What About YOUR Six-Year-Old?

(This is the first installment of an article by Mrs. Kelley pertaining to the need and possibility of a Readiness School in Dickens County.)

Some ten or twelve parents have communicated concerning the idea of a Readiness School in this town. Since the Readiness School would be a private school, as the children are not considered "school age" until the 1st of Sept. 1954, it would necessitate a charge of tuition to attend.

After counseling with the Curriculum Coordinator for the Horace Mann Elementary School in New York, and after reading the several articles in the October issue of the Ladies Home Journal and after counseling with Mr. Cook, local superintendent, I have come to see the pro-

blem in our schools as these national oculators (Griswold of Yale, Chas. of Chicago, Woodring of Washington College, Hohman of Duke, Loramy of Jr. High in Pennsylvania, along with our local school men) do and I am convinced that the problem is national in its scope, and that the big problem from the 1st grade through college is the Failure To Teach Thoroughly The Basic Skills—Reading, Spelling, Phonics, Writing and Arithmetic and especially was the "Failure to Read" given as the greatest single cause for the failure of the schools to meet the needs of the child. Along with the failure to teach the (1) Basic Skills was listed, (2) no concern for individual differences and (3) no provision being made for interests and abilities of boys and girls of school age.

The conclusion is that the READINESS program if in reach of the 6 years old or "school age" children in any school, city, county, or state, then the READINESS PROGRAM must be incorporated into the primary level (grades 1-2-3-4) according to the Twelve Grade Plan in Texas.

According to these National educators and the Curriculum Director of Horace Mann Elementary School, if the schools in any locality want to start working on the problems and they are:

1. Teaching, Reading, Writing and Arithmetic thoroughly to every child (enriching)
2. Taking care of Individual Differences.
3. Having a consideration for the interests and choices of the abilities of the boys and girls then educators in charge need to proceed as they do at the Horace Mann school (a practice school for Columbia University).

I shall relate the steps of procedure at the "Prep" school (one of the primary schools at Columbia University) for the Horace Mann Elementary of

New York.

When a child becomes of school age and enters public school he is placed in a first grade according to his reading ability. (NOT according to chronological age, alphabetical order, drawing numbers, or by I. Q. (Intelligence). Tests are given him to determine his READING ABILITY. (This idea is set forth also by Mr. Laromy, Principal of Jr. High in Pennsylvania on page 56 of October issue of Ladies Home Journal.)

The children who have the Mental Age of six years and six months are placed with a teacher who is trained to teach them HOW TO READ. The teacher immediately begins to show the child words and phrases and begins to build a vocabulary (the 75 words the child will see in his first primer). The same procedure takes place for writing and arithmetic and soon the children are ready for formal text book presentation. Dr. Laromy says that in a first

grade of 30 pupils that 10 may be ready to attack formal reading (see words) at the end of the 1st six weeks.

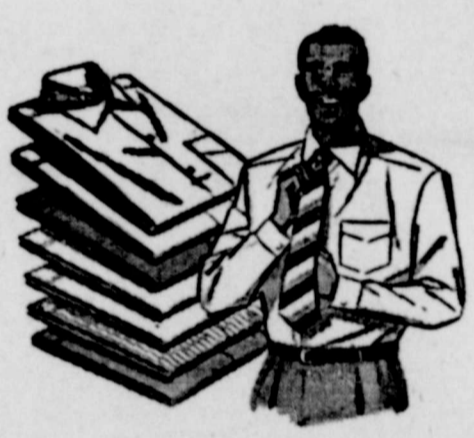

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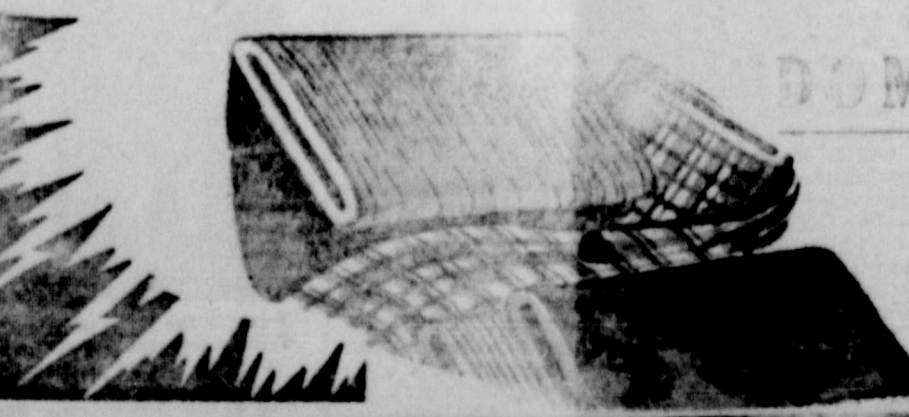

BEEF CATTLE NEED ROUGHAGE AND PLENTY OF IT

Roughage — and a lot of it — will be needed to carry Texas beef cattle through the winter. Consider both the amount and quality of roughage you feed, U. D. Thompson, extension animal husbandman.

