Research with a new simplified milk-replacer formula has given promising results among young dairy calves. Milk-replacers are a substitute for whole milk in the diets of young animals. The new formula under test at Texas A. and M. College contains dried skim milk, dried whey and a vitamin A and D supplement.

Feed consumption of steers fed the antibiotic, terramycin, dropped slightly and returned an additional \$3.93 per head. The animals on test at the Spur Agricultural Experiment Station were fed 75 milligrams of terramycin daily.

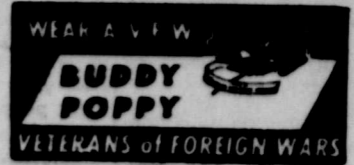

Will your six year old be ready for reading writing and arithmetic Sept. '35?

To parents who will have a child or children starting to school next September:

Do you know what educators tell us that one reason normal boys and girls fail to learn to read, write and cipher is because the process is forced upon them in the public school before they are ready for it?

Do you know that a child must be a certain age mentally before he can read, write or cipher? Do you know that mental maturity is acquired?

Do you know that the public school teachers are trained to teach the technique of, or the HOW of reading, writing and ciphering and that they can do very little about your child's maturity after he gets to school?

Do you know that the average child could read, write or cipher when taught to, if he were ready for that process when exposed.

Do you know that a child must be successful in his attempts to do anything or he becomes discouraged and dislikes what is done to him to the point that he will never try again?

Do you know that sound principles of education teach that there is one time and that time is the right time in a life time to teach your child to read? If he misses the time he becomes a remedial or retarded student.

Do you know that Texas provides education for three types of children:

First Type—The exceptional child (One who is the exception to the general rule in any detail, too slow, too fast, and cannot fit into a regular school routine). Yet, education is for him!

Second Type—The special child, where special methods are needed to teach him because of some handicap.

Third Type—The ordinary average child who accepts whatever the community offers in education, whether he fits or not. Your child will be in one of these three classes. Do you know which?

Do you know that your county educators (superintendents, principals and class room teachers) think that Readiness for educational 6 year olds is a sound educational gesture?

Have you talked to your local or county superintendent about your 6 year old?

Would you be interested in a Readiness School for the 6 year olds of Dickens County?

Do you want your child to have a scientific approach to reading, writing and arithmetic?

Do you know the difference between a Kindergarten and a Readiness school?

Would some of you express your point of view in the local newspaper or call or write me?

TERRAMYCIN . . . ITS EFFECTS ON FATTENING STEERS AT SPUR STATION

Steers fed 75 milligrams of terramycin daily gave additional returns of \$3.93 per head in preliminary antibiotic feeding trials at the Spur Agricultural Experiment Station.

"Antibiotics in poultry and swine rations have been used successfully to increase gains and reduce their cost," says John H. Jones, professor of animal husbandry at Texas A. and M. College. "But the benefits of antibiotics in fattening rations of ruminants have not been fully developed."

In these latest studies two groups of seven steers each were fed terramycin animal mix, T.M.-5, at rates of 75 to 150 milligrams daily. A third group of seven steers served as a check.

Prof. Jones reports animals fed 75 milligrams consumed 111 pounds less feed for each 100 pounds of gain while those on 150 milligrams took 52 pounds less feed for the same gain. During the first 28 of the 110 day trial, feed consumption for all groups varied only slightly. The effects of terramycin were noticed after the twenty-eighth day.

While daily gains of 2.18, 2.21 and 2.10 pounds were not significant, Prof. Jones says reduced feed intake made the difference and gave the terramycin-fed animals the advantage.

Because of the increased cost of terramycin—about 65 cents

a pound—steers fed at the 150 milligram level had an overall higher cost of gain and, returned only \$1.08 per head over animals deprived of the antibiotic. All steers sold for same price at the Fort Worth market.

The Terramycin was mixed with cottonseed meal and ground grain and spread over chopped

negari bundles or fodder in the feed troughs.

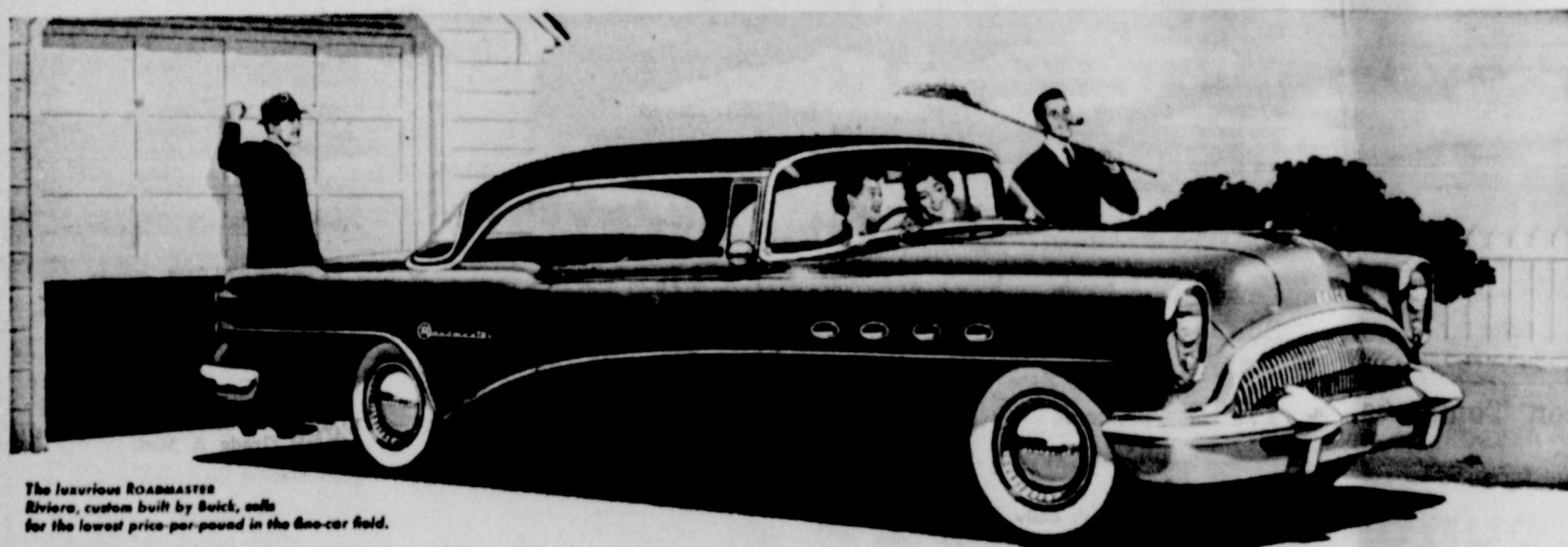
