Chamber of Commerce Doings . . . SURVEY SHOWS APPROX \$1,500,000 FLOOD DAMAGE IN SPUR AREA

The rains were fine, but some parts of the area had more than they could handle.
We were very fortunate in not having more damage than we did, however.
In our Sunday afternoon driving we were in Afton and saw lots of damage in the town as well as the community, as a whole. The road east of Afton was washed out, and according to John Cumbie, approximately \$10,000 damage was done on that road alone.
The farmland was washed to the extent that it will take several years to get it back in shape. There were some places that will probably never be fit for farming again.

We understand that Jack Lawson lost some cattle in the East Afton community.

Monday morning we continued our survey of the area to include Highway, Dry Lake, Foreman's Chapel and Espuela. In these areas there was extensive damage to fields, homes and roads.

As late as Wednesday water was still running out of Dry Lake across the road south and west of the lake. Lloyd Hindman reports that back in 1932 or 1933 the lake was that full. Only the heavy grain crop prevented much more severe damage to fields.

Most of us here in Spur saw the damage done north of town. Some old-timers say that they have seen logs along where the highway is now but never as high as this time.

Bud Morrison recalls coming along the creek in 1900 or 1901 and seeing logs along where Guy Goen and A. D. Hord are now living.

So we are convinced that the flood of Oct., 1953 was the worst in over 50 years.
In talking with Johnnie Cumbie of Dickens, we learned that the highway department is still wandering why every bridge from Dickens to Afton and from Dickens to the caprock didn't wash out. The bridges did stand the flood, however, with only

TRAFFIC ORDINANCE PASSED BY BOARD

CITY COMMISSION CALLS ELECTION ON ISSUE FOR NOVEMBER 17

The City Commission of Spur has called an election for Tuesday, Nov. 17 at which time the voters of Spur will vote for or against selling the city light plant to the West Texas Utilities Company.

Mayor George Gabriel and Commissioners Dave McAteer and Walter Gruben acted in response to a formal proposal submitted by WTU at the regular meeting of the commission this week.

In the proposal the WTU agrees to pay \$350,000.00 for the plant and the city's electrical system, plus the following provisions:

To pay the City 2% on its gross receipts for a franchise right and for the use of the city's streets and alleys;

To enter into a contract for ten years to furnish power for the city's water pumping and street lighting use at the WTU's standard rate for such power;

To lower the rates for electrical power approximately 5%;

To consolidate the present WTU and city systems into one system so as to improve the appearance of the system.

The proposition has been under consideration by the city officials and WTU officials for some time, with the price being raised only recently from \$300,000.00 to \$350,000.00.

The election order as issued by the City Commission appears complete on page 3 of this newspaper.

A signed copy of the formal proposal, the election order and the schedules of proposed rates for the City and for the citizens are filed in both the City Office and the Texas Spur office and are available for inspection.

O. L. Kelley, one of the citizen group advocating the sale of the City plant, says that such a proposition would more than triple the present profits from the plant. He points out that the 5% reduction in rates will net the people of Spur a total of approximately \$5,570.00 per year.

At present rate of consumption the franchise tax to be paid by the WTU would amount to approximately \$2,500.00.

Kelley states that the city would save approximately \$2,000.00 per year on the cost of the power now being used by the City. The City Electric Department last year charged the Water Department \$4,141.25 for the same services that under the proposed contract would cost only \$2,073.00.

One of the main items being talked by Kelley and others who favor the sale is that the purchase price would be more than enough to put the city out of debt and would save about \$9,940.00 per year in interest.

Finally Kelley points out that upon acquiring the City electric property the WTU would have to pay more taxes to the City, County and School District in the total amount of approximately \$4,000.00.

The total of these items is approximately \$24,000.00, or slightly over three times the net profit shown in last year's audit.

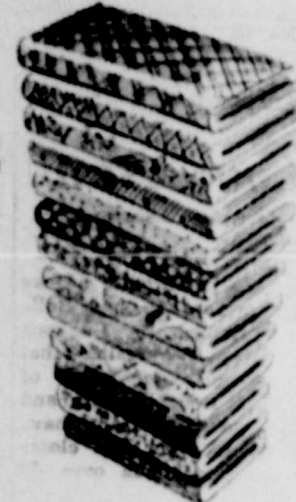

CITIZEN'S RIGHTS IN COURT EXPLAINED

Unless you have a close relative who is a lawyer, your opinion of our courts probably is a mixture of hearsay, rumor, mystery and awe. The average citizen has had little experience with the courts, and is apt to view with a sinking feeling some document requiring his presence in court.