Roughage in some form should be available to livestock at all times. This doesn't necessarily mean it must be of the highest quality, but the higher the feeding value the better, Thompson says.

Roughage very low in nutritive value can be fed with success if adequate supplement about two pounds of cottonseed meal is supplied each day. Cotton burrs, peanut hulls, corncobs and rice straw fall into this category.

Thompson cites specific rations based on years of research and tests which are recommended for feeding in Texas. Use about four pounds of legume hay with 14 pounds of cottonseed hulls or oat straw for each animal daily. If corn or sorghum silage is available, feed 40 to 50 pounds of either uednopodanETAO of either and one pound of cottonseed meal or cake daily.

Eighteen pounds of Johnsongrass or Prairie hay supplemented with one or two pounds of cottonseed meal or cake makes a top-notch ration for dry cows where the hay is available, says Thompson. If Johnsongrass or sorghum hays were cut early and did not get rained on, he says producers may get by without any supplement.

A cow nursing a calf will need about 60 pounds of corn or sorghum silage or 20 pounds of Johnsongrass hay fed with two pounds of cottonseed meal or cake daily.

Less feed is needed to keep cows from losing weight than to put it back on after it is starved off. Fishy animals, the type most easily wintered, may lose 150 to 200 pounds without impairing the production of a calf.

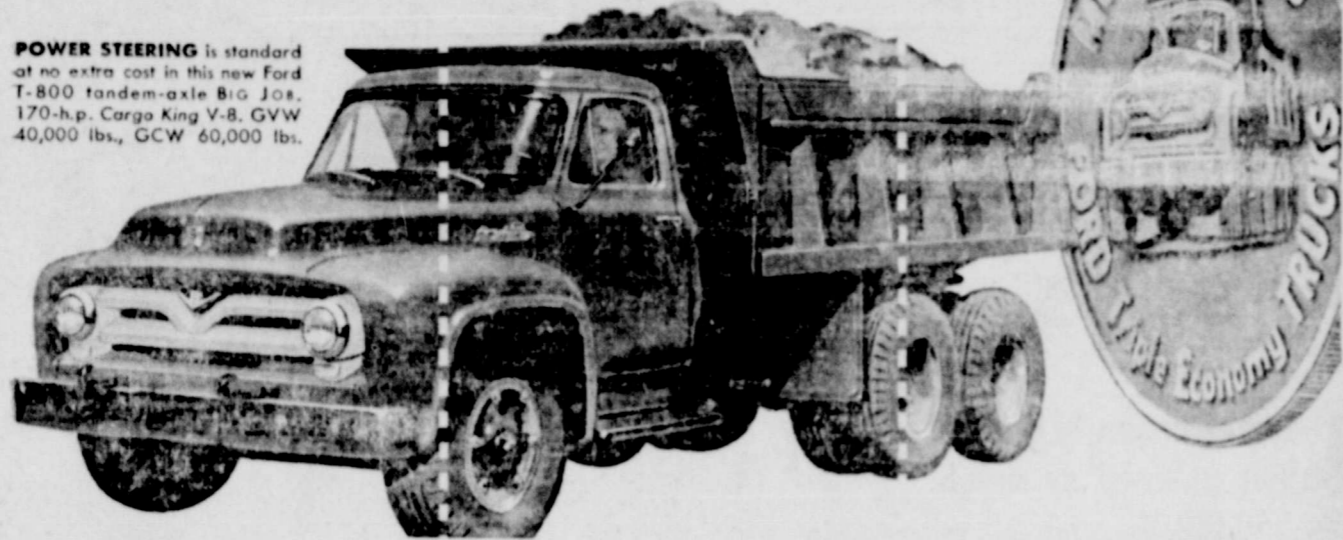
Salt and steamed bone meal mineral supplement will complete the winter feed requirement of beef animals and should be fed free-choice, Thompson concludes.

Fall planted cover crops in the district are badly in need of moisture, reports S. C. S. technicians who have been making moisture checks recently. Rainfall within the next few weeks should assure sufficient growth to help control blowing.

