

Every farmer who sells his crop at harvest-time loses money. Prices are always lowest when the supply is greatest—harvest-time. The chart above shows how prices of grain crops rise in the mouths following harvest. Grain storage buildings, such as Quonsets, frequently pay for themselves in one year because of this rise in prices. Farmers who stored their soybeans in any of the past five years and sold them at the later year's high price made a profit each year which, on the average, was far more than the cost of their grain storage buildings. 