Most criminals have a good idea of their rights in court, but the average citizen, confronted with a traffic ticket or court summons, has little knowledge of the protections provided for him. If you are innocent of the charge and know your rights as a citizen in court, you need have no fear of your appearance before the jury and judge.

Probably the most fundamental and important right is summarized in the well-known adage, "Every man is innocent until proved guilty." It is up to the prosecuting authorities to prove that the person on trial is guilty -- and not the obligation of the person accused to prove that he is innocent. The prosecution must prove your guilt beyond a reasonable doubt, or you will be acquitted. The mere fact that you have been given a ticket or accused of a crime is not even evidence of guilt.

Another important protection is the right to have a witness whose testimony you may need subpoenaed to appear in court and testify. Many people are reluctant to go to court when their own rights are involved, and unless you had a means for compelling their attendance and testimony, you often would be unable to prove the facts necessary for success in your case.

It is the duty of every citizen to testify if he has information important to a law suit and is called upon to do so. The courts can and do enforce attendance in court and the giving of testimony.

Certain other safeguards are valuable to you. A person may refuse to testify in any proceeding if he has a reasonable belief that his testimony could be used as a basis of a criminal proceeding against him. This does not mean of course that a confession given freely and voluntarily cannot be used in evidence. But it does mean that an accused cannot be compelled to take the witness stand, nor can his failure to testify be commented upon by the prosecution.

Our courts provide many safeguards for the innocent against the accusations of crime. But many of these rights would be valueless without the assistance of a lawyer, who has been schooled in legal principles and rules of statutes or decision involved, to invoke these rights. The "right to counsel" must be granted to every accused person brought before any court in the state. The law provides that if an accused person cannot afford to pay for legal counsel and desires it, the court must appoint a lawyer to assist him in his case.

The courts are open to you any time one of your legal rights has been denied or any of your property has been unlawfully taken. This is one of your most precious rights. The courts are the only peaceful means of enforcing your rights.

(This column, based on Texas law, is written to inform-not advise. No person should ever apply or interpret any law without the aid of an attorney who knows the facts, because the facts may change the application of the law.)

Every person charged with an infraction of the law has the right to consult counsel before making any plea. This applies to cases in every court -- including justice of the peace courts, municipal courts, traffic courts and district courts. It does little good to consult a lawyer after you have pleaded guilty and paid the fine, for then the damage has been done.

A Business Proposal to the Citizens of Spur.

TO THE HONORABLE MAYOR AND CITY COMMISSIONERS
THE CITY OF SPUR
SPUR, TEXAS
Gentlemen:

October 27, 1953

I.

We have heretofore informally submitted to you a proposal to purchase the electric plant and distribution system owned by the people of the City of Spur, Texas, for a sum of Three Hundred Thousand and no/100 (300,000.00) Dollars plus other considerations as set out in the proposal. In subsequent meetings and conversations with you gentlemen, you have discussed with us your reason for thinking that our proposal should be raised, and you have suggested that the cash sum should be at least Three Hundred and Fifty Thousand and no/100 (\$350,000.00) Dollars. We have made additional survey concerning the future development of the Spur area and have revised our proposal in line with the additional information furnished to us by you to raise the value of the plant and system, including the good will and other intangible assets, as well as its future potential growth. We therefore withdraw our former proposal, and subject to a vote of the people of Spur, Texas, submit to you the following new proposal:

A. A cash consideration of Three Hundred and Fifty Thousand and no/100 Dollars (\$350,000.00) to be paid to the City upon consummation of sale, with City to convey to Company by Warranty Deed and Bill of Sale, all real and personal properties connected with said plant and distribution system, including all customers' meter deposits, all operating and maintenance supplies and materials including fuel oil, but excluding all accounts and notes receivable and with all properties to be free of all liens and encumbrances. Also, City to furnish to Company complete abstracts of title to real properties and necessary and proper evidences of good title to all properties;

