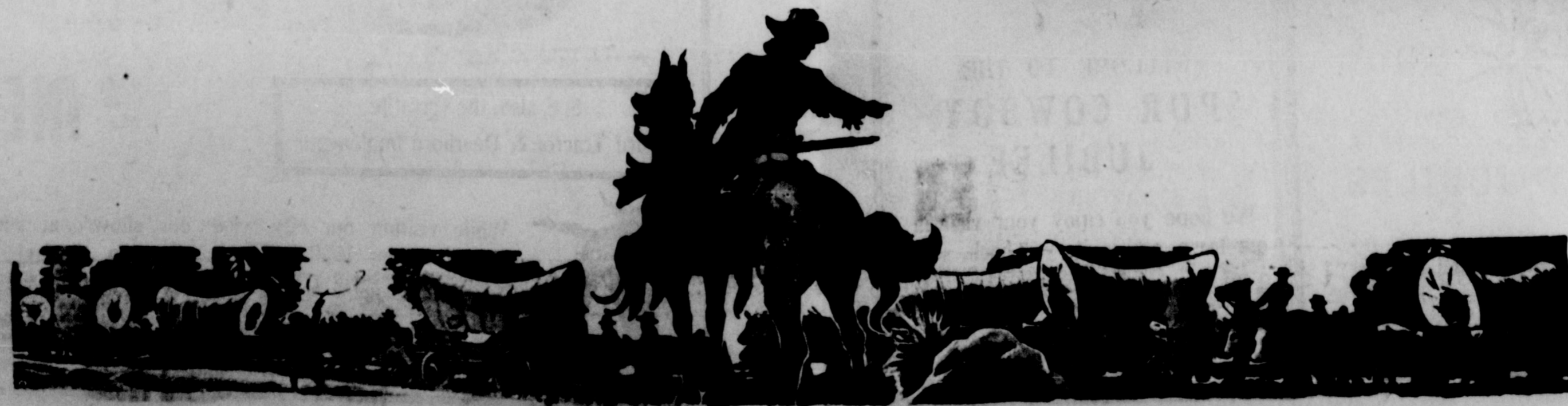

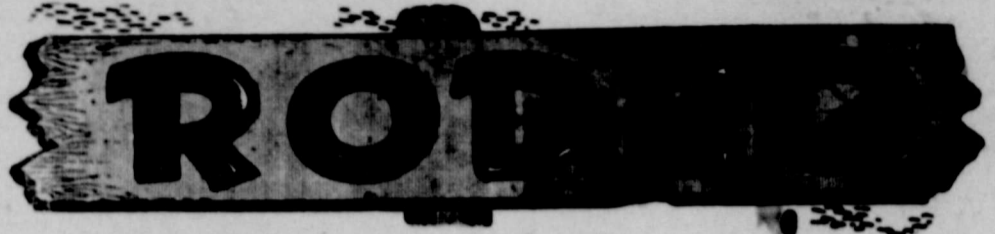

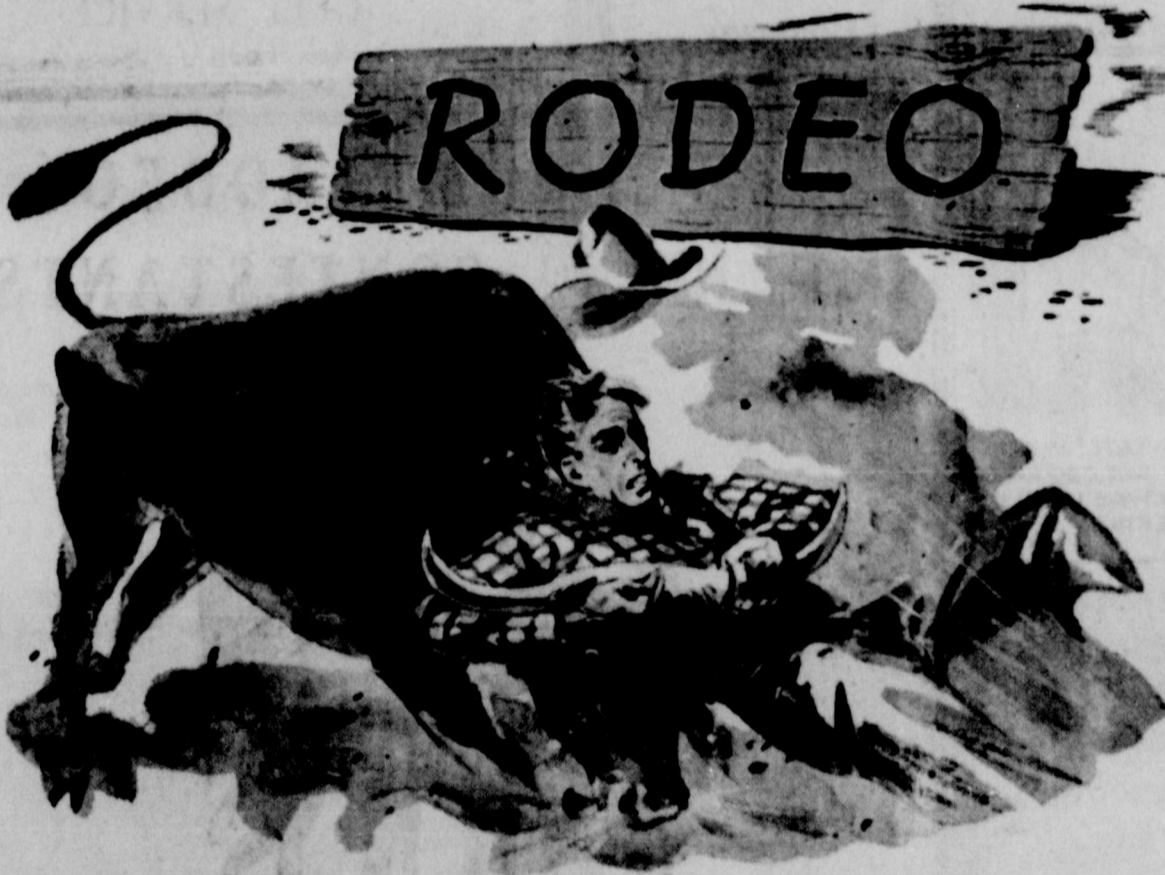

In 1948 Gilbert Brunson, Crosby, Kidd Dacot, Louis Rickles, Spur, Bob McAteer, Sour, Cap McNeill Crosbyton, and Johnnie Koonsman, Dickens, were the officials for the show. Those that were on the Board of Directors in 1948 and still remain are W. T. Andrews, Johnnie Koonsman, Tom Johnston, W. R. Weaver, and J. E. Swenson.

Some of the cowpunchers who won money in the first show and who were doing their best job in performing were Jeff Everett in cutting horse contest who was riding "Tursky". In the calf roping contest James Ray Hill of Snyder won prize money with 14.2. Dee Burrows, a rough cowboy from Floydada, won first money in the wild cow milking with 14 seconds flat. John Ferris won the bareback bronc riding contest and with these cowpunchers from the west who believe in this sort of stuff, the Spur Cowboy Rodeo had officially begun to gain in popularity.

GAINS MOMENTUM

By 1949 some great cowboys from all over West Texas were coming in for the second show. In 1949 Al Bingham made himself the champion of the old timer ropers and Bob Westerman

of Spur won second place. In that year the rodeo gained financially and spiritually and by this time there were some mighty happy cowpunchers who had had that crazy idea of a rodeo in 1948 and now they knew their dream had come true.

While turning back the pages of time we find that thousands of people in this area have taken a great interest in the annual cowboy rodeo. We look back to 1950 when Sammy Baugh, former college and pro-grid great, entered in the show and roped his calf in a speedy 15 seconds. 1950 saw an enthusiastic crowd of approximately 2500 persons at the first performance with 16 ropers turning in unheard of records, expert cowboys and horses performing at their best.

In 1951 Jimmy Bird of Post won the calf roping contest with 11.5. Miss Jaunelle Ward of Boone, Colorado, was the grand champion sponsor of West Texas. Dick Sampson of Clairemont won \$50 in the old timer roping contest; Dan Gilmore of Wichita Falls won the bareback bronc riding and Jesse Everett of Snyder won the cutting horse contest. These cowboys put on a show that year that was typical of the old West.

