We're really proud of our apprentice printer, Loyd Womack. Loyd went to Dallas to printers school, and on the merits of what he had learned in our shop and his genuine interest in the trade, he received a \$100 scholarship there. This week he wrote to his folks:

"Well, I finally started on the keyboard and it's harder than I expected. But there isn't anything easy about that machine.

"I am liking school better all the time. We all have lots of fun trying to work and play at the same time. We work a while and then sit up awhile. It makes the weeks fly by like days.

"Everybody works. There are about 50 boys in the school and everyone of them are friendly. It makes you feel good to see 50 boys with pride on their faces trying their best to learn a good trade.

"It makes me feel ashamed of myself sometimes when I see some of the boys that got a leg shot off or a belly full of shell fragment in the war working and trying to make a new life for themselves. One boy can't go to school a full day because he got a stomach full of shell fragment in the war and he dies easily. I can see him everyday with sweat all over his face as he works. He tries hard and never complains. I know he hurts a lot of the time by the expression on his face."

He reports that he'll be home over the Thanksgiving week end for a visit.

Our County Health Officer Dr. B. F. Hale brought us a copy of the Texas General Sanitation Law, including several pages of small print, definitions, references, etc., and asked that we pass along to who may be concerned certain portions thereof.

The great love that almost eluded him, the intrigue that followed him from market place to place, the danger that dogged his tracks through swamp and jungle, the daring with which he defied the rebels and restored his honor make "Bengal Brigade" an epic of raw courage and glory.

And the scope of "Bengal Brigade" is matched by a regiment of sterling performers. Hudson, fresh from the greatness he achieved in UI's "Magnificent Obsession," demonstrates his dramatic prowess anew, in a role that demands a lover's warmth, and a master-plotter's nerve.

Arlene Dahl as the Colonel's daughter who is renounced by the outcast Hudson, is a creature of shimmering beauty who might well have inspired deeds that could change the course of history. And exotic Ursula Thiess, the highly publicized European star, lives up to her advance heralding—as the native girl who nurses wounded Hudson back to health, then must disavow her love for him.

Based on the novel "Bengal Tiger" by Hall Hunter, "Bengal Brigade" owes the effectiveness of its many big scenes to the large-scale conception that started with. The sets provided