B. The City to agree that the sale and delivery of said electric plant and system to the Company, shall carry with it the City's good will, and rights to operate said system, and the Company's right to continue to operate said electric plant and system, after merging same with its own system, and to make additions thereto and extensions thereof, including the use of the streets and alleys and other public thoroughfares in the City of Spur, for a term of at least thirty-five (35) years; with this thirty-five (35) year franchise right to be authorized by proper City ordinance. Company agrees that in addition to above purchase price, that it will also pay for such use of streets and alleys two (2) per cent per year on all its gross revenues received from sale of electric service within the limits of the City of Spur, (excluding revenues received from industrial, municipal and other governmental users); Plus,

C. The City will call an election at an early date, requesting approval by the qualified voters of the City of Spur, of the proposals herein contained.

This agreement will not be consummated unless the qualified voters of the City of Spur, at an election, approve such sale. And, it is further agreed that the sale will not be consummated until and unless the governing body of the City of Spur is legally authorized to make said sale, and the purchaser is legally authorized to make the purchase.

II.

In addition to the above consideration to the City for said plant and system, the Company will also:

Company also agrees to replace within six (6) months after date of contract, sixteen (16) wood poles in existing street lighting system as now located on Burlington Avenue with modern steel poles.

C. Provide electric service for all other City uses and departments, on Company's standard terms, conditions and rates.

put up a strong building without a good foundation. Properly seeded and fertilized pasture not only yield succulent grazing, but they rebuild the soil.

The goal of such a pasture, the specialist says, is to establish and maintain a balanced stand of desirable pasture plants along with the highest possible grazing capacity. Soil minerals, organic matter, nitrogen and, in some sections, drainage are prob-

lems, which must be considered. Sections of the state where drought and overgrazing have killed desirable plants are areas where land owners can begin to rebuild grassland. Also, this is the time to plant permanent pastures in timber and woodland; recently cleared areas covered with low producing bermuda, carpet or other lands infested with needlegrass and broomsedge or ranges infested

with low quality fescue plants. Test the soil to determine fertility needs, then follow the recommendation. Trew advises. Bulletin B-197 contains additional information on pasture building and copies may be obtained from county agricultural agents.

Grassman Offers Facts On Cotton

Oscar L. Grassman of Little River, an ardent follower of agriculture research, offered some interesting facts on his 1953 cotton crop to approximately 1,500 farmers from over the cotton belt who recently convened at the Temple Experiment Station.

The growers met to observe the results of cotton defoliation research and see the performance of cotton harvesters in preparation of going all out in the mechanization of their cotton crop.

Grassman, who farms about five miles from the Blackland station, has been a regular visitor to the station for many years. Since 1948, the first year of cotton defoliation and machine harvesting research at the station, Grassman has followed the work closely.

The Bell County farmer told the group he started spraying his 7953 cotton for defoliation on Tuesday of one week in accordance with recommendations. On the following Friday he re-sprayed with a plant discant to eliminate remaining green growth.

On the next Monday, Grassman began harvesting operations and mechanically picked 16 bales. The following day he harvested 20 bales and the third

Now Is The Time To Plan Better Pastures

Developing a good pasture from worn-out, depleted soil is a rebuilding process. And, says Ted M. Trew, extension pasture specialist, if better Texas pastures are to be had, farmers and ranchmen will have to build them.

This is an opportune time for livestock producers to plan better pastures by planting annual legumes and grasses, especially with moisture conditions favorable in many sections of the state. Since pastures of the permanent type are not established over night, the planting of these annual plants sets a foundation for an eventual perennial pasture, Trew says.

Trying to establish a good perennial or permanent pasture on soil low in minerals and organic matter is like attempting to

Grassman's experience is cited as an example of the benefits Texas farmers gain when research information is followed closely and put to use in a well planned program of agricultural production.

