POWERS IS ASSESSED TO POST OFFICE DEPT. STAFF

Russell E. Powers has been added to the local post office department personnel. Powers came from Tampa, Florida as the result of a mutual exchange with A. L. Foreman. He arrived in Spur August 4th. Powers is married and has one little girl who will be in the first grade this coming school year.

Two men were killed and one critically injured in a flaming two-truck collision at 6 p. m. Monday two miles west of Dickens on the Lubbock-Dickens highway during a driving rain.

Dead are Sammy Nooley, 19, son of Mrs. Margaret Smith of Lubbock, and J. C. Williams, about 35, of Fort Worth. Nooley was apparently killed instantly. Williams died en route to a hospital.

A third man, Doyle Lee Weir, son of Mr. and Mrs. C. S. Weir of Lubbock, is in a Lubbock hospital in a critical condition. However, late Tuesday night he was reported somewhat improved. He is suffering from multiple fractures, internal injuries and cuts about the head.

The accident occurred on the straight stretch of highway just east of the Duck Creek crossing. A Seven-Up Bottling company truck and five-ton Kimbell Grocery company trailer truck out of Fort Worth apparently met head on, according to reports from investigating highway patrolmen.

Spur Man Awarded Star For Bravery

Heading the list of men honored at the 517th FABN parade and review last week was Sgt. Willard Hutton. He was awarded the Bronze Star for heroic action in Korea.

During a battle there, although Sgt. Hutton was on a ridge line exposed to fire and observation by the enemy, he unhesitatingly moved across the fire-swept terrain and assisted in carrying a wounded man to safety.

Hutton is a veteran of World War II and he reenlisted in the army in September of 1952. He is now serving in Germany. His wife, Ma Vell, and his mother, Mrs. Bertha Hutton, live in Spur.

The cause of the accident has not yet been determined but it is believed that the blinding torrents of rain falling at the time of the accident were instrumental if not the sole cause.

Spur's heaviest fall was Monday night and Tuesday morning with an official 2.58 inches at the Experiment Station. However, Dr. Earl Burnett, official weather recorder at the station, reported that an unofficial gauge on the south side of the station read three and a half inches.

Charles Taylor, county agent reports that several farms in the McAdoo area have not yet received moisture in a drought-ending amount.

Reports from up around Croton Tuesday morning were that that area had received up to four and a half inches the previous night.

South and south west of town received only around a half inch Monday night, but have reported other showers since then.

In general over the area, farmers are beginning to smile again as feed is growing by leaps and bounds and a good start toward good wheat seasoning is started.

Taylor reports that not very much feed died in the fields before last week's rain, but he also reports that much of the growing feed crop is going to be dangerously late for a money crop since it was so late getting a good start.

Subscription rates at the Texas Spur returned to normal Tuesday morning with the report of over two inches rain.

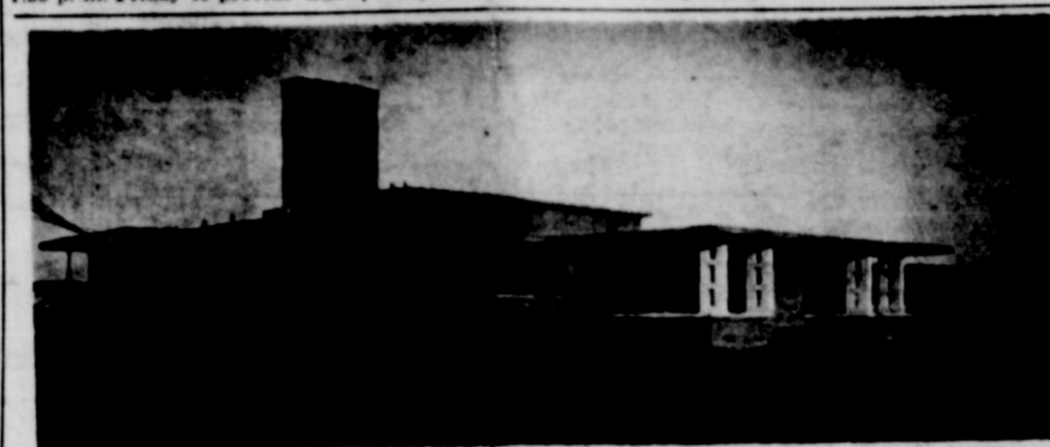
This new cafe will offer curb service and will open each morning at 5 o'clock, closing on week days at 12 mid night and on Saturdays at 2 a. m.