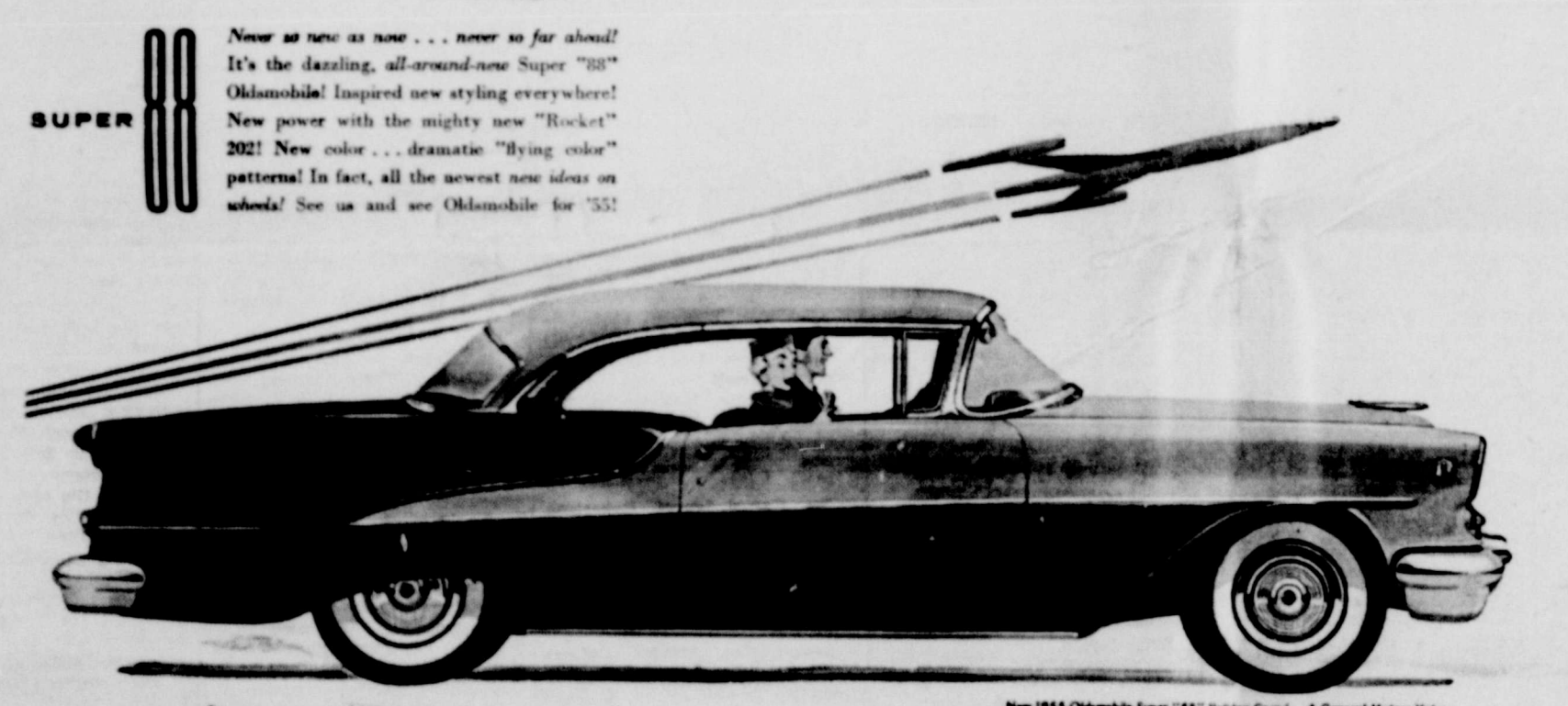

What About Your Six-Year-Old?

By Marie (Mrs. O. L. Kelley) (This is the second installment of an article by Mrs. Kelley pertaining to the need and possibility of a Readiness School in Dickens County.)

The children who have barely a mental age of 6 years, and at least 5 years 8 months are given a teacher trained to teach Readiness in the Basic Skills. The teacher presents various methods in reading, writing, and arithmetic and use a Readiness Book in all 3 subjects. If no defects show up this second group of, say 10, will be ready to see words and begin building the vocabulary for the first primer, not later than 12 weeks after school starts!

The children who have a mental age below 5 years and 8 months are placed with a third

teacher who is both a Readiness teacher and a Remedial Teacher. (She had a remedy for these children in reading, math, and writing and she gives the Right Method To Beginners! This group will be exposed to various activities to teach them how to listen, hear, see, and proceed to develop muscle and eye coordination, build arithmetical concepts, develop ability to see likenesses and differences. Two Reading Readiness books are used (We Read Pictures and We Read More Pictures). A course in Structural Arithmetic (Boxes of Blocks, Triangles, Objects, Animals, Vegetables, Etc. where children play games to form certain mathematical concepts that make for maturity.) No child is asked to make 1-2-3 or count to a hundred or what are 2 plus 2? Muscle coordination is developed by music and records and eye and ear troubles, and speech defects are corrected by proper machines, used regularly. Practice with stories, charts, and "sound" games help him to mature mentally.

The skilled teacher does not rely on her Own Judgement as to the growth of the child, but tests him often so that she can place him in the reading room at the first possible chance.

Statistics show that ten out of 30 children will not be ready to read till their 2nd year of school.

This group may dwindle from ten to five in six months and it will be true that 5 will be in the Readiness Room at the end of the first nine months. "But you just watch what happens at the beginning of their second year of school," says the coordinator at Horace Mann. He will be ready to read! Children in this group, along with all other beginners, are given 3 years on the Primary Level, which stretches into the first half of the 4th grade to learn the Basic Skills. The basic Skills (R. W. A. Spelling and Phonics) are clinched for life, or they are lost for life. Educators tell us that if a child is taught properly, he either learns to read or he doesn't by the time he reaches the four and a half grade level.

When children complete the Primary Level, they are ready for elementary schooling. To "read Horace Mann School, the child "finches" the 3 R's by the time he gets well into the 4th grade and in the 4th or 5th years he is introduced to English (formal), history, geography, etc. and he is directed to begin to choose an "interest area" a subject he likes best and wants to exhaust. He stops "Learning to Read" and begins Reading to Learn."

When he enters properly the

Horace Mann elementary school (6, 7, 8) grades he elects an interest and begins to do research and practice by actual experience in his chosen field. If he is studying discounting, percentage, etc. in arithmetic, he actually works in a bank, or cotton market, or store, and he works out actual problems. This bank, exchange, and stores are rooms with banks, stores, farms, newspaper, market (Stocks, Exchange) in them which are practice rooms for students for 6 week periods in a chosen field. The teacher sits as a counselor and if anyone "hinta" a "stump" he asks the teacher to direct him, otherwise, as our guide said "It's a school that the children run."