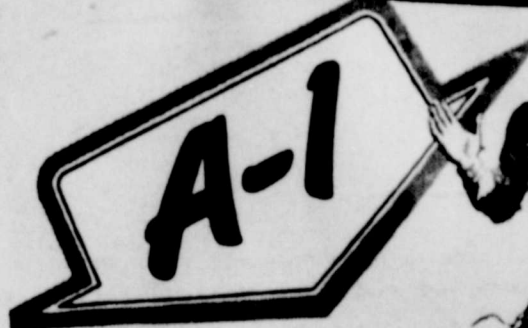

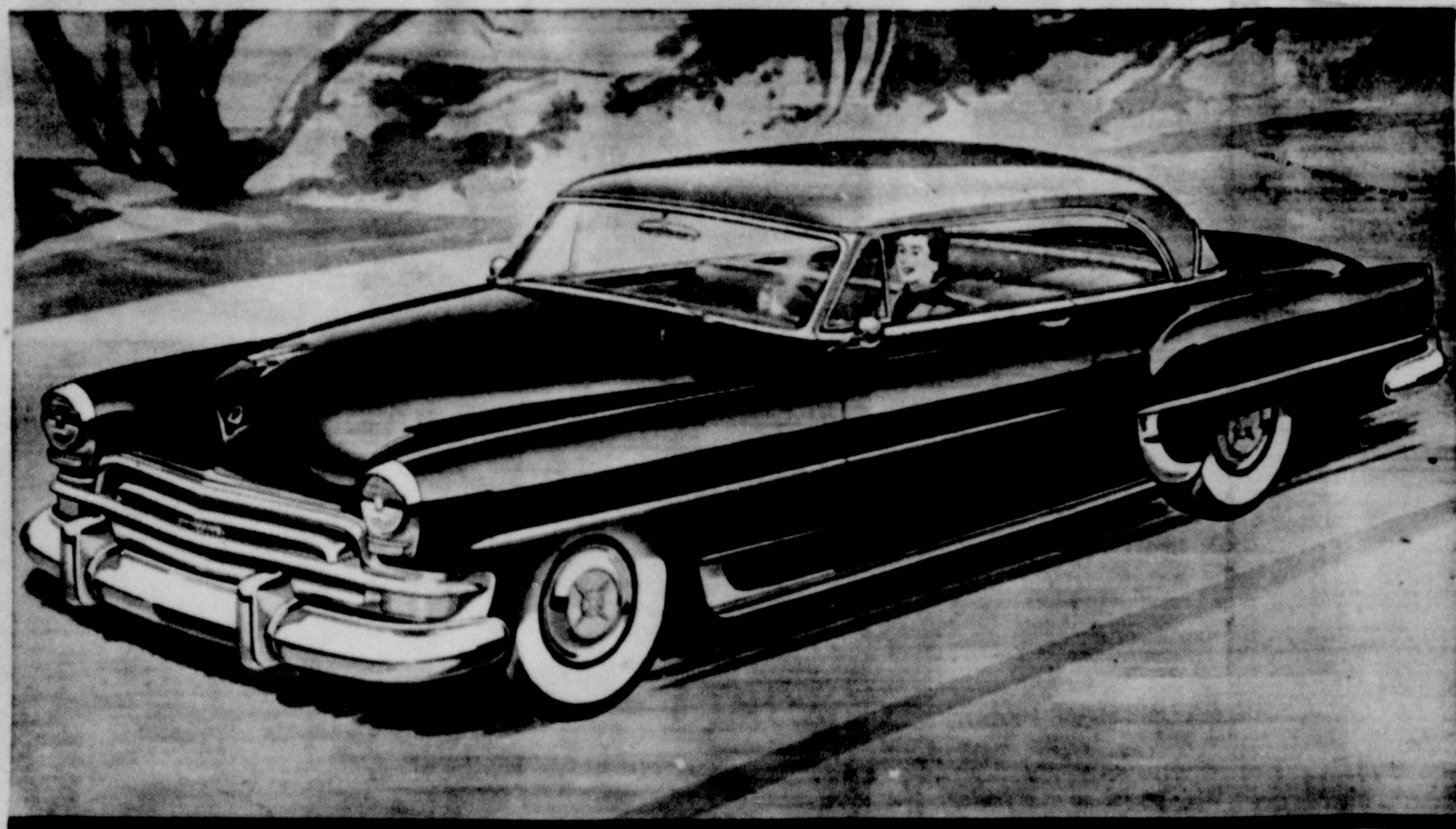

AN ORDINANCE BY THE BOARD OF CITY COMMISSIONERS OF THE TOWN OF SPUR, DICKENS COUNTY, TEXAS, PROVIDING FOR TRAFFIC REGULATIONS.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE BOARD OF CITY COMMISSIONERS OF THE TOWN OF SPUR, DICKENS COUNTY, TEXAS:

