Consider what you can leave undone. If you don't want to bend, stoop, stretch or reach too far THINK, and you can avoid it. Store things within easy reach. Hang pots and pans on hooks.

Let someone else or something else do the job. Let dishes dry themselves. Does the job have to be done at all? You don't need to iron sheets, towels, cup towels, socks