In the 1952 show we had the biggest bunch of cowpokes ever gathered in Spur with over 62 towns represented. This show of 1952 was the greatest one ever presented. We had the roughest cowpunchers in the West, with the wildest stock, and the most beautiful cowgirls which gave four night of good rodeo entertainment.

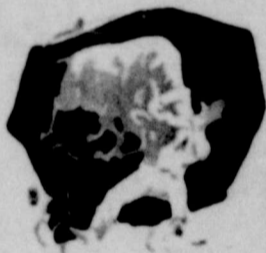

Water Is Theme For State Fair Of Texas

An impressive display of products raised by Rolling Plains farmers will be featured in this region's colorful "Agriculturama"

exhibit at the 1953 State Fair of Texas, Oct. 10-25.

The Rolling Plains is included in the Texas A&M College System Extension District 3, composed of the following counties: Archer, Baylor, Childress, Cottle, Kink, Dickens, Fisher, Foard, Hall, Hardeman, Haskell, Jones, Kent, Knox, Motley, Shackel-

ford, Stephens, Stonewall, Throckmorton, Wichita, Wilbarger and Young.

Grain sorghum, cotton bolls, wheat and alfalfa will surround two live calves and a cluster of mesquite in a display which will indicate how the mesquite cheats the soil of water, how stockmen who are destroying the mesquite have cattle that are thriving.

Mesquite grows over 55 million acres of Texas, saps both sub-surface water and plant food from the land. Its control has increased importance during the drought.

Agriculture leaders of District 3 who cooperated with the fair in working out the Rolling PL-

ains exhibit include: Roy Quinby, Chillicothe; Lester Brooks, Iowa Park; C. E. Fisher, Spur; V. E. Hainer and Mrs. Jaunita Titus, Childress; and Frank Wendt and Joy Riley, Vernon.

The dramatic three-dimensional "Agriculturama" will include individual exhibits for each of the A&M Extension Service districts of Texas. They will carry out the "Water for Texas" theme of the Agriculture Show, explaining the water resources problems of farmers and ranchers in different parts of the state.

A huge central exhibit will depict the hydrological cycle -- what happens to water after it falls as rain and how it is re-

Water was chosen as the central theme for the show because it is one of the most important single factors in Texas agriculture today, fair officials explained.