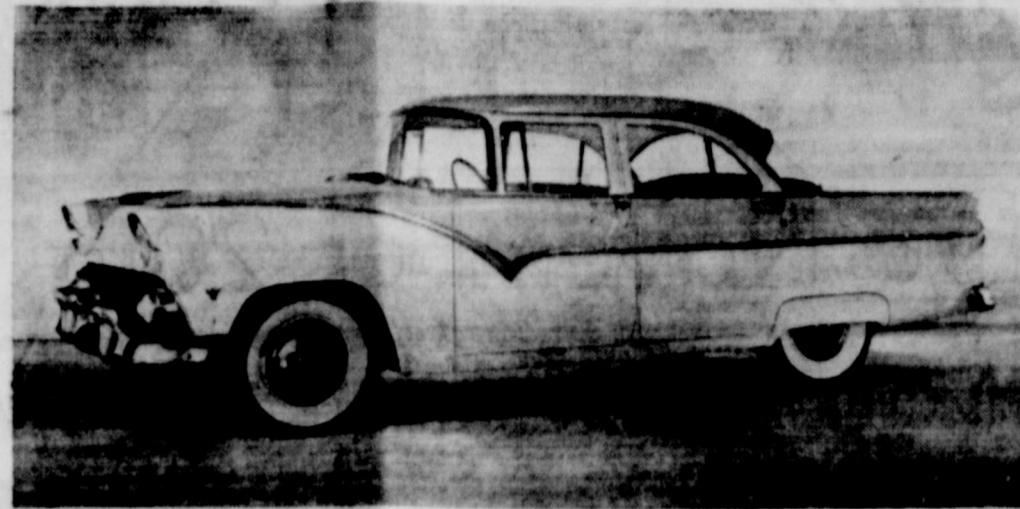
T. B. Watson has a good example of grain sorghum stubble

management in combination with sub-soiling as a means of controlling blowing and putting the soil in condition to take in any rainfall that comes. This has proven to be a profitable practice with many cooperators during the last few years.

Yields on terraced land as against non-terraced lands are showing up very good in 1954.

Under comparable conditions the yields are almost doubled in most instances and doubled in some. Lem Miller, cooperator north of Glenn reports a yield of 1000 lbs. milt per acre on terraced land as compared to 500 lbs. on non-terraced land. Raymond Harris and Elmer Johnson near McAdoo report doubled yields of cotton on terraced land as compared to non-terraced land.

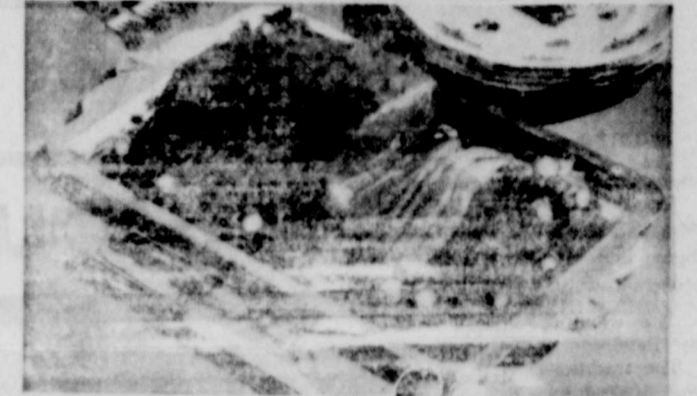

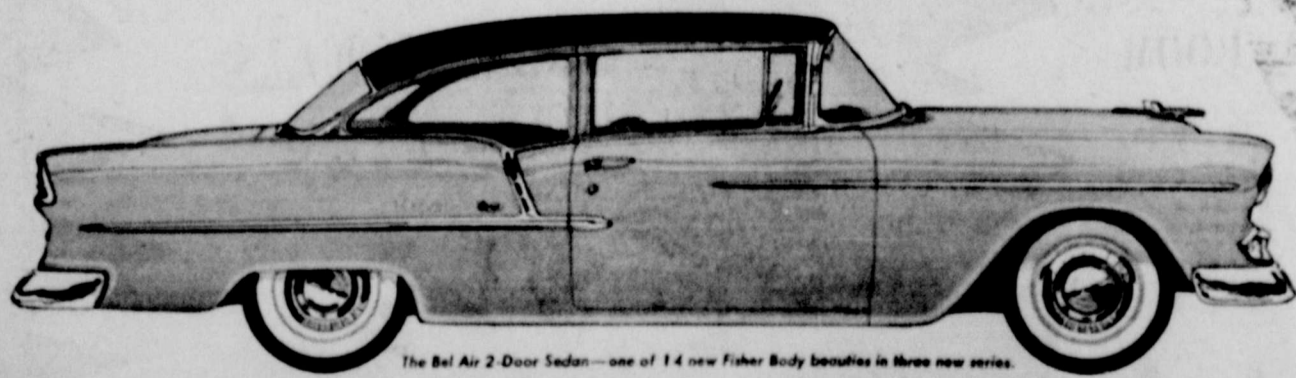
