The action was taken by the court because of lack of funds in the general fund with which to pay the salaries.

The Olton Mustangs have an almost perfect record in every department this season. To date they have won four without a defeat and have had a lone six-point score against them. In the state-wide ratings, the Mustangs are in the sixth spot as a defensive club.

Olton is located 25 miles due west of Plainview. The school busses carrying the players, pep squad and band will make the trip via Idalou and Plainview.

She was a student of the academic year of 1953-54 from this 133rd district of Rotary International. Such scholarship will again be awarded this year from this district to a graduate student of requisite qualifications.

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FOG BLAMED FOR CAR-TRUCK COLISION WEDNESDAY AFTERNOON

A tragic accident taking the lives of three men occurred in the fog and light mist falling in the area near McAdoo early Wednesday afternoon as the car in which they were riding crashed headon into a truck while attempting to pass a large trailer-truck.

Killed in the collision were Butler Adams, 65, James Butler Adams, 24, his son, and R. L. McHam Jr., all of Ralls.

The Oldsmobile in which the victims were riding was demolished as was the cab part of the truck. The two vehicles were welded together by the force of the smashup.

The driver of the truck, J. H. Biggerstaff, 40 of Benjamin was not injured.

The driver of the truck which the Ralls trio had been attempting to pass heard the crash and returned to the scene. All of the men were dead by the time the two truck drivers reached them.

All three bodies were brought to Chandler Funeral Home and later were taken to Marr-Carter Funeral Home in Ralls.

The month of October got off to a good start Friday with a half an inch rain recorded at the experiment station. Additional rains Tuesday and Wednesday brought 1.20 inch bringing the total for the month so far to 1.7.



Every farmer who sells his crop at harvest-time loses money. Prices are always lowest when the supply is greatest—harvest-time. The chart above shows how prices of grain crops rise in the months following harvest. Grain storage buildings, such as Quonset, frequently pay for themselves in one year because of this rise in prices. Farmers who stored their soybeans in any of the past five years and sold them at the later year's high price made a profit each year which, on the average, was far more than the cost of their grain storage buildings. Even without a government support program, grain storage buildings are real money makers.



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