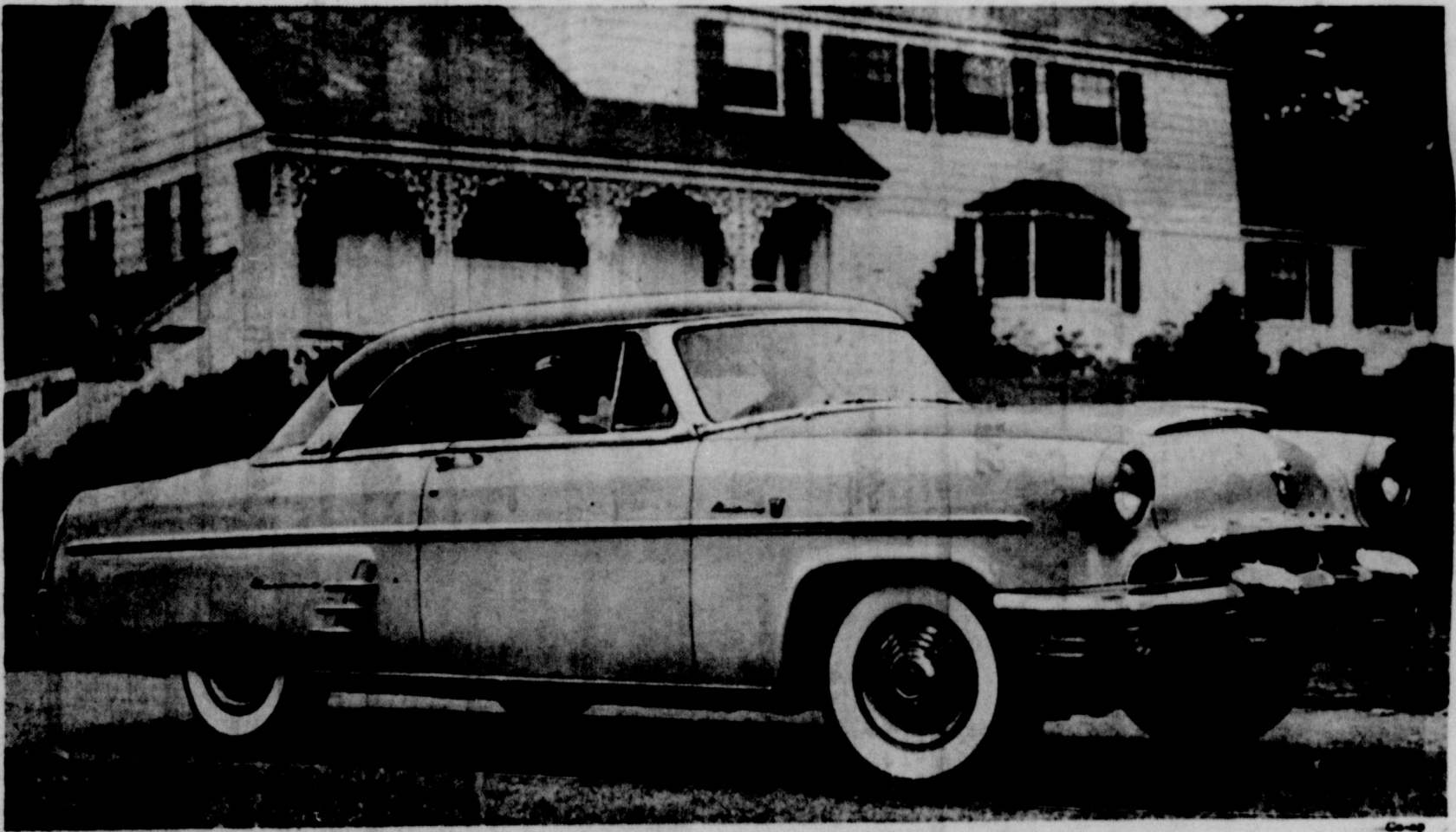

Brush Control Is Drought Protection

Right now one of the scarcest items in Texas is water. During times of adequate rainfall, says A. H. Walker, range specialist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, the water problem does not often get the attention it deserves. And, he continues, something can be done during the wet periods to help overcome the drouthy periods.

He points out that in many areas of the state, brush is being grown instead of grass. Ever under drouth conditions, he says, areas treated for brush control will produce twice as much grass an acre as will untreated areas. Undesirable trees and brush are using water and minerals which could be producing forage for livestock, he says. Controlling these undesirable plants, he continues, is only a part of a good

range management program for if benefits are to be derived, then proper stocking rates, deferred and rotated grazing along with other practices must be carried out.

Chemical control of hardwood, through research conducted by the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, has been proved both practical and profitable. A circular C-330, More Grass From Controlling Hardwood, has just been released by the Extension Service and it carries recommendations and information on how the job can best be done. The circular is available at the office of county agricultural agents and is yours for the asking.

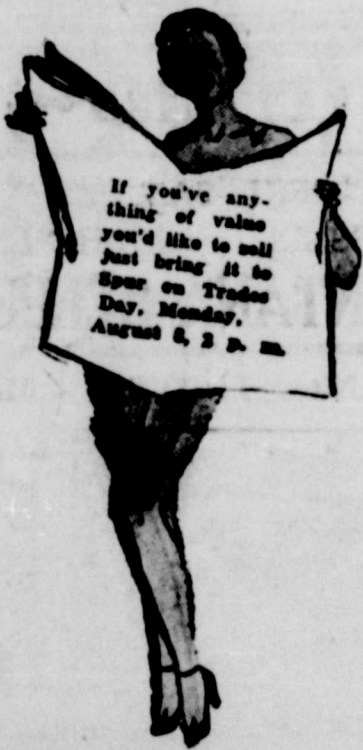