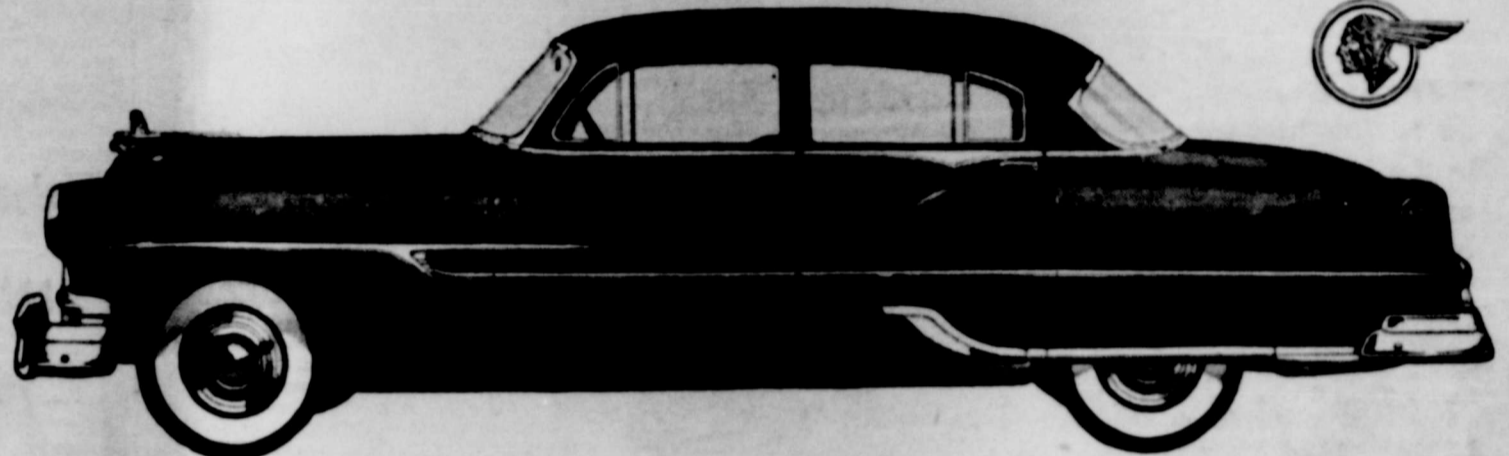

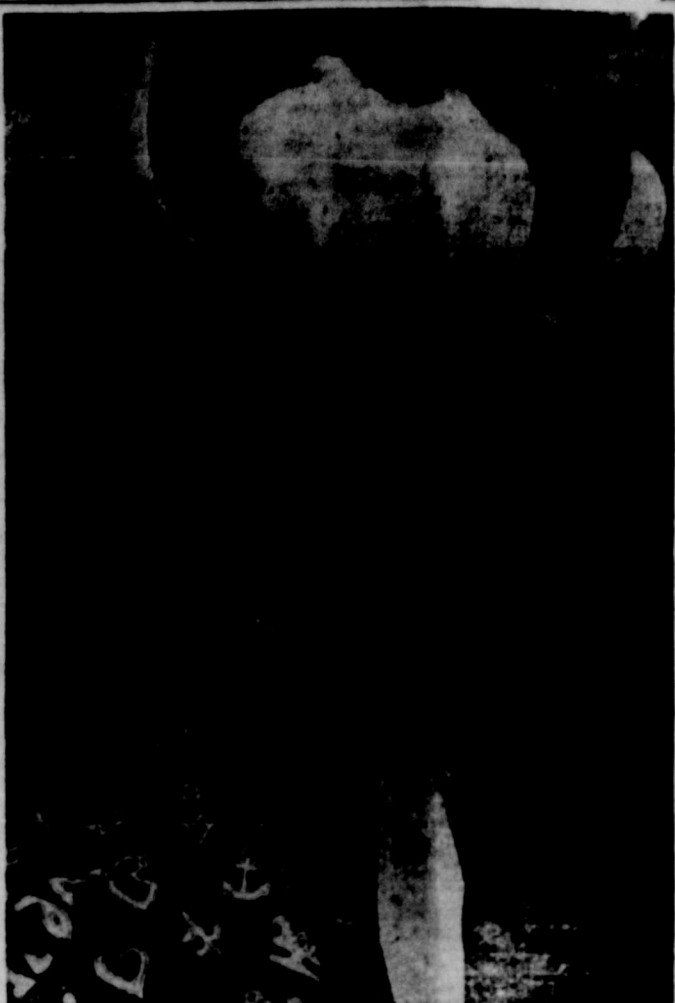

ANCIENT BEAUTIES TO BE SHOWN AT ANNUAL TEXAS STATE FAIR

The growing popularity of the antique automobile hobby in Texas will be demonstrated with the fifth annual exhibition of ancient beauties at the 1953 State Fair of Texas, October 10 through 25. Dan C. Williams, chairman of the fair's Antique Auto Committee, has announced.

Members of the North Texas Horseless Carriage Clubs are already busy preparing for the fair—refurbishing and reactivating the classics of yesteryears, ranging from Stanley Steamers to Hupmobiles, he said.

Trophies will be awarded for best restored cars, cars with best mechanical operation, cars from the longest distance away and most popular cars.

Driving contests to be held Sunday, October 11 will include cranking, backing, blindfold driving, and see-saw balancing events. Plus a contest where the driver spears oranges with a lance while his car is in motion.

Back for the 1953 fair will be a 1907 Hupmobile Model 20 Roadster which was shown just outside the exhibit tent last year in a dilapidated condition. It has been completely restored and is as dashing as the day it left the factory.

Most of the ancient autos are fitted with new bodies and special machined-tooled parts. All are in perfect running condition.

The veterans of the road usually get around under their own power, but if the car is particularly aged and the distance great, some owners transport them via trailer, Williams said.

However, a 1920 Stanley Steamer was driven from Houston to the fair last year by J. Pabst a member of the fair's antique auto committee.

Progress of the antique car craze in Texas can be measured by the size of the fair's show, which has grown each year, Williams says. In the 1949 show only about seven cars were shown. 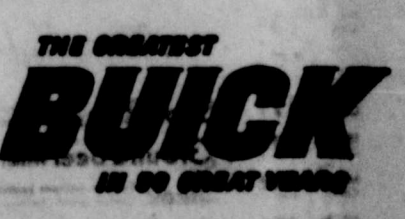
