Dickens vs Flomont Here Saturday

The Dickens high school six-man football team will meet Flomont in the Jones stadium at Spur Saturday night, Oct. 23, at 7:30 p. m.
Last week Dickens lost to the Petersburg team at Petersburg.
School reopened at Dickens yesterday following a recess for cotton harvesting.

Supt. H. F. Collins reports that many of the Dickens students joined in the cotton pulling during the recess, but that the primary reason for the recess was to allow area farmers to hire transient Mexican families with school-age children. He added, also, that a number of students were staying out of school to pick cotton and this situation was seriously affecting the school's average daily attendance. He stresses that students should attend school as regularly as possible for their own benefit and to maintain an average daily attendance as high as possible because of the numerous school benefits that are based on it—including the number of teachers.

During the harvest vacation the school installed a bus system to replace the old inadequate steam system. Speaking for the people of Dickens who are Spur High School ex-students, Supt. Collins congratulated the Spur exes on the fine homecoming last week end.

PIPERS SLIP OVER LAST MINUTE SCORE TO TIE BULLDOGS 20-20

The Spur Bulldogs open their district 5-AA play in Jones stadium here tomorrow night against the Slaton Tigers.
Sporting the heaviest team in his coaching career at Spur, Coach Sam Hawkes will pit his huskies against an even heavier team tomorrow. It will be the first game this season in which Spur has been the smaller team.
Slaton reportedly uses seven different offensive formations, with the T and the TCU spread being their favorites. The spread attack was effective against the Foydada Whirlwinds last Friday night as the Tigers got by with a 12-6 win.

The Dickens County Farm Bureau will hold its annual county convention next Thursday evening, Oct. 28, in the Dickens school house, beginning at 7:30. It is at this meeting that the county organization will discuss and adopt the resolutions to be sent to the State convention in November at Galveston, and then on to the national convention.
Charlie Nickels, president of the county Farm Bureau, states that this is by far the most important meeting of the year for Dickens County farmers as far as agriculture legislation is concerned, because it is here that the "grass roots" of the farming industry express their desires, needs and suggestions as they start on the trek to the state and national farm programs.
Also included in the evening meeting will be the election of directors and the handling of any other business that may come before the group.
The organization's annual membership drive will open in the county tomorrow. A kick-off meeting will be held tonight at Dickens to lay plans for the effort to contact every farmer in the county.
Helping with the drive will be high school students from the county's four high schools. At Spur the FFA will help, at Patton Springs and McAdoo it will be the seniors, and at Dickens it will be the athletes.
The students will receive a substantial commission on all membership renewals and twice as much for new members, reports D. P. Smiley, Representative. One of these groups will be included in tonight's meeting.
Speaking to the gathering, tonight will be Hub King, state director of District 2, of Brownfield.
Nickels urges everyone in the county who is in any way connected with or interested in agriculture to join the Farm Bureau and attend the county convention next Thursday.

INGREDIENTS FOR CHICKEN CUTLETS
1-1/2 cups water
1 teaspoon salt
2/3 cup uncooked white rice
2 cups finely diced cooked chicken
1 tablespoon chopped onion
1 teaspoon grated lemon rind
1/4 teaspoon salt
1/4 teaspoon pepper
2 egg yolks
2 egg whites, slightly beaten
1 cup fine cracker crumbs
Cooking fat for frying cutlets
1 1/2 lb. can condensed cream of chicken soup
1/2 cup water

INGREDIENTS FOR CRANBERRY-APPLE RELISH:
2 cups cranberries
7 apples, pared and cored
orange
1/4 cup steel or cane sugar

METHOD FOR MAKING CHICKEN CUTLETS: Put the water, salt and rice in a 2-quart saucepan and bring to a vigorous boil. Turn the heat as low as possible. Cover the saucepan with a lid. Leave over the low heat for 14 minutes. Turn off heat. Leave lid on for 10 minutes. Add the chicken, onion, lemon rind, salt, pepper and egg white in the pan and mix thoroughly. Add the mixture to the cracker crumbs of 1/2 cup and mix into balls. Chill. Coat the mixture is left in refrigerator more than two hours. Press the rice and chicken mixture together firmly and shape into "pork chop shaped" cutlets.
Dip cutlets first into the egg whites, then into cracker crumbs. Chill. Fry in a skillet of hot fat, cooking one side to a golden brown before turning. Serve hot with a sauce made by heating together the chicken soup and water. The cutlets may be kept for about 30 minutes by placing them uncovered in a 250° F. oven.
This recipe makes 6 cutlets.

METHOD FOR MAKING CRANBERRY-APPLE RELISH: Put cranberries and apples through a food chopper. Quarter oranges and lemon, removing seeds and put through food chopper. Add to the cranberry-apple mixture. Mix in the sugar. Chill in the refrigerator before serving. This relish may be stored in the refrigerator for several weeks. Pass the cranberry-apple relish or serve on the tray with the cutlets.

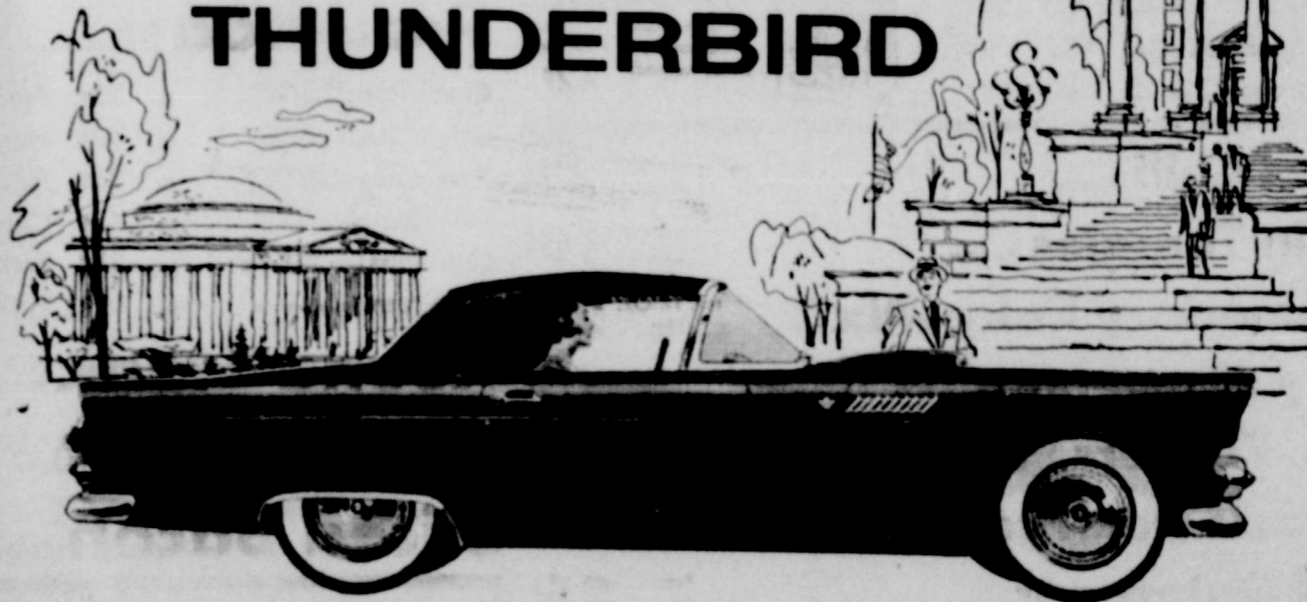