SECTION 1. All terms and provisions of Article 6701d of the Revised Civil Statutes of Texas, popularly known as the Uniform Act Regulating Traffic on Highways or the Uniform Traffic Code, as amended to this date are hereby adopted and are by reference expressly incorporated herein to the following extent, to-wit:

(a) All definitions or words and phrases set forth therein are expressly adopted and made a part of this ordinance.

(b) All violations of the laws of this State of Texas as therein set forth, defined and described, when done or committed within the limits of the Town of Spur, Dickens County, Texas, are also violations of this ordinance and the laws of said Town, except insofar as the further provisions of this ordinance set forth below shall be in conflict with said Article 6701d.

SECTION 2. As said Article 6701d of any term or provision thereof is repealed or amended by the Legislature of the State of Texas, this ordinance, insofar as it incorporates and adopts such Article 6701d, shall be automatically amended so as to conform to and be in accordance with such Legislative changes, without a further ordinance or order by this Board of City Commissioners.

SECTION 3. No driver of a vehicle whose vehicle is facing a direction shall be allowed to turn his vehicle in the opposite direction or make what is commonly known as a "U" turn, in any of the following places in said town:

(a) At the intersection of Burlington Avenue with either Third Street, Fifth Street or Harris Street.

(b) On Burlington Avenue between Second Street and Sixth Street.

(c) Anywhere between Willard Avenue and Trumbull Avenue on either Harris Street, Third Street, Fifth Street or Sixth Street.

SECTION 4. No driver of a vehicle shall make a left turn on Burlington Avenue between Second Street and Sixth Street, except for the purpose of turning into an intersecting street or alley or for the purpose of turning into a private driveway of any business establishment located on any corner adjacent to such street intersection.

SECTION 5. No driver of a vehicle shall stop or park his vehicle or any part thereof upon a sidewalk or any other place designated by signs or markers for the exclusive use of pedestrians.

SECTION 6. No driver of a vehicle shall stop on such his vehicle in any alley in such a fashion as to block any part of the main traveled portion thereof.

SECTION 7. A driver of a vehicle who parks his vehicle on Burlington Avenue between Second Street and Sixth Street shall park his vehicle facing a curb, or, in absence of a curb, facing a yellow painted stripe delineating a parking border; and he shall park his vehicle between the yellow painted stripes delineating and indicating parking areas within the front of his vehicle making an approximate 30 degree angle with the curb or yellow border line and with the right front wheel located not more than 12 inches from such curb or yellow border line.

SECTION 8. A driver of a vehicle who parks his vehicle between Willard Avenue and Trumbull Avenue on either Third Street, Fifth Street or Sixth Street shall park such vehicle parallel with and not more than 18 inches from a curb and shall park such vehicle between the yellow markers on the curb delineating and indicating parking areas along the curb.

SECTION 9. A portion of curb in front of an office of the Justice of the Peace for Precinct No. 3, Dickens County, Texas, shall be painted yellow, and only peace officers of the Town of Spur, County of Dickens or State of Texas shall be allowed to park parallel with such portion of curb.

SECTION 10. It shall be a misdemeanor for any person to violate any provision of this ordinance; and every person convicted of a misdemeanor for a violation of any provision of this ordinance shall be punished by a fine of not less than One (\$1.00) Dollar nor more than Two Hundred (\$200.00) Dollars.

SECTION 11. All ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict with this ordinance are hereby expressly repealed. And, if any part or parts of this ordinance shall be held to be unconstitutional, such unconstitutionality shall not affect the validity of the remaining parts of this ordinance, and said Board hereby declares that it would have passed the remaining parts of this ordinance if it had known that such part or parts thereof would be declared unconstitutional.

SECTION 12. It is deemed by said Board that an emergency exists, and this ordinance shall go into effect immediately upon its passage and publication according to law.
